

Announce Speakers for New Orleans Symposia

American Oil Chemists' Society are well adanced, according to R. M. Persell, general chairman. The meeting will be held at the Roosevelt Hotel, New Orleans, La., April 29-May 1, 1957, and will include a number of entertainment features and a well-rounded technical program featuring two

symposia.

The first, entitled "Fats in Nutrition and Health," will bring together recognized and outstanding authorities in this field from all parts of the country. From the Northeast C. G. King, executive director of the Nutrition Foundation Inc., New York, N. Y., is scheduled to open the symposium with a review of nutritional aspects of fats in the diet. From the deep South Raymond Reiser, Department of Biochemistry and Nutrition, Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, College Station, Tex., will discuss the biochemistry of fat metabolism, and Russell L. Holman, professor of pathology, Louisiana State University School of Medicine, New Orleans, has agreed to describe his research relating to the occurrence of atheramas in various population groups. From the Pacific will come Roslyn B. Alfin-Slater, visiting associate professor, Department of Biochemistry, University of Southern California, University Park, Los Angeles, Calif., who will describe the role of essential fatty acids. One additional authority is being sought to complete the session, which will be summarized by Grace A. Goldsmith, professor of medicine, Tulane University, New Orleans. This symposium is scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday, April 30, under the chairmanship of Frank G. Dollear, of the program committee.



from Swarthmore, and past president of the A.O.C.S., will speak on refining and bleaching processes, and R. H. Potts, technical advisor, Armour Chemical Division, Armour and Company, McCook, Ill., will review the subject of distillation of fatty acids.

Other topics which have been planned, but for which arrangements have not as yet been completed, include hydrogenation, esterification and interesteri-

fication, and fat splitting.

The 48th Meeting will also include four sessions devoted to the presentation of papers of general interest and audience appeal which have been arranged by Robert T. O'Connor and his Technical Program Committee.

Thereainment features are being planned to take full advantage of the colorful characteristics of the New Orleans area which have made it world-famous. Mrs. William G. Bickford will be in charge of the Ladies' Program. She and her committee are arranging a number of special events, including a trip to the Gulf Coast (America's Riviera); a coffee at the Roosevelt, and the traditional French breakfast at Brennan's, followed by a tour of the Vieux Carré. General entertainment events will include a mixer on April 28, and the annual banquet and dinner dance on April 30, with J. J. Ganucheau as chairman.






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
