### Committee Chairmen Named for October Meeting in Chicago

**A** PRELIMINARY planning meeting of the general committee for the 32nd annual fall meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society was held at the Sherman hotel on May 15, with C. W. Hoerr, Armour and Company, as chairman. Appointments were announced as follows: A. V. Graei Jr., Wurster and Sanger Inc., program; E. F. Cavanaugh, Armour, hotel; W. J. Quick, Distillation Products Industries, entertainment; D. A. Leo, Durkee Famous Foods, registration; Miss Mary Harneson, Kraft Foods, ladies' entertainment; Richard W. Scott, Armour, floor man for exhibits; R. J. Vander Wal, Armour, publicity; N. W. Ziels, Lever Brothers Company, Hammond, Ind., treasurer; and the following as advisers—J. P. Harris, S. S. Fein, G. A. Crapple, and A. F. Kapecki.

The fall meeting will be held at the Sherman, October 20-22, 1958, in Chicago. Preceding it there will be a complimentary mixer on Sunday from 5 to 7 p.m. Distillation Products Industries will be hosts for the Monday evening cocktail party; the dinner-dance will be held on Tuesday; there will be no plant trips.

Mr. Hoerr said that 24 exhibitors had already been signed up, and other sales were pending. Exhibit charges were set at \$175 for nonadvertisers in the Journal, \$150 for advertisers, and \$125 for those wishing smaller space than the standard.

The registration fee was set at \$10 for members, \$15 for nonmembers, and \$5 for academic people. Students and speakers were to be admitted free of charge. Exhibitors were to be given one free ticket. There was to be no registration charge for wives; the ladies' program was to be subsidized. The banquet fee was set at \$8.

Emphasis in the convention program will be on synthetic detergents, nutrition, and plant safety, according to Mr. Graei. Authors who expect to have papers ready for presentation at the meeting are asked to write Mr. Graei in care of his company at 5201 S. Kenwood, Chicago 15, as soon as possible. By or before August 15 he will need such information as title, names of authors, and speakers, also three copies of a 100- to 300-word abstract.

Several Society committees will report at the special business session during the meeting, and the Governing Board will meet Sunday, at 2 p.m., with J. C. Konen, president, in the chair.

Improvement in the quality of peanut products is the aim of a research project at the University of Arizona under contract with the U. S. Department of Agriculture. The project involves a study of the factors affecting the flavor of processed peanuts and will be carried out under the supervision of the Southern Utilization Research and Development Division of the Agricultural Research Service, which negotiated the contract.
