
Taiwan, Hong Kong, Thailand, Cambodia, and Australia, in a trip paralleling a pre-war tour of 1939.

Japanese Plant Breeders Working to Rebuild Markets

Among the observations he makes are an enthusiastic commentary on the efforts of Japanese plant breeders, farmers and technicians to rebuild markets lost during World War II. In contrast, Taiwan and Hong Kong whose citronella markets are under assault from Red Chinese competition, have not diversified nor developed technically to meet the new and growing competition.

Dr. Guenther notes the enormous potential of Red China to produce citronella, menthol, eucalyptus, cedar-wood—to mention but a few of the essential oils. Full development of their production capabilities could vastly change the essential oil industry in Europe and the United States, as well as in the countries under discussion.
