

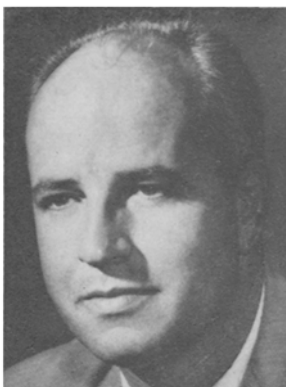

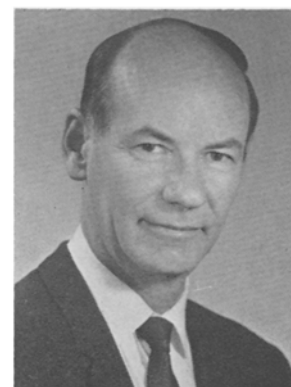
Spring Meeting Progress Report

Second Call for Nominations, Honored Student Award

A second call for nominations for the spring and fall recipients of the AOCS Honored Student Award has been issued by S. S. Chang, Chairman of the Award Committee.

The Honored Student Award Program, established in 1963 under the direction of the AOCS Education Committee, recognizes outstanding preparation for a career in the field of fats and oils by awarding selected graduate students an opportunity to attend Spring and Fall Technical Sessions. Those selected receive all-expense-paid trips to either of the two AOCS Annual Meetings: round trip air fare, registration and activities fees, hotel and meal expenses.

Nominations are based on (a) research in the field of fats and oils, average time spent in this research, and number of years the student has been conducting research; (b) accredited courses in the field, the number of credit hours compiled, including subjects indirectly related to fats and oils; (c) publications in the field of lipids to which nominees have contributed as either senior author or co-author, and (d) actual working experience, either academic or industrial. Final selection of winners is based on a combined gross scoring of the categories above.

The Honored Student Award has been given to 30 students during the period 1963-1967. Of these, six are now working in the fats and oils industry, eight are conducting research and teaching in universities in the chemistry of lipids, and the remainder are continuing work on graduate degrees.

Any faculty member of a college or university may nominate students for the Award. Those who have attended at least one AOCS Meeting or have published at least one technical paper in JAOCS or Lipids are especially invited to submit nominations.

Linda Marie Parker to Receive Third AOAC Wiley Scholarship Award

Miss Linda Marie Parker, Clemson University, is the winner of the third 2-year Wiley scholarship award given by the Association of Official Analytical Chemists, K. L. Milstead, Chairman of the Awards Committee, has announced. Stephen L. Taylor, Oregon State University, and S. F. Viglione, Rutgers University, won the annual award in 1966 and 1967, respectively.

Miss Parker is entering her third year at the Clemson University, Clemson, South Carolina, and is majoring in Food Science. In 1966 she was valedictorian of the class of 1966, Hebron High School, Cades, South Carolina, and has maintained an outstanding scholastic record in her college studies.

The AOAC Scholarship Award is given in honor of Harvey W. Wiley, one of the founders of the AOAC. It consists of \$600 with \$300 to be given the winner during each of his last two years in undergraduate college study. Candidates are selected according to academic standing, financial need, and interest in a scientific career related to regulatory or research activities in commodity areas important to agriculture and public health.

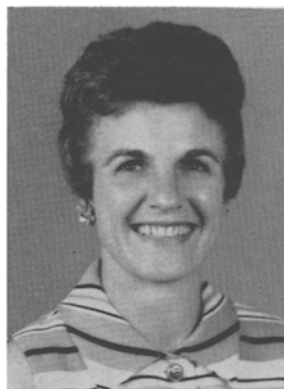
