Third Northeast Section Achievement Award Honors Waldo C. Ault

On November 19 the Northeast Section of the American Oil Chemists' Society celebrated the presentation of its Achievement Award to W. C. Ault in ceremonies at the Franklin Motor Inn in Philadelphia, followed by a lecture on lubricants testing by C. W. Lawler.

The Section established the Award in 1966 to honor outstanding accomplishments in the fields of fats and oils, whether by research or industrial development. Previous awardees have been R. W. Riemenschneider and Daniel Melnick.

In presenting the Award, Section President August M. Rossetto Jr. noted that Dr. Ault's many and varied contributions to lipid research had been accomplished both directly and through the work of others. For twenty-five years he led the fat research program of USDA's Eastern Regional Research Laboratory near Philadelphia, from which he retired two years ago. The author of ninety publications and patents, he made, in addition to basic studies on animal fat composition, important contribu-tions to the manufacture of synthetic rubber and developed improved processes for manufacturing lard oil and oleic acid. Under his impulse the value of fat in poultry and livestock feeds has been recognized both scientifically and commercially throughout the world. Under his direction was done the basic research leading to the present large-scale use of epoxidized oils as stabilizers for vinyl plastics and the recognition of long-chain comonomers as efficient internal plasticizers. He made many other contributions in fields such as biodegradable detergents, lubricants, and the stability and shortening properties of lard.

Other aspects of his career and his service to the AOCS, the American Chemical Society, and Drexel University are reported in JAOCS 45, 460A(1968). Active in his retirement he continues as an associate editor of JAOCS; since 1967 he has been associated with the Applied Science

Laboratories of State College, Pa.

In accepting the Award and acknowledging the acclaim of his friends. Ault spoke of the many satisfactions received from team-work, contributions toward career development and personal relationships over the years.
