

# Top entertainment planned

It's almost time for the AOCS 46th Annual Fall Meeting, to be held in Ottawa, September 24-28. Members of the local committee, who have been hard at work for months, promise warm hospitality, a stimulating technical program and several social highlights. According to General Meeting Chairman Paul Sims, the committee "comprises seasoned

experts who have contributed to the success of other scientific meetings. Thus, although this will be the first AOCS meeting in Ottawa, it will not be the first large conference organized by local talent."

The technical program includes numerous contributed papers, as well as 14 carefully organized symposia. Some of the key papers will cover topics such as the nutritional value of fats, milk lipids; effect of environment and genetics of erucic acid in commercial Canadian rapeseed; origin of the milk globule; and lipid metabolism in relation to absorption, transport, storage and mobilization of pesticides in mammals. The ladies program, with special Canadian features and gifts for each participant, includes a talk on English bone china; a tour to Kingsmere, the estate of one of Canada's former Prime Ministers, located in the beautiful Gatineau Hills outside Ottawa; a special Canadian fur fashion show; and guided tours to points of interest in Canada's capital. Catherine McKinnon

The busiest female vocalist in Canada today, Catherine McKinnon has a background that enables her to excel in all media. Her career in television is a good indication of her success. She has had regular billing on *The Don Messer Jubilee*, *The Ian Tyson Show*, *Rollin' on the River* and *Luncheon Date*, as well as two of her own series on the Canadian TV Network.

A large part of McKinnon's career is comprised of public appearances across the country. Recent credits also include the lead in Winnipeg's Rainbow Stage Theatre's *The Wizard of Oz*, where she broke attendance records, and a successful debut with the Hamilton Philharmonic Symphony.

Between television and radio shows and stage productions, Catherine McKinnon makes frequent appearances in the major Canadian clubs. Her versatile voice enables her to play equally well in the folk coffee houses and the sophisticated supper clubs.

McKinnon's first album, *Voice of an Angel*, gave her the distinction of being the largest selling female recording artist in Canada. She received the international Medim Award for recording, in France in 1967, and for two consecutive years has been voted "The Top Canadian Female Vocalist" by *RPM* magazine.

Donald Harron is currently assisting George C. Scott in running United Artists' *The Hospital* at the Odeon Hyland Theatre. He is also seen weekly in ten and a half million U.S. homes on the program *Hee Haw*.

Harron has appeared as a guest on almost every major U.S. television drama series, including: *Mission Impossible*, *The FBI*, *Man from U.N.C.L.E.*, *Profiles in Courage*, *The Hallmark Hall of Fame*, *The Defenders* and the *Wonderful World of Walt Disney*. Canadian TV watchers may remember him in two 90 minute dramas, *Reddick* and *Reddick II*, in which he played the title role of a modern minister in an urban church.

Broadway has seen Harron in six plays, including *Separate Tables* and *The Tenth Man*, in which he played the title role; London's West End has seen him in four, the most recent being the comedy *Mary, Mary*, in which he starred with Oscar winner Maggie Smith. The musical for which Harron wrote the book and half the lyrics, *Anne of Green Gables*, won the London Critics Award as the "Best Musical of the 1969-70 Season," and has played in New York, Sweden and Kenya. He has performed in Shakespearean plays in Canada, the U.S. and England.

He is currently working on a screenplay for director Norman Jewison, and his 90 minute TV musical *The Wonder of it All*, based on the life of Canadian painter Emily Carr, goes into production in the Fall. ■
