
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### Four receive Bond Award

Four graduate students received Honored Student Awards at the AOCS 48th Annual Fall Meeting in Philadelphia.

The Honored Student Award Program, established in 1963 under the direction of the Education Committee, recognizes outstanding preparation for a career in the field of fats and oils by providing selected students an opportunity to participate in the Society's national meetings.

The four students honored at the Philadelphia meeting were:

Carlos George-Nascimento is a graduate student in the Department of Biochemistry of Baylor College of Medicine. He is conducting research on the effect of different lipid compositions upon the enzymatic oxidase activity of intestinal bacteria. He completed his undergraduate studies at the Faculty of Science of the University of Chile in 1971 and will be a candidate for the PhD. degree from Baylor in early 1975. He is undertaking his research under the direction of professor S.J. Wakil.

Patrick O'Doherty, graduate student in biochemistry at the University of Toronto, is conducting research on the control of synthesis of fats and their release in the intestinal mucosa of the rat. He earned a B.S. with honors from the University College, Dublin in 1967, his masters in 1970 from Memorial University of Newfoundland and is a candidate for the Ph.D. degree in late 1974. He is conducting his research under the supervision of professor A. Kuksis.

Yuri Wedmid, graduate student in biochemistry at Rutgers University, received his B.S. from Rutgers in 1969 and attended the University of Arizona briefly thereafter. He will be a candidate for the Ph.D. from Rutgers early in 1975. His research, conducted under the supervision of professor Carter Litchfield, is on the structural chemistry of the unusual fatty substances present in the acoustic organ of the dolphin.

Eliot C. Williams is a graduate student at the Chemistry Department of Indiana University. He was a graduate of the University of Wisconsin in 1969 and will be a candidate for the Ph.D. degree in late 1974 at Indiana University. His research, conducted under professor E.H. Cordes, is on carbon-13 NMR studies in micellar and membrane systems aimed at understanding interactions between lipids and proteins in biologically active membranes.
