


Kak-Yuen Tai (left) and Charles Aldag

#### **Charles Aldag Addresses Northeast Section**

"Fatty Acids-Review and Forecast" was the title of the talk given by Charles A. Aldag, vice-president, Chemical Products Division, Aldrich Chemical Corp., to the AOCS Northeast Section in Philadelphia on October 14, 1975. The meeting, chaired by James W. Hampson, USDA, was held at the Golden Horse Inn. A total of 45 members and guests attended.

Aldag's presentation predicted the continued growth of the fatty acid industry, inasmuch as fatty acids provide many valuable special end-uses and new uses continue to be found. Fortunately, the raw materials are replenishable, can and probably will be expanded, and are often interchangeable. In comparison to petrochemical economics, fatty acids look competitive in speciality markets, and consequently, expansion of the U.S. fatty acid industry will closely follow the increase in disposable income.

Frank White, national AOCS vice-president, spoke briefly to the gathering. He emphasized the need for the Society to grow in numbers and he urged all of the local members who were not members of the national AOCS to consider the many benefits of belonging to the national society.

# Graci Leaves Wurster & Sanger



# Food Science Head Sought at Penn State

The Pennsylvania State University is seeking qualified candidates for the position of Head of its newly created Department of Food Science.

Candidates, whose applications should be received no later than March 1, 1976, should be available July 1 and possess a PhD or equivalent degree in Food Science or a related area, together with demonstrated qualifications in or potential for administration, teaching, research, and extension.

The Head of the Food Science Department, as its administrative officer, will be directly responsible to the Dean of the College of Agriculture. Duties will include the administrative and academic leadership, supervision, and coordination of all teaching, research, and extension activities of the Department and responsibility for the growth and strengthening of these activities. Duties will also include contact and cooperation with industrial, governmental, and agricultural interests.

The new department, established effective Novenber 15, 1975, brings together 17 faculty members with food science interests and programs who, since 1965, have been cooperating in an interdepartmental food science program involving teaching, research, and extension in the animal, dairy, horticulture, and poultry areas. Enrollment presently stands at 49 undergraduates and 36 MS and PhD candidates.

Applicants should submit a complete resume with documentation of administrative, teaching, research, and extension experience and an optional, but highly desirable, statement of personal view and philosophy of administration and growth of a Department of Food Science, and names and addresses of five suggested references, to Dr. Gerald D. George H. Kyser, AOCS member emeritus and an active member for 35 years prior to his retirement in 1968 from the Aerosol Corporation of the South (Arlington, TN), died September 22, 1975. Kyser, a graduate of Southwestern University in Memphis, was previously employed as manager of the Shreveport (LA) laboratory of Barrow-Agee, analytical chemist at United Gas Pipe Line Co. in Shreveport, and chief chemist at General Mills' soybean processing plant at Belmond, IA.

Richard Lee Lyman, professor of nutrition science at the University of California, Berkeley, died December 2, 1975, after an extended illness. He was an active member since 1969.

# **Glenn Seaborg New ACS Head**

Nobel Prize winner Glenn T. Seaborg, University Professor of Chemistry at the University of California, Berkeley, and associate director of the Lawrence Berkeley Laboratory, took office on January 1 as president of the American Chemical Society during its centennial year. He succeeds Professor William J. Bailey of the University of Maryland, who will remain on the ACS board of directors for another year.

Seaborg, who won the Nobel Prize in chemistry with Edwin M. McMillan in 1951, is a codiscoverer of 10 elements, including plutonium, was chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission in Washington for 10 years under three Presidents, beginning with President Kennedy in 1961, and was an advisor to President Eisenhower and to the AEC under President Truman. He has published more than 200 scientific papers, has written several books on chemistry and the elements, holds about 50 patents for his scientific discoveries, and has received at least 20 major awards, 40 honorary degrees, and 32 lectureships both here and abroad.
