
Please also remember that you are welcome to attend any technical committee meetings which are scheduled to be held in New York. Take advantage of this unique opportunity.

Welcome to New York



When the 68th Annual Meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society opens in New York this May, it will mark the eighth time the society has met in that city, the first having been in 1911 when David Wesson succeeded Felix Paquin as president of the then two-year-old organization.

Today's society numbers about 3,500 members compared to approximately 100 during the group's first decade. The 800 to 1,000 persons attending the May 8-12 meeting in the Hotel Americana can choose among more than 200 technical papers, approximately 50 committee sessions, several AOCs social events, and, of course, the wide diversity of activities offered in the metropolitan area.

The tentative technical program was published in the February JAOCs. Copies of the final program will be in the registration packets at the meeting. The local committee, under the guidance of General Chairman Frank Naughton, has prepared a variety of supplementary and special programs that could fill all the time not allocated to technical sessions.

Registration forms are available from the AOCs Headquarters, 508 S. Sixth St., Champaign, IL 61820, or at the time of the convention. Advance registration fee for the meeting is \$75 for the four-day technical meetings, including tickets to social events.

Entertainment events

Mixer: There will be a wine tasting mixer in the Imperial Ballroom from 6:30 to 9 p.m. Tickets will be included in registration packages. The registration desk will be open Sunday afternoon. Northeast Section officers and their wives will greet early arrivals at the mixer.

Technical Session Chairmen Breakfast: A 7:30 to 9 a.m. breakfast will be held Monday in the Malmaison Room for the chairmen of the technical sessions.

Presidents Club & Honor Roll: A cocktail party will be held from 6 to 7 p.m. in the Regency Foyer for members of the Presidents' Club and Honor Roll. Tickets will be distributed to those eligible to attend. The Presidents' Club

and Honor Roll are composed of members who enlist new members in AOCs.

New Members and International Members: New AOCs members and International members will be invited to a 7:30 a.m. Tuesday breakfast in the Malmaison Room, with juice, coffee, and rolls to be served.

Banquet: The formal banquet will be held at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Imperial Ballroom. Tickets will be included in registration packages. Reservations may be made beginning at noon Tuesday at a special table to be set up near the registration desk. Two places each will be pre-reserved at approximately 20 tables for international members. Music at the banquet will be by the Dennis Layne Orchestra directed by Joey Scott. There will be two entertainment acts, headed by comedian Jackie Eagle. Also appearing will be the Kane Sisters.

Inaugural Luncheon: The inaugural luncheon for new officers will be held at 1 p.m. Thursday in the Royal Ballroom. Exchange coupons for the luncheon will be included in registration packages. Persons planning to attend the luncheon must exchange these coupons for an inaugural luncheon ticket at a special desk near the registration table. Table reservations may be made when the coupon is exchanged for a ticket. Persons planning to attend the luncheon must exchange their coupons for tickets by noon Wednesday.

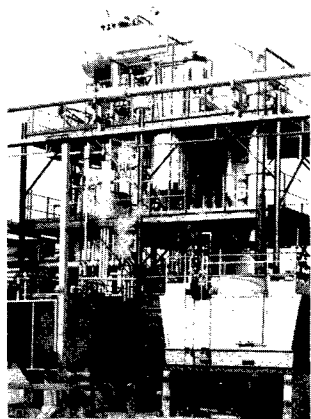
Broadway

The Enjoy New York committee, headed by Henry Salomon, obtained 100 Monday evening and 50 Tuesday evening tickets for "A Chorus Line," one of the most recent hit musicals on Broadway. New Yorkers buying through ticket brokers have paid \$75 a pair for tickets to this show, but the tickets were made available to AOCs members at their original \$16.50 per ticket cost. The tickets were available, on a first-come, first-serve basis to the early prepaid registrants to the meeting.



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A special ticket office run by League of New York Theaters at the north end of Times Square, near 48th Street, offers tickets at a discount price the day of performance, Salomon says. Tickets are often sold at half-price and are available for those shows that have excess unsold tickets for that day. There is not a large selection and the best shows are not always available, but for persons who merely want to see a Broadway play or musical and are not particular about which one, the office provides a chance to see a show inexpensively. Tickets for Wednesday and Saturday matinees usually go on sale about noon the day of performance, and those for evening shows about 5 p.m. the day of performance, Salomon says.

Visitor Welcoming

A Visitor Welcoming committee headed by Art Wrigley and aided by Frank Luddy will maintain an information booth to aid international registrants and new members. Welcoming committee members will be available to help such registrants find the programs they want to attend and to find the people they want to talk with.

For first-time or infrequent visitors to New York, there will be an information booth near the registration desk with maps of the city available and other information about entertainment, cultural and sports events in the city.

Ladies Program

A varied program featuring international cosmopolitan atmosphere as well as early New York sites has been prepared for the Ladies' Program under the direction of Clare Kalustian, committee head.

Headquarters for the Ladies' Program will be the Versailles Terrace on the hotel's second floor. There will be a welcoming tea from 2 to 4 p.m. Sunday, May 8, 1977, for which no ticket is required. Other scheduled events will

require tickets which will be included in the ladies' registration packages. Those packages will also include tickets for the Sunday evening wine tasting mixer, the Wednesday evening banquet and dance, and the inaugural luncheon on Thursday.

A continental breakfast will be served on the Versailles Terrace from 8:15 to 9 a.m. Monday, followed by a bus tour to the United Nations. There will be a briefing on world issues in a private conference hall, followed by a guided tour of the building to include information on the U.N.'s various branches and activities. Luncheon will be in the U.N. delegates' dining room, followed by time for shopping in the U.N. International Bazaar. Buses will return to the Americana by 1 or 1:30 p.m. There are no formal scheduled activities planned for Monday afternoon, but informal walking tours of nearby shopping districts may be arranged if there is sufficient interest and the weather is suitable.

Tuesday's ladies program will begin with a continental breakfast beginning at 8:15 a.m. with buses departing about 9:15 a.m. for lower Manhattan and a tour of Greenwich Village and New York's Soho area. Participants will see the homes of Aaron Burr and Washington Irving, the attic where revolutionary writer Thomas Paine wrote "The American Crisis," and the place where Abraham Lincoln gave his Cooper Union speech. There will be a visit to a Village townhouse and into an artist's loft in Soho. Buses will take participants to the Monks Inn, near Lincoln Center in mid-Manhattan, for lunch, and then return to the Americana for free time in the afternoon.

Wednesday a continental breakfast will be served beginning at 9 a.m. Tentative plans are to have entertainment in the Versailles Terrace after the breakfast, but details were not available at press time.

There are no formal ladies' program activities Thursday except for the inaugural luncheon.

With such a fine program planned for your enjoyment, Clare anticipates a record attendance. She would especially like to see a good number of ladies from the Northeast Section to turn out for the daily functions, Sunday night mixer and the banquet. A good showing by the local gals adds that special flavor needed to make the program a complete success, she added.

Free Lancing

In terms of attractions for visitors, New York is as much a polysaturated city as any in the United States.

For the first-time visitor, standard attractions include the Statue of Liberty, United Nations, famous buildings, Chinatown, and a host of others. Commercial sightseeing buses and boats will be operating during the meeting.

For art lovers there are the famous museums—the Metropolitan, Guggenheim, Whitney, Cloisters and the rest. There are innumerable art galleries clustered uptown and downtown.

For sports fans, professional baseball and soccer will be in season.

For music lovers, there are the formal halls such as Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall, while popular music fans can find some favorite somewhere in New York by watching newspapers for announcements.

For families bringing younger children to New York, the circus will be at Madison Square Garden, the Central Park Zoo is not too far from the meeting site, and the Bronx Zoo will be open, as will be the Coney Island Aquarium.

For gourments, the list of restaurants is endless. Consult with AOCs members from New York for suggestions.

The New York Convention and Visitors Bureau, 90 E. 42nd St., New York, NY 10017 can mail you a brochure on New York in spring listing a variety of activities, art exhibits, music and dance, theatres, off-Broadway shows, conventions and exhibits, and more. ●



'Barrier-free' meeting sought

For the first time, special emphasis is being given during the New York Annual Meeting to making the sessions accessible and useful to handicapped persons who may want to attend.

Registration forms for the meeting include a special box for registrants to check if special services due to handicap are required. Persons who check that box will be contacted by local committee members before the meeting to see what help is needed.

Ernest Gilmont, registration chairman for the New York meeting, and Martha Redden, of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), have toured the meeting site, the Hotel Americana, to see what facilities are available and what potential problems need attention. Persons in wheelchairs, for example, will have to use the 53rd Street entrance to the Americana. Dr. Gilmont is working with a special representative for the handicapped in the New York mayor's office to seek modifications by the Americana to make facilities more accessible to the handicapped. Architectural and engineering help in modification is available through the mayor's office, Dr. Gilmont said.

Awareness of removing obstacles to the handicapped during scientific meetings is increasing. The AAAS has two publications on the subject: "Barrier Free Meetings" and "Science, Technology and the Handicapped."

While the Americana was not built with consideration for persons in wheelchairs, Dr. Gilmont says its size and importance as a potential meeting site for scientific meetings should make it responsive to requests for modification. The hotel does, for example, provide ramps for wheelchairs. Restroom access is poor.

Special services for the deaf and blind will be arranged if persons with such handicaps register, Dr. Gilmont said. AAAS meetings, for example, have provided simultaneous sign language translation for the deaf.

Why the increasing concern?

Dr. John Gavin of Miles Laboratories in Elkhart, IN, notes in the AAAS publications, "For the past few years, I have been concerned about how the overt physically disabled person fares in industry. Even though profoundly deaf, I have reached a relatively high level of management, but I don't see many others at any level. As a scientist, a so-called knowledge worker, I find this somewhat strange, for physical capability, no matter how desirable it may be, is relatively unimportant in the business of science. The governing factor in the employment and utilization of scientific personnel should not be the appearance of the package, but the quality of the contents."

The Vocational Rehabilitation Act of 1973 provides for equal opportunity and affirmative action programs for the handicapped. Access symbols for persons in wheelchairs are becoming increasingly common along the nation's highways and throughout its communities.

Dr. Gilmont notes this will be the first AOCs meeting with special emphasis to aid the handicapped, but it won't be the last.

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The book is a completely independent continuation of the work by the same author: "Oberflächenaktive Anlagerungsprodukte des Äthylenoxyds" (Surface Active Ethylene Oxide Adducts), which has found wide international distribution and was the first monograph in this field. Topics dealt with in this book of international character are production, properties, uses, and analysis. The book contains a register of more than 3000 products and a large section with up-to-date information on the international literature. Leading persons from universities and from industry have served in an auxiliary and advisory capacity in the preparation of the volume.

"This book is a monumental compendium of data and information on ethylene oxide-derived surface active materials. The author has collated an enormous amount of information and has managed to arrange his presentation and his indices in a form which makes it possible to find information which is normally not readily accessible.

This book is not intended to be read cover-to-cover. It is instead, a superb reference source in which the information is gathered in a concise and readily accessible fashion. The author evidently completed his work in the summer of 1975, but coverage of the literature stops sometime during 1972. Despite its high cost (about \$100), purchase of this book can be recommended without any reservations." (Cosmetics and Toiletues, Oak Park, Ill.)

AOCS Placement Service in: NEW YORK

The fifth AOCS Placement Center is planned for the Annual Meeting at the Americana Hotel, New York, NY, May 8-12, 1977.

The Placement Center is designed to bring together employers and job applicants in the fields of fats, oils, lipids, and other areas served by the Society. Both applicants seeking positions and employers with job openings are encouraged to register and use the Center.

Applicants are asked to submit resumes on the standardized format which appears in this issue. In cases where applicants desire, applicants' names and addresses will be deleted from the confidential resumes placed on open file. These resumes will be assigned code numbers and will be made available in book form to employers attending the New York meeting. It will not be necessary for applicants to attend the New York meeting to use the service. However, attendance obviously will enhance an applicant's opportunity to find appropriate employment.

Likewise, employers are asked to complete a standardized job description form which appears in this issue. These forms will be posted at the Placement Center. As with the resumes, a coding system will be established to ensure confidentiality when desired. Employers who are unable to have interviewers present at the New York meeting are encouraged to send job listings. Resumes of interested applicants will be mailed to those employers after the meeting.

Applicants and employers who wish to register for the Placement Center should complete the standardized forms and return them by April 30, 1977, to AOCS Placement Service, 508 S. Sixth St., Champaign, IL 61820. There is no charge to AOCS members and students who register before April 30, 1977; nonmembers will be charged \$10.00. Those attending the Annual Meeting may register for the Placement Service at New York; however, the cost of registering at New York will be \$5.00 for students and AOCS members and \$15.00 for nonmembers. Employers with available positions will not be assessed a fee.

Detailed instructions for both applicants and employers follow.



INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANT

General Information

Registration is not limited to applicants attending the New York meeting; however, applicants present at New York must register for the meeting to have access to the Placement Center. No one will be admitted to the Center without a meeting registration badge.

Registering

General: Applicants are advised to register early to ensure proper handling of resumes. The deadline date for early registration is April 30, 1977. Applicants also may register at the New York meeting.

Early registration: Early registration can be accomplished by completing a standard resume form (a form is

enclosed with this issue). Resumes should be completed with as much information as possible and should clearly indicate whether the resume is "confidential" or "open." Applicants also should indicate whether or not they plan to attend the New York meeting. *Resumes of applicants who are unable to attend the New York meeting cannot be confidential.* These resumes will be placed in the open file and copies will be made available to employers requesting them. Resumes, with appropriate fees (see "Fees" section below), should be mailed to AOCS Placement Center, 508 S. Sixth St., Champaign, IL 61820.

New York registration: On arrival in New York, those who have registered for the Placement Center early will register for the meeting and check for the location of the Placement Center. They then should report to the Placement Center, where they will complete a placement registration card and an interview scheduling card, indicating the times they will not be available for interviews. Applicants who have not registered early will be requested to complete a resume form and pay all appropriate Placement Center fees at the time of their arrival in New York. The Placement Center will be open for registration on Sunday, May 8, 1977, 1:00-5:00 p.m. The Center will, however, not schedule interviews at this time.

Interview Scheduling

Employer initiated interview: Employers wishing to contact applicants will make contact by filling in their names or code numbers on the applicant's interview scheduling card. Applicants must check their own cards often to determine if employers wish interviews. Please check the message board near the registration desks often. Messages concerning interviews will be posted there.

Applicant initiated interview: Applicants wishing to contact employers may do so by completing a request-for-interview form which will be available at the Placement Center. The card, with a copy of the applicant's resume attached, will be kept at the Placement Center for the employer, who then will contact the applicant. Requests for interviews with those employers who are not attending the meeting will be mailed to the employers along with copies of an applicant's resume.

Placement Center interview room: Monday, May 9, 8:00 a.m.-noon and 1:30-5:00 p.m.; Tuesday, May 10, 8:00 a.m.-noon and 1:30-5:00 p.m.; Wednesday, May 11, 8:00-noon, and 1:30-5:00 p.m.; and Thursday, May 12, 8:00-11:00 a.m.

Applicant Fees

Early registration (resumes reaching AOCS by April 30, 1977): Students and AOCS members, no charge; nonmembers, \$10.00.

Meeting registration: Students and AOCS members, \$5.00; nonmembers, \$15.00.

INSTRUCTIONS TO EMPLOYER

General Information

Registration for the AOCs Placement Center in New York is not limited to those firms having representatives at the meeting. All descriptions of available positions provided by interested employers will be listed. However, access to the Placement Center in New York will be limited to employer representatives who have registered for the meeting.

Registering

General: To register with the Placement Center, an employer should complete the standardized job description form (a form is enclosed with this issue). The form should be completed with as much information as possible and should indicate whether the listing is to be "open" or "confidential" and whether or not a representative will be available for interviews at New York. Confidential listings will have the firm's name and address deleted before posting. All job descriptions will be posted in the Placement Center for viewing by applicants. Job description forms should be mailed to AOCs Placement Center, 508 S. Sixth St., Champaign, IL 61820. A form should be completed for each position opened. Additional forms are available from the above address.

New York arrival: Company representatives using the Placement Center must register for the meeting. Then they should report to the Placement Center where they complete a registration form and submit any new job descriptions for posting. They also check resumes to find prospective interviewees.

Interview Scheduling

Employer initiated interview: Each applicant will have completed an interview scheduling card. When an employer has determined by reading the resume that he wishes to interview a particular applicant, he simply writes his name

in the appropriate time slot on the applicant's card. Employers are advised to allow adequate time for the applicant to check his card. Once an interview has been scheduled, the employer may obtain a copy of the applicant's resume from the Placement Center. Resumes are not to be removed from the open books. For employers who are unable to send representatives to the New York meeting, resumes of interested applicants will be mailed to them on or before May 16, 1977.

Applicant initiated interview: Applicants may respond to posted job descriptions by requesting interviews with a particular employer. These applicants will complete a request-for-interview form. The Placement Center staff will attach a copy of the applicant's resume to the form and will hold it in the Placement Center for the employer. Employers periodically should check the Placement Center for these request-for-interview forms. Once the employer has evaluated the applicant's resume, he can schedule interviews by using the applicant's schedule card or by making direct contact with the applicant. Please check the message board by the registration desk frequently. Messages concerning interviews will be posted there.

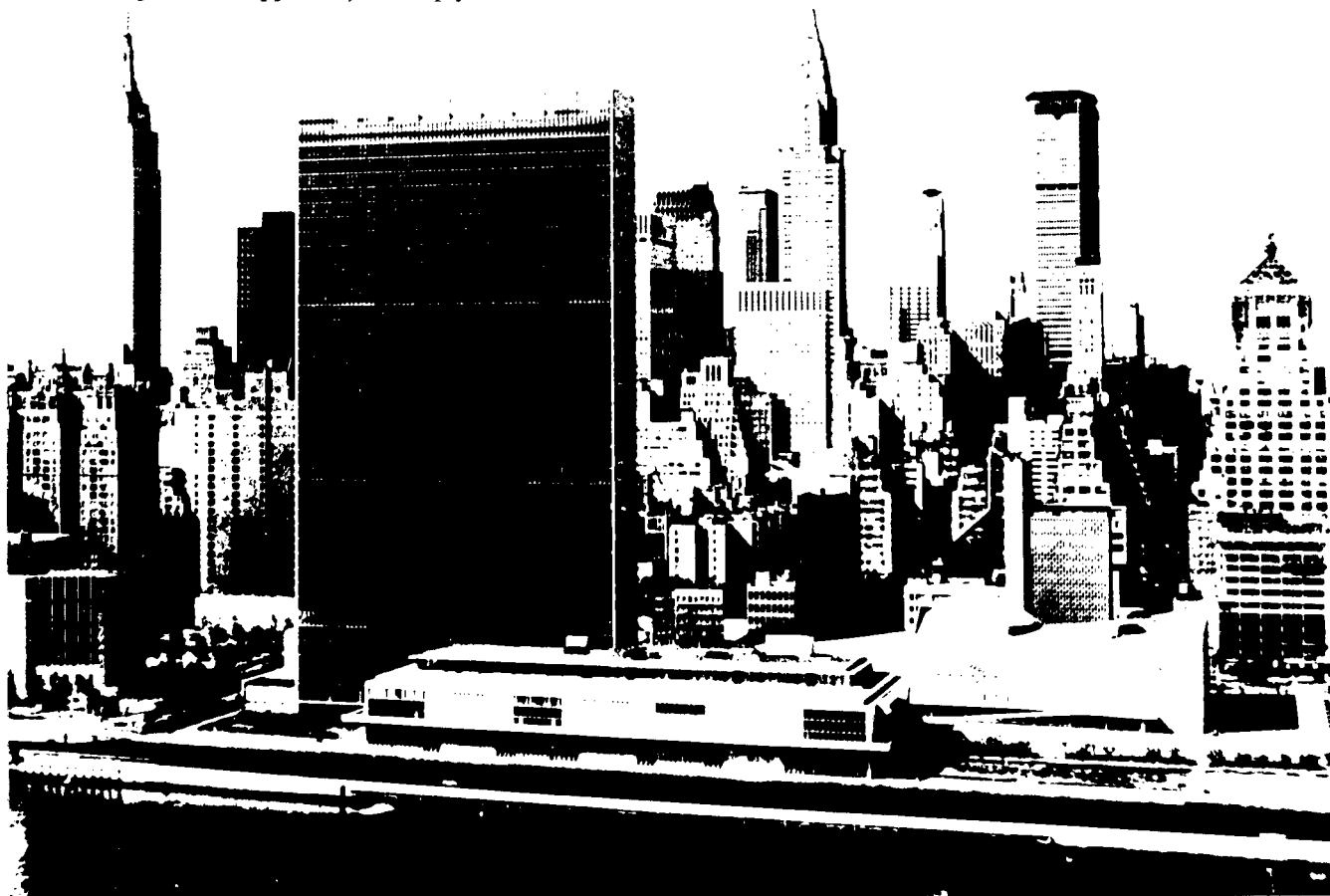

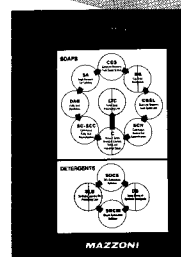
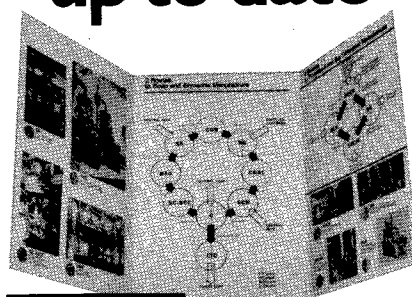
