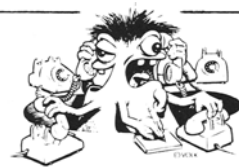

UOP Inc.'s Process Division has signed contracts with DETEN-Detergentes do Nordeste S.A. to design two process units for installation in the South American firm's facilities at Camacari, Bahia, Brazil. A Pacol Process Unit will produce normal olefins by catalytic dehydrogenation. The olefins will be feedstock for a Detergent Alkylate Process unit to produce 35,000 metric tons per year of linear alkylbenzene, which will be used to produce biodegradable detergents. The units are scheduled to be in use by 1981. ●

SURFACE CHEMICAL PROPERTIES OF BIOPOLYMERS DETERMINED BY CONTACT ANGLE MEASUREMENTS. K.S. Birdi and J. Jeppesen (Fysisk-Kemisk Inst., Tech. Univ., Lyngby, Denmark). *Colloid Polym. Sci.* 256(3), 261-5 (1978). The colloid chemical behavior of magnesium soaps in n-aliphatic alcohols was investigated at various temperatures by the conductivity method. The soaps form micellar aggregates and the c.m.c. determined is found independent of the nature of solvent.

C.M.C., COUNTERION BINDING AND THERMODYNAMICS OF ETHOXYLATED ANIONIC AND CATIONIC SURFACTANTS. B.W. Barry and R. Wilson (Portsmouth Polytech., England). *Colloid Polym. Sci.* 256(3), 251-60 (1978). The properties of a series of ionic ethoxylated surfactants were studied. Surface areas obtained from surface tension measurements increased as the ethoxy group number increased whereas increasing the hydrocarbon chain length had little effect. The c.m.c.'s obtained from conductivity decreased with increase in hydrocarbon chain length and to a smaller extent as the ethoxy group number increased.
