

Hawaii attractions

Organizers for the joint AOCS-JOCS meeting have scheduled a series of special events to complement the technical program to be presented in Honolulu.

Sports:

A golf tournament will be held Wednesday afternoon, May 14, 1986, at the Sheraton Makaha Resort and County Club. The fee of \$60 includes transportation to and from the club, green fees, lunch and prizes. Because of limited space and expected popularity of this event, you are encouraged to register early. You may register using the advance registration and hotel reservations form.

A tennis tournament will be held Wednesday afternoon, May 14, 1986, at the Sheraton Makaha Resort and Country Club. The fee of \$35 includes transportation to and from the site, court fee, lunch and prizes. You may register using the advance registration and hotel reservation form.

Participants in both these events will arrive at the Hilton Hawaiian Village by mid-afternoon on May 14 in time to participate in the annual AOCS business meeting and to attend the opening reception.

The Second Annual Fat People's Fun Run or Walk will be held Friday morning, May 16, 1986, on a five-kilometer course circling Ala Moana Park. Registration fee is \$8; early registrants will receive t-shirts; prizes will be awarded to top finishers. You may register using the advance registration and hotel reservation form.

Social events:

Three social events are included in the registration fee and there are two additional optional events.

The opening mixer on Wednesday evening will be at the Bishop's Museum, known for its collection of Pacific art and artifacts.

The annual awards breakfast will be Thursday morning, May 15, 1986, at the Hilton Hawaiian Village.

The third event included in the registration fee is an inaugural brunch to be held Sunday morning,

May 18, 1986 at the Hilton Hawaiian Village. The brunch will end in time for registrants to catch afternoon flights leaving Honolulu.

The first optional event is a Hawaiian luau cosponsored by the Japan Oil Chemists' Society. This event will be held Friday evening, May 16, 1986. Tickets are \$25 per person and may be ordered on the advance registration and hotel reservations form. The fee includes transportation to the luau grounds, traditional Hawaiian food and traditional entertainment.

The second optional event is an international party to be held Saturday evening, May 17, 1986. There will be food and entertainment from around the world. A dance band will provide music. Tickets are \$30 per person if purchased before April 7, or \$35 per person purchased April 8 or later. Organizers decided the informal atmosphere of Hawaii will be more conducive to an international party than to the customary annual meeting banquet.

Spouses:

A series of five events is included in the spouses' program.

On Wednesday, May 14, spouses may participate in the opening mixer to be held in the evening.

On Thursday, May 15, there will be a tour to the Punchbowl Crater, Queen Emma's Summer Palace, the state capitol, the Hawaiian War Memorial, the governor's residence, Iolani Palace and Kawaiaho Church. The tour will include a stop at Hilo Hattie's island and resort wear store. Lunch at the Monarch Room of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel is included.

On Friday, May 15, a tour will begin with stops at two landscaped gardens at Hawaiian homes, then continue to a family estate at the edge of a wildlife and bird sanctuary. Lunch will be served at the estate. After lunch, the tour will continue to Hanauma Bay, Makapuu Beach, Waimanalo Town, the Koolau mountain range and the Pali lookout before heading back to Waikiki.

On Saturday after breakfast, there will be a narrated display on the history of Hawaii as reflected in changing fashions of the island.

Spouses also may purchase tickets for the optional luau on Friday evening and the international party on Saturday evening. The Friday spouses' tour will return to Waikiki in time to permit participation in the luau. Saturday's program will end in ample time for shopping or relaxing before the international party.



What to wear

The Hawaii Visitors Bureau recommends you choose cool, comfortable traveling clothes for your trip to Hawaii: knit dress or pantsuit for women, lightweight pants and sport jacket for men.

Temperatures in Hawaii are in the 70s and 80s year-round. General list for women: comfortable pantsuit or coordinates, short-sleeved dress or skirt and blouse, shorts and tops, sweater, light jacket or stole for evening, cocktail dress for shows or formal affairs,

walking shoes, dress shoes, sandals, bathing suit. General list for men: comfortable slacks and sport jacket outfit with a tie, easy-care shirts, casual slacks, shorts, light outdoor jacket or sweater, walking shoes, dress shoes, bathing suit. Everyone is advised to bring sunglasses as well as a head covering for protection from the sun. Many Hawaiians walk umbrella-less through rain showers, but you'll need an umbrella to protect special hairdos or clothes.
