Erickson receives Bailey Award

The North Central AOCS Section's Alton E. Bailey Award presentation in Chicago in February became a father-son event, with Michael D. Erickson, section president, officially handing the award to his father, David R. Erickson.

The senior Erickson, who serves as director of technical services for international marketing for the American Soybean Association (ASA), is the 29th recipient of the annual award given by the section and named for the late Alton E. Bailey, a prolific author and researcher who served as the first editor of Bailey's Industrial Oil and Fat Products. Erickson was selected to receive the award for his research and international contributions to the edible oils industry.



we stand on the shoulders of others." Erickson expressed appreciation to those who have helped shape his life—his wife, Judy, to whom he has been married 38 years; Bailey's legacy; previous Bailey winners; those with whom or for whom he had worked; other colleagues in the fats and oils industry.

Talking about his work at ASA, Erickson said the main goal is "to do those things that make soybean farming more profitable by lowering production costs, increasing demand for soybeans, or both." ASA's international market development activities are implemented by 11 offices outside the U.S. with projects in 83 countries. As director of technical services international marketing, for Erickson helps promote the processing and use of soybean products overseas. This includes one-onone plant visits as well as group seminars.

Commenting on the experience gained and people he has met in his work, Erickson said, "I've learned as much as I've had to pass on." He also had some travel tips: the more you travel, the less you take with you ("My wife has taught me to go around the world with only carry-on baggage"); a sense of humor is necessary ("You have to be nice to customs officials"); don't get behind young people wearing jeans who have long hair and guitars; wear a tie and coat; travel full-fare.

Those on ASA business travel

under the auspices of the Foreign Agricultural Service, Erickson said, adding, "The hotels aren't first class but they're more interesting.' When on overseas assignments, Erickson said he has had to learn not to use English slang nor to patronize. "You have to be aware of cultural differences. Also, you can't make equipment recommendations unreservedly. It's best to go to basics." Everywhere, he said, is the quest for the "magic process or product." But, he added, sometimes what is "best" may not be what companies want (i.e., cheapest may be their goal).

"The best experience is to tell people something and they do it, and when you come back, they thank you because it works," Erickson said.

His work has made him realize that Americans "take a lot of things for granted"—including good quality water, telephone service and reliable electric power. It also has made him realize cultural differences: "We think of ideas to reduce labor; in other parts of the world, the whole thrust is to use more labor." Processing conditions and the access to literature on research developments vary as well.

Erickson's slides included views of Tokyo, Seoul, Beijing, Jakarta, Calcutta, Singapore, Malaysia, Egypt, Kenya, Vienna, Prague, Moscow, Warsaw, Portugal, Mexico and Ecuador.
