

The A. O. C. S. Bowling Tournament, Chicago, October 12, 1933

The Seventh Annual Fall Meeting of the A. O. C. S. at Chicago brings with it, as one of the major social events, the Annual Bowling Tournament.

This year, at the suggestion of President Harris, the Local Committee has broadened the scope of activities for the evening by including a dinner and bridge party in the evening's program. All of these events will take place at the beautiful Medinah Michigan Avenue Club, located at 505 North Michigan avenue, on Thursday evening, October 12, the first evening of the convention.



The Medinah Michigan Avenue Club is one of the show spots of Chicago, with recreational facilities second to none. The club building, which is one of Chicago's newer skyscrapers, is in itself worthy of a tour of inspection. It is topped by an observation tower which is the highest point in Chicago.

The evening activities will start with dinner in the Minaret Room on the tenth floor at 6 p. m. This dinner will be an informal get-together of A. O. C. S. members, their wives and friends. A special menu has been prepared by Eugene Bouillet, Maitre de' hotel, but at the same time, the expense has been kept down to the nominal sum of \$1.00 per plate. Wives of members will be the guests of the Local Committee of the society at this dinner. This informal affair was suggested by an impromptu dinner party gotten up during the last Chicago meeting, which was a decided success and afforded a great deal of pleasure to those who happened to be there. This year all are urged to attend as perhaps no greater opportunity will present itself, during the meeting, to mingle in a social way with so many friends engaged in the same scientific field.

At 7:30 the Bowling Tourney and the bridge party will start. Those who do not bowl are invited to play bridge or any other card game which interests them. The Local Ladies' Committee will see to it that this card party will be a lively affair.

The Bowling Tournament, of course, will be the bright spot of the evening. Last year the Amaizos, of the

The Swift Premium team, runner up last year, is determined to win this year. However, the Armour team, the Procter & Gamble Ivories, Lever Lifebuoys, Daiggers, Industrial Nuchars, and others are equally determined and the results will be in doubt until the last ball is rolled.

In addition to the five-man events, there will be singles and double events with a long list of useful merchandise prizes for winners. A blind handicap event assures the poorest contestant a chance to win a prize.

The alleys at the Medinah Club are in fine condition and are reserved exclusively for the use of our society for the evening.

It will assist the committee greatly if entries for bowling and reservations for dinner are received ahead of time, however, entries can be made at any time up to 10 a. m., October 12.
