The eighth Fall Meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society, which is set for October 11 and 12 at the Medinah Club in Chicago, will offer the best scientific program ever presented. The scientific program this year is also the most extensive yet presented and three sessions will be required for this interesting program.

Registration will start at 9:00 a. m. and the meeting will be called to order by President Hutchins at 9:30 a. m. The morning session will be devoted very largely to papers and committee reports on soap and soap materials. At the Thursday afternoon session, papers covering the oil and fat field will be taken up and continued through the Friday session which will convene at 9:30 a. m.

Aside from the scientific program, the local committee has endeavored this year to cater to the desires and wishes of all of our members and friends. 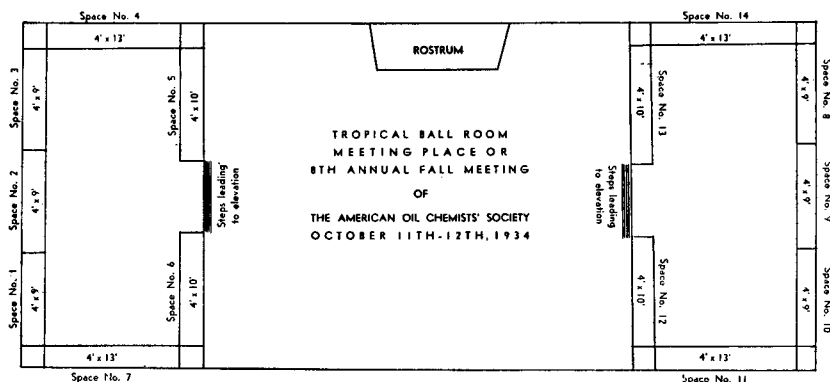
