PRESIDENT'S REPORT

CHARING in the economic recovery of the country the Society has made gratifying progress during the past year.

Our membership has reached a total of over 400 and the industries represented are more than ever varied. The faith and vision of the small group of oil mill and refinery chemists who founded the Society is rewarded to an extent that must be amazing to them. It is now truly a national body and recognition of this fact must, in time, be reflected in many phases of its operation.

Financial progress, as shown by Mr. Helm, has been sound. Practically all the ground lost in the depression years has been re-

For the second year in succession the Journal has been self supporting. The Journal Committee deserves our thanks, and to its chairman, Mr. Irwin, we must acknowledge a permanent indebtedness. Such interest as he

has shown cannot be bought and it is a source of satisfaction to us all that his efforts have been crowned with success. Mr. Irwin's long illness has been a source of sadness to his many friends in the Society.

The Fall Meeting in Chicago presented a new record for Society Meetings. With a registration of 215 and a strong program a standard is set for the coming years. Again, we must thank Mr. Irwin and his associates of the local committee who organized this meeting in its every detail.

I would like to express now my thanks to those active members with whom I have had much contact. Their willingness to serve and advise has made my term of office a most pleasant one.

Committee work for the year has been satisfactory. As previous officers have noted, the focal point of our interest shifts from year to year, and invariably such interest induces constructive effort. This year the refining committee has done an immense amount of work on the refining of soybean oils.

Two new committees were appointed during the year. A committee to collect, compile and publish data on Oil Characteristics, and a committee to study our methods for the determination of Total Fatty Acids in Acid Soap Stocks. This first committee will have a long-time job which should be of interest to many of us. The chairman of the second committee, starting late through no fault of his, promises a report at the Fall Meeting.

The future may be expected to

produce organization problems incident to the greater size and scope of the Society. The time is not far gone when the membership was to a considerable extent personally acquainted. Committee appointments are simple when each member's interests are known. That is now changed, and, if we are to get the best results from the plentiful supply of talent in the Society, new methods of discovery must be used. I feel sure that each committee chairman would welcome the advice that any of you are interested in the work of his committee. Only by some such scheme will we have the strongest working

committees.

There will be no dearth of problems. You will notice, for instance, a paper listed in the program dealing with evaluation of lint. Such work is being done regularly by several laboratories in the cotton belt, yet a guess of a few years back as to future analytical work would hardly have included this by-product as a likely prospect.

The Society may well face the future confidently. Its yearly growth, both in numbers and interests, proves the soundness of its basic ideals and points to years ahead of increasing power

and influence.
