## Preliminary Program Announced for New York City Fall Meeting

ARLY program details for the 22nd annual fall meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society, to be held in New York City at the Hotel Pennsylvania on November 15-17, 1948, are announced by H. W. Vahlteich, program chairman, Best Foods inc.,

Bayonne, N. J. There will be a three-day technical program, with emphasis on the glyceridic oil field, by various experts, also a splendid array of events and trips for the wives of members and guests. In addition, the Governing Board will meet on Sunday afternoon for its semiannual action on Society affairs, and several technical committees will either report to the membership or hold meetings for dis-

Monday morning will start off with soap papers after the usual introductory remarks; in the after-

noon there will be a general session, addressed by four speakers. C. G. King, scientific director of the Nutrition Foundation, will talk on glyceridic oils in nutrition. G. E. Hilbert, chief of bureau in charge of the U.S.D.A. Regional Research Laboratories, will discuss "Glyceridic Oils in Our National Economy" in relation to the profound economic and technologic changes observable in the post-war adjustments, bringing out the part played by the research program of the government laboratories. A. M. Gilbert of Davis and Gilbert, attorneys-at-law, will discuss certain aspects of "Food Standardization After 10 Years Under the New Food and Drug Law," pointing to glyceridic oil foods. Foster D. Snell, general chairman of the fall meeting, of Foster D. Snell inc. will present a discussion, interpretation, and review of soaps in relation to the newer detergents.

The remaining half-day sessions on Tuesday and Wednesday will comprise four group papers, one each from the following: regional research laboratories of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the field of glyceridic oils in nutrition, drying oils, and one other subject or group of subjects to be announced.

The final technical program will be announced in the October issue, according to Mr. Vahlteich. Printed programs will be available at the meeting, including abstracts. Members of the Society will also receive a mailing from the national headquarters, with information about hotel reservations, which should be made direct with the Pennsylvania, program, transportation, exhibits, and so on. Those whose wives will accompany them are asked to notify Mrs. Foster D. Snell, chairman of the ladies' entertainment committee, so that reservations may be made for them at the ladies' events.



In the absence of Mr. Agee the Oil Color Committee meeting will be presided over by Procter Thomson, with the report of the subcommittee on the development of a colorimeter as the special business, preliminary to a report to the Uniform Methods Committee at the New Orleans meeting in May.
