

margarine, and all animal fats. As announced in the March issue of the Journal, the lectures all open at 8 a.m. daily, and the schedule is as follows:

August 15—Economics, chemistry, and composition in the morning; tour of the university's south farms in the afternoon; and get-acquainted hour in the evening.
