

San Francisco Members Welcome Fall Meeting This Month

THREE days of technical papers, social events such as Tuesday dinner at Di Maggio's on Fisherman's Wharf, banquet on Wednesday, opera on Thursday, plus sight-seeing, Hawaiian tea, and Chinatown for the ladies, and a plant trip on Friday are among the outstanding attractions of the 24th annual fall meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society to be held in San Francisco on September 25-29, 1950 at the Sir Francis Drake hotel. E. B. Kester of the Western Regional Research Laboratory is chairman, and H. S. Olcott, also of WRRL, is program chairman. On Monday there will be pre-registration, 5 o'clock tea and reception for the early birds, and a meeting of the Governing Board, over which President J. R. Mays Jr. will preside.


