

Registrations Flowing in for 1952 Short Course

EGISTRATIONS for the 1952 short course on soaps and synthetic detergents, to be held at Rutgers University July 6-11, are picking up momentum, and the enrolment of 200 will doubtless be reached some time in June, according to J. P. Harris, chairman of the Education Committee, and Foster Dee Snell, chairman of the short course itself. complete program was published in the May issue of the Journal, and there are only two changes: a) the plant trips will start at 1:30 p. m. instead of 2 o'clock; and b) R. C. Stillman, not C. P. Long, will give the paper Friday morning, July 11, on "Analysis of Soaps.

Students are expected to live on campus, and assignment of rooms is made by the Society office upon acceptance. The fee of \$90 (\$50 for room and board, \$40 for registration) should be sent to the American Oil Chemists' Society, 35 E. Wacker drive, Chicago 1, Ill. Demarest hall will be used for housing. Meals will be served in the Commons across the street, and lectures will be given in the Engineering auditorium one block away.

University officials cooperating with the Society are M. A. Chaffee, director of the University Extension Division, and P. A. van der Meulen, head of the chemical division.

A registration and mixer at 8 p. m. Sunday, July 6, will start the week, and all students are asked to report by Sunday, ready for the opening lecture at 8:30 a. m. Monday. Each afternoon except Wednesday will be given over to plant trips to the following: Colgate-Palmolive-Peet Company, Jersey City, N. J.; Lever Brothers Company, Edgewater, N. J.; J. Howard Smith, Port Newark, N. J.; and Woburn Chemical Corporation, Kearny, N. J.
