## Houston Meeting Proves To Be a Great Success

TEXANS proved themselves to be admirable hosts in arranging for the 43rd annual meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society April 28-30, 1952, at the Shamrock hotel in Houston, Tex., with William Argue as general chairman and John L. Schnake as assistant chairman. From the swimming pool party on the 27th, through the barbecue supper at Mae's Ranch, an establishment on the outskirts of the city, the dinner dance on Tuesday in the Emerald room of the hotel, to the awards luncheon on Wednesday, there was gaiety, stimulus, and good fellowship.

Attendance was 521, a record for a spring meeting, it is believed. Broken down, the figures show 278 members, 99 non-members (including exhibitors), 18 students from Texas A & M, and 126 women. Twenty-eight states and Washington, D. C., were represented in the membership and these foreign countries: Brazil, Canada, Mexico, and Panama.

The Houston convention committee comprised, in addition to Messrs. Argue and Schnake, J. D. Lindsay, J. K. Dixon, A. C. Wamble, K. K. Keneaster, G. M. Kreutzer, W. J. Pais, Andrew Spence, A. E. Richey, W. D. Harris, A. R. Greenlaw, P. A. Williams, H. D. Fincher, and C. M. Lyman.

The Governing Board met twice, on Sunday afternoon for the outgoing group, and Wednesday afternoon and evening, for the incoming group, with A. E. Bailey and E. M. James as respective presiding officers. Various committees met during the convention, and there were two business sessions: one on Monday morning and one on Wednesday afternoon. The former dealt with report of officers and committee chairmen, and the latter with reports and the installation of officers.

M ONDAY'S session was called to order at 10 a.m. Minutes of the 42nd annual meeting were dispensed with, on motion of J. R. Mays Jr. and R. T. Milner. Following the report of the secretary, T. H. Hopper, and of the treasurer, J. J. Vollertsen, President Bailey read his address. The executive secretary, Mrs. Lucy R. Hawkins, made a brief report to supplement the report available in mimeographed form, and Mr. James presented an interim report for the Membership Committee. For the Journal there were reports from A. R. Baldwin, chairman of the Journal Committee, and A. E. MacGee, chairman of the Advertising Committee.

On behalf of the Education Committee Francis Scofield substituted for J. P. Harris, chairman. Next was given the report of the Nominating and Election Committee by Mr. Mays: E. M. James for president; Procter Thomson for vice president; T. H. Hopper for secretary; J. J. Vollertsen for treasurer; and A. R. Baldwin, W. A. Peterson, and N. A. Ruston for membersat-large. R. W. Bates spoke for the Referee Examining Board and the Smalley Committee, as chairman of each. Assisting Procter Thomson in a report for the Oil Color Committee was Seymour Goldwasser. Thomson asked for a showing of hands as to preference for going on with experimentation with the spectrophotometer vs. relying on the Lovibond glasses, and the vote was 80 to 35 for the former.

The report of the Refining Committee was given by Mr. James, and he was followed by G. W. Agee, who presented six resolutions in tribute to deceased members: Felix Paquin, Alan Porter Lee, Carl Victor Serbell, Frank C. Vibrans, M. C. Folzenlogen, and Ernest H. Chapin. He then read a special tribute to the late Mr. Paquin, charter member and first president of the Society.

The second business session was devoted to reports by a) the Chemists' Committee of the National Cottonseed Products Association; b) the Chemists' Committee of the National Soybean Producers Association; c) the Uniform Methods Committee, of which J. T. R. Andrews is chairman; and d) to other reports and the installation of officers.

IN accordance with the custom adopted in recent years, the Felix Paquin key was given to the outgoing president, Mr. Bailey. Presentation was made at the dinner dance by J. K. Dixon, master of ceremonies, on Tuesday evening.

The Past Presidents' dinner was held on Monday at the Petroleum club, atop the Rice hotel in downtown Houston. It was agreed to place an enlarged photograph of the late Mr. Paquin in the national headquarters of the Society.

For the free afternoon Tuesday there were three official offerings: plant trips to the Imperial Sugar Company, Sugarland, Tex., and to the Champion Paper Company, Pasadena, Tex., as well as the traditional golf tournament with its tremendous array of prizes.
