

Offer Balanced Program at New Orleans Meeting

⁴HE technical program to be given at the 44th annual spring meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society at

New Orleans, on May 4-6, 1953, is developing rapidly, ac-cording to T. H. Hopper, program chairman. Present indications are that the program will achieve a balance between applied and background research dealing with processing of oilseeds and processing of oils as well as the chemistry and chemical modification of fats and oils.

Headquarters will be at the Roosevelt hotel. The hotel chairman, A. F. Freeman, Southern Regional Research Laboratory, 2100 Robert E. Lee blvd., New Orleans, La., reports gratifying early requests for hotel reservations and indicates that accommodations are being assigned as requests are received. Confirmation will be provided by the hotel. The hotels require the name of the person in whose name each room will be registered, the type of room, the number of persons for each room, and the dates of arrival and departure. The Hotel Association of New Orleans has allotted 175 rooms at the Roosevelt and 15 rooms each at the St. Charles, Jung, and Monteleone hotels.

Mrs. C. H. Fisher, chairman, and her Ladies' Program Committee are arranging an outstanding program of diversified entertainment. Arrangements have been made for a tour on May 4 of the antebellum homes in the world-famous garden district of New Orleans. A style show on the U.S.S. Del Mar, the Mississippi Shipping Company's luxury liner, and a tour of the International Trade Mart with its exhibits from foreign lands are features for the second day. In addition, a luncheon at Antoine's in the old-world atmosphere of the French Quarter is scheduled on the last day of the convention. The traditional past presidents' dinner will be held on Mon-

day, May 4, 1953, at Commander's Palace. Tuesday social events will comprise the annual golf tournament and the dinner dance.

The regular business meeting of the Society for the transaction of business, announcement of election results, and so on will be held during the week. Various committees will also be scheduled for conferences. President E. M. James will preside at a meeting of the Governing Board on Sunday afternoon, and his successor, Procter Thomson, will take the chair at the meeting of the incoming board at the close of the convention. Local Sections Proposed

A statement by the secretary of the American Oil Chemists' Society, T. H. Hopper, along with a proxy ballot were mailed to the active members on February 13, 1953, to carry out the recommendation of a special committee on the establishment of local sections and the action of the Governing Board. It has been proposed (see page 22 of the December, 1952, issue) to add Article XIV to the by-laws to provide for local sections. Results of the vote will be announced at the annual meeting in New Orleans on May 4-6, 1953.
