

Recommended for glassware which requires manual or mechanical shaking such as Van Slyke Apparatus, Separatory Funnels, etc., and to improve the efficiency of stopcocks on Burettes, Gas Analysis Apparatus, etc. Clip does not interfere with normal manipulation of the stopcock handle.

3291-B. Stopcock Tension Clips, as above described. Distal edge of the groove in plug must be at least 1/16-inch beyond stopcock shell for satisfactory use.
