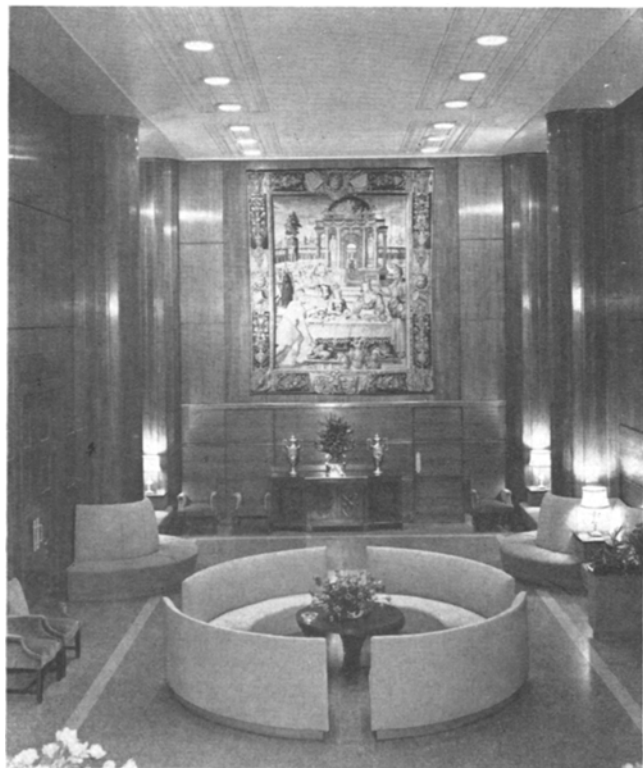

Complete Plans for New Orleans Meeting This Month

FINAL ARRANGEMENTS for the 46th Annual Meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society have been completed, according to R. M. Persell, general chairman of the Local Committee. The meeting, which will be held in New Orleans on April 17-20, 1955,

with headquarters at the Roosevelt hotel, will combine an outstanding technical program with numerous entertainment features for both the chemists and their ladies, featuring the old world charm and the atmosphere of gracious living so characteristic of modern New Orleans.

The first social event, scheduled for Sunday evening, April 17, will be a mixer permitting those in attendance to greet old and new friends. The mixer, which is sponsored by the Southern Cotton Oil Company (the Wesson Oil people) will be held

in the world-famous International House. On Monday evening the Past Presidents' dinner will be held. The traditional golf tournament will take place on the afternoon of April 19 at the Metairie Country club. For those not interested in golf a harbor tour on the Dock Board's luxury yacht Good Neighbor has been arranged. Following these events the annual banquet and dance is scheduled for Tuesday evening in the Grand ballroom of the Roosevelt. The Award luncheon will also be held at the headquarters hotel at noon on Wednesday.


