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

Proxy Voting on By-Law Changes Nears 1,000

THE RESPONSE of active members of the American Oil Chemists' Society to the request of the special committee on constitution and by-laws for proxies for or against proposed changes has been gratifying, with nearly 1,000 forms received by mid-October.

The suggested amendments are concerned with making possible more flexibility in the setting of fees, establishing an active junior membership classification, setting up a policy for deciding a tie vote for any office, making certain changes in procedure for the Referee Examining Board, and bringing the amendment on meetings of the Society into agreement with actual practice. Changes in the by-laws are proposed to implement the amendments to the constitution.

Announcement of the results of the proxy voting will be made at the spring meeting in New Orleans, La., and in the meantime every active member is urged to sign and return his proxy, with his vote indicated, to the Chicago office of the Society. A favorable vote of two-thirds of the ENTIRE active membership, present in person or by written proxy, is required to approve the constitutional amendments.

The flavor laboratory of Arthur D.
