Barrow and Cox Die

WITHIN ONE DAY of each other two former executives at Barrow-Agee Laboratories died: E. R. Barrow, co-founder of the firm, charter member (1909) and president of the American Oil Chemists' Society (1912–13); and C. H. Cox (1916), retired chief chemist of the firm, president of the Society (1938–39). Mr. Cox had been making his home in Mary Esther, Fla., but died on December 9, 1956, in Houston; Mr. Barrow died on December 10 in Memphis. Mr. Barrow was 78, and Mr. Cox 70 years of age. Both had served on several committees of the Society, and the former had been on the Refining Committee from 1916 to 1946.

Mr. Barrow retired in 1954 as vice president and secretary-treasurer of the Barrow-Agee Laboratories but had continued as consultant and member of the board.

C. A. Heilmann Dies

Charles A. Heilmann (1955), assistant superintendent, Kamen Soap Products Company, Barberton, O., died on November 4, 1956, after a long and painful illness. He had previously been a member of the American Oil Chemists' Society in 1948-49.
