APPROVAL of a short course on synthetic detergents, to be held in the East in the summer of 1958, with Foster Dee Snell of New York as chairman,

was given by the Governing Board of the American Oil Chemists' Society to the Education Committee, of which K. F. Mattil is chairman, at the April 28 meeting in New Orleans, with T. H. Hopper presiding.

At this meeting it was announced that C. A. Smith, Perkins Oil Company, Memphis, would be chairman of the spring meeting in 1958 in Memphis and that co-chairmen of the 1958 fall meeting in Chicago would be C. W. Hoerr and A. A. Rodeghier.

Appointments were an important order of business at the May 1 meeting of the Board, at which H. C. Black presided:

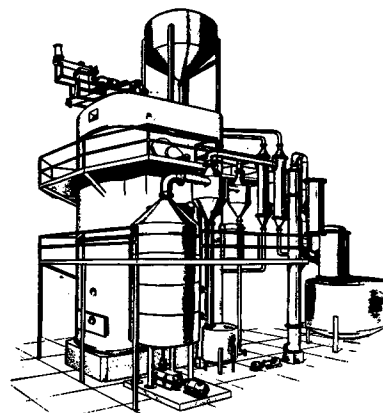

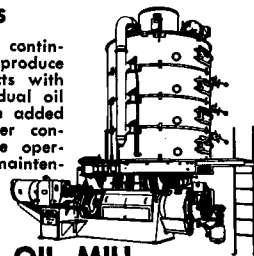
