## Editor Reports Journal Progress to Membership

TN INFORMAL REPORTS to the Governing Board on April 28, 1957 and to the membership on the 29th at the 48th annual meeting of the American Oil Chemists' Society in New Orleans, A. R. Baldwin, chairman of the Journal Committee and editor of the Journal, discussed circulation, advertising, editorial contents, and so on.

Circulation was at an all-time high of nearly 4,600 divided between 2,500 members and 2,050 subscribers, he said. Advertising revenue also was good; editorial pages in 1956 were the same as in 1955: 668. The short course papers had been published in two installments, in October and November 1956. In addition, the March issue carried a symposium on technical

safety and April, a symposium on detergents.

The revised style sheet for authors was nearly ready, he commented, and new instructions were being prepared for reviewers. The new system of associate editors was working well. There were about 125 to 150 reviewers for manuscripts. Foreign papers were being given special attention and help. Dorothy Rathmann had prepared the annual subject index for the December issue.

He complimented the abstracts editor, R. A. Reiners, and the abstractors for their work, J. P. Harris for the handling of technical correspondence, and M. M. Piskur for the preparation, with a committee, of the Annual Review of Literature.

Volumes 1-24 of the Journal were to be reproduced by the Johnson Reprint Company, also by the J. S. Canner Company in microcard form, he said.
