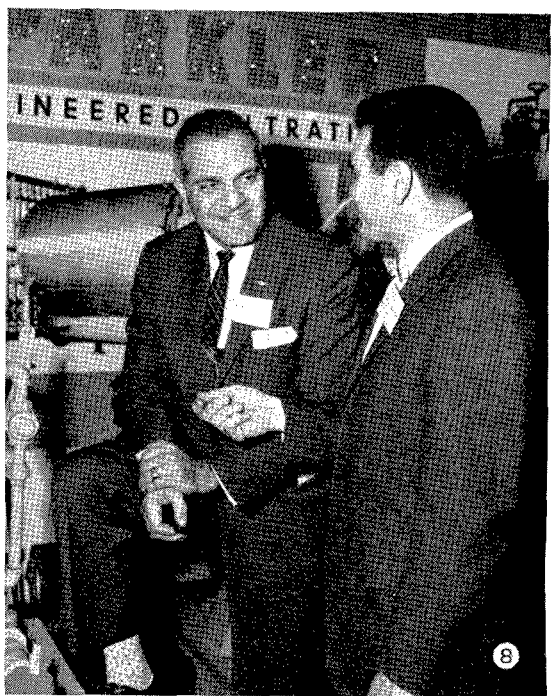
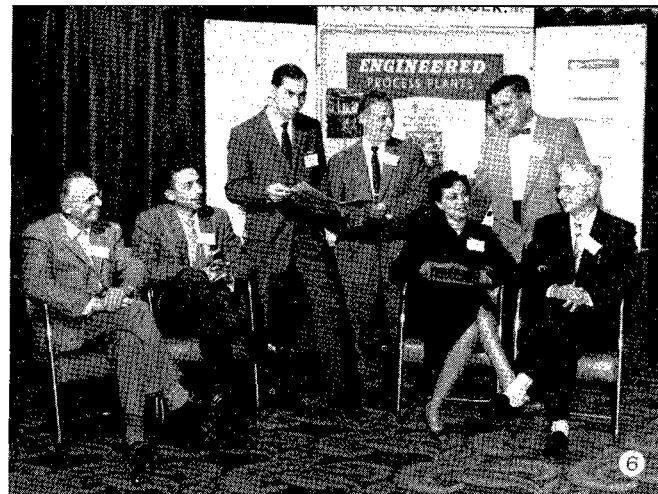
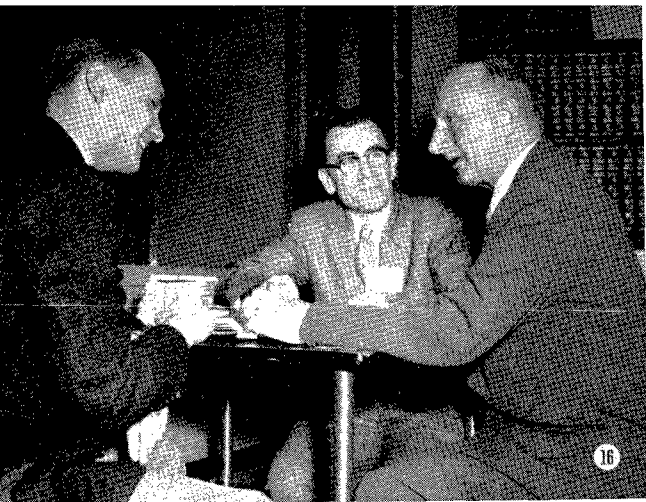


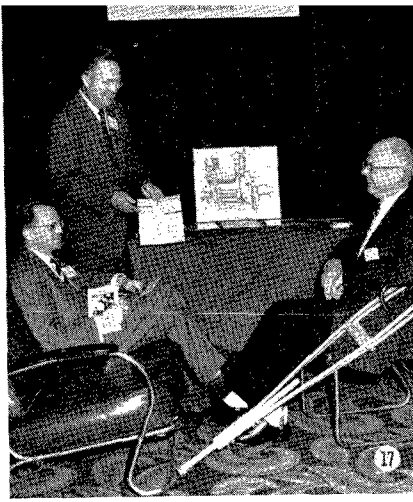

Instrument Provides Remote Control

REMOTE CONTROL of liquid level in tanks of any type is facilitated by a new, low-cost Liquid Level Indicator developed by the Torresdale Company, Dept. 121, 7844 Montgomery avenue, Elkins Park, Philadelphia 17, Pa.

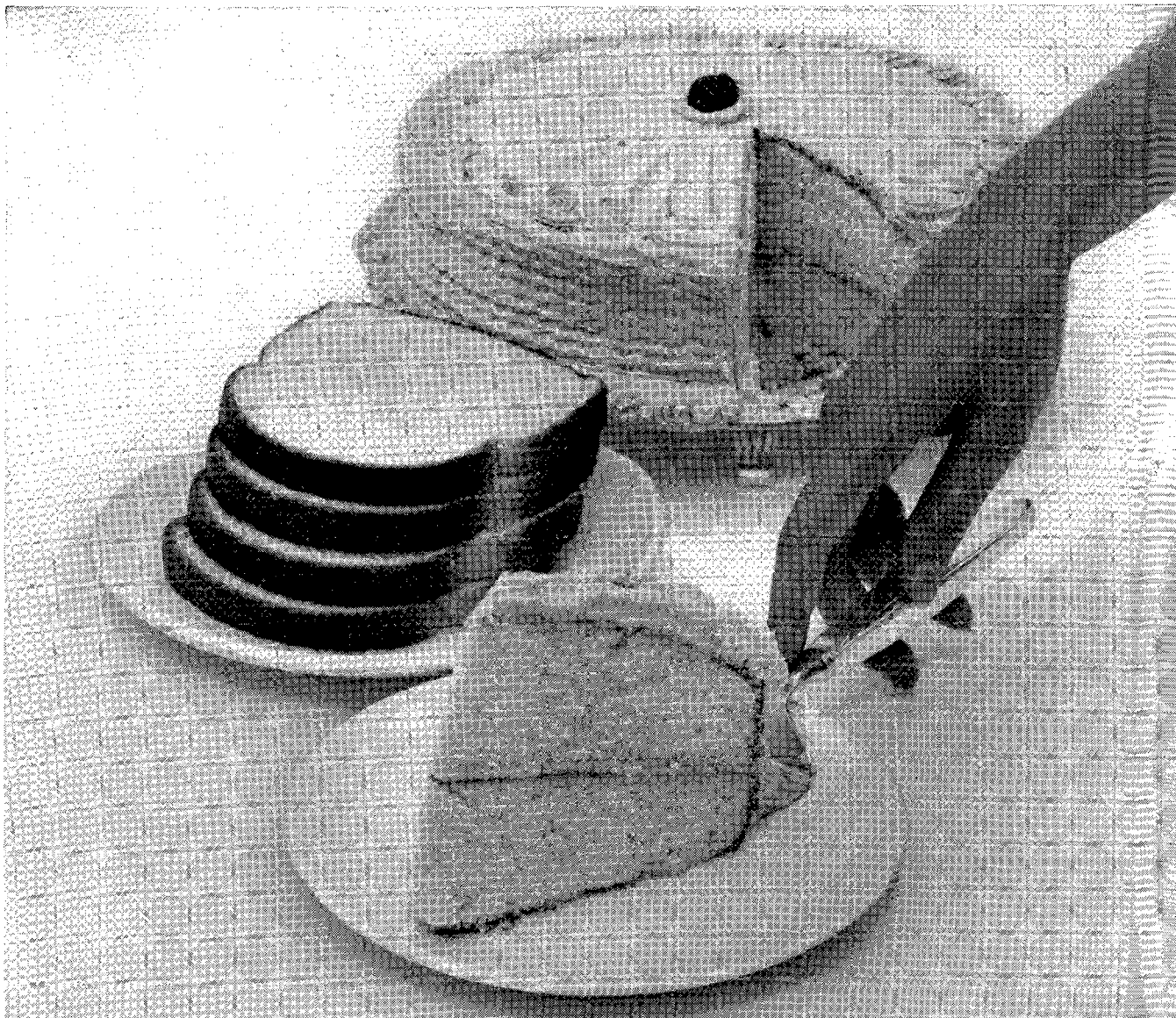
Adapted to vegetable oil, chemicals, food products, or any other fluid, the Indicator provides an instant, continuous visual check of fluid level on a graduated meter scale. Any number of tanks or vessels can be supervised from a remote control station, using one or more units. Accuracy is set at $\pm 5\%$.

The sensing element is attached to any tank by means of a simple pipe plug. Basically it is a pressure-operated resistance network that works in the range of 0 to 3,000 p.s.i. and operates on less than 6 volts A.C., thereby eliminating the necessity for code installation.

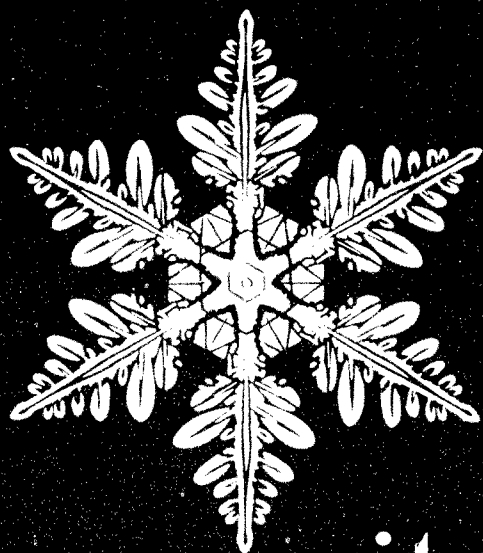
