Bennett Honored at Luncheon

AN ATTENDANCE of 531, a technical program of 56 papers, diversified entertainment for the ladies, and unusually convenient hotel facilities marked the first Los Angeles convention of the American Oil Chemists' Society, otherwise known as the 33rd annual fall meeting, at the Statler Hilton, September 28–30, 1959. Co-chairmen were H. C. Bennett and L. O. Leenerts; Roslyn B. Alfin-Slater was program chairman, Mrs. Leenerts ladies' chairman.

Of the 531, there were 297 members, 80 nonmembers, 18 speakers, 50 exhibitors, and 86 ladies. California led, of course, in the number of registrations, but 18 other states were represented and the District of Columbia. Eight foreign countries were included: Australia, Brazil, Burma, Canada, England, India, Mexico, and Sweden.

A special feature of the meeting was the retirement luncheon Wednesday in honor of Mr. Bennett (1918), technical director, who will leave the Los Angeles Soap Company at the end of December, completing 45 years of service. For fun there was a mock cake adorned with miniature trappings of retirement; and for tribute there was a handsome camera case. Mr. Leenerts presided, and N. D. Embree, president of the Society, spoke; then Mr. Bennett responded. Comments about the very active professional and Society career of Mr. Bennett were made by Mr. Leenerts, who quoted from the July 1919 issue of the Cotton Oil Press and from the February 1959 issue of The Wash Rag, house organ.

Dr. Embree presided at the opening session on Monday morning. Rex E. Layton, liaison officer for Mayor Norris Poulson, spoke briefly about the glories of Los Angeles, mentioning that their water was brought from far-off places and they had the greatest aqueduct system in the country and that the area ranked third in the country in the value of manufactured products.

Social events included the mixer Sunday evening in the Golden State room, a cocktail party Monday in the Pacific ballroom through the courtesy of Distillation Products Industries and Eastman Chemical Products Inc., and the dinner-dance Tuesday, also in the Pacific ballroom.

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
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
