D. They are A. E. Rheineck, professor of coatings technology at the college; S. O. Greenlee of Greenlee Research Company; Frank P. Greenspan, Food Machinery and Chemicals Corporation; D. E. Whyte, S. C. Johnson and Son Inc.; L. O. Cummings, Pacific Vegetable Oil Corporation; and L. E. Gast, Agricultural Research Service, Northern Utilization and Development Division, U.S.D.A.
