St. Louis Events Outlined

THE 52ND ANNUAL MEETING of the American Oil Chemists' Society, which is to be held at the Sheraton-Jefferson hotel, St. Louis, Mo., May 1 through May 3, 1961, promises an excellent, well-balanced program with social events and technical sessions scheduled so as to offer an interesting and timely meeting for all delegates.

Mrs. Sue Metcalf, wife of the general chairman, is preparing a most attractive program for the ladies and anticipates an excellent turn-out. Sightseeing tours, fashion shows, and other activities are being planned, and a ladies' hospitality room will be open in the Sheraton-Jefferson during the entire meeting.

In order to by-pass as much red tape as possible, advance registration cards will be sent out in March. Hotel reservation blanks will be included so that even the usual line-up at the room clerk's desk for assignment will be eliminated. Four hundred rooms have been set aside at the hotel, and reservations may be made either by advance reservation cards or by direct request to the hotel. 
The usual committee and Board meetings will be held on Sunday afternoon, April 30, and the traditional mixer is scheduled for that evening.
