Atlanta, the resurgent city, is sited in a locale that a little better than a century ago was marked only as a crossing of Indian trails which wandered over the forested hills; next by roads for oxcarts, then, as a railroad center, a highway crossing, and presently an air line center.

Now Atlanta welcomes the Spring Meeting of the AOCS, and waits to receive those who will attend, as they


converge here by road, rail, and air.

The ready adaptation to change in transport has characterized much of the commercial and industrial development of the City. It was an early center for the production of commercial fertilizers, an industry which later contributed much to the agricultural revolution. The infant vegetable oil industry, struggling through technological growth pains, had an important outpost here. The soft drink industry, now such a familiar part of the American scene, leans heavily on early Atlanta enterprise. From these early beginnings a diversified and busy industry has kept pace with the growth and development of a large metropolitan area.

Atlanta, the Convention City of the Southeast, offers visitors to the Spring Meeting many attractions. April finds the area in perhaps its finest dress. For though the dogwoods will have passed their annual show period, other

spring flowers should be at their loveliest.

Many points of interest are dispersed over the metropolitan area. The Cyclorama and numerous marked sites
