# April 24, 1966

 $\Gamma$  HE LAST MEETING of the 1965–66 Governing Board, largely concerned with progress reports of the various committees, convened at 1:15 p.m. with all members of the Board present.

President Harris' report to the Board has appeared in the Journal (May 1 p. 231A). Vice-President Hoerr's report as Chairman of the Membership Committee emphasized the need for the members to increase the Society roll. Secretary Cowan reported on forward meeting cities and dates, and these will appear in the Journal. Treasurer Kapecki's interim budget and year-end audit were accepted by the Board. Mr. Kapecki suggested a number of measures which could increase the Society revenue and supplement reserves.

Los Angeles General Chairman Leenerts reported that preregistration met all expectations and that near-record

attendance could be expected.

Cincinnati General Chairman Zilch reported on the Fall Meeting with a complete report and audit. Total registration was 793, with a net revenue of \$13,062.49, a welcome addition to the Society account.

Mr. Shea, representing General Chairman Wrigley of the Philadelphia Fall Meeting, reported that a program of 117 papers is to be anticipated, that about 820 registrants may be expected, with a net revenue of \$10,325 to the Society. A capacity total of 48 exhibit booths have been sold. The Bellevue-Stratford Hotel has arranged for a block of 500 rooms for the membership.

Referee Board Chairman Doughtie reported that 65 certifications were issued from June 1, 1965 through May 31, 1966. Demand for certification of qualified chemists for cellulose yield on cotton linters has resulted in the Smalley Committee inaugurating a new series of 10 samples of linters. It is anticipated that requests for certification of foreign collaborators may increase, thus increasing the Society status abroad. The following associations require that their Official Chemists be certified by the Examination Board: National Cottonseed Products Assn., National Soybean Processors Assn., and the National Renderers Assn.

Uniform Methods Committee Chairman Dan Henry asked for and was given approval of Tentative Method TX 1a-65T.

Smalley Committee Chairman Miller reported the award of 30 certificates based on eleven sample series.

Chairman Pelick of the AOCS Award in Lipid Chemistry reported selection of a recipient, to be announced

Successful operation of the Executive Committee, which acts on interim problems, was reported by Chairman Harris.

A comprehensive Executive Secretary's report was presented by Mr. Hauber and was accepted by the Board. Considerable discussion of the adequacy of the current Headquarters indicated that recent remodeling had improved efficiency of operations. An adjacent small office is under consideration should it become available.

The MacGee Honored Student Program was reported by Executive Secretary Hauber as progressing satisfactorily in solicitation of funds from supporting industry. There appears no difficulty in continuing this beneficial program.

Journal Committee Chairman Baldwin expressed serious concern over projections that 1966 advertising could fall nearly 100 pages (\$25,000) below that of 1965. Efforts to prevent potential loss of revenue were discussed. Selection of editors for both the Journal and Lipids is a near necessity due to the burden borne by Chairman Baldwin. The splendid job done by the Chicago staff in producing Lipids was cited.

The Emeritus Membership Committee, chairmanned by R. W. Bates, recommended Emeritus Membership for J. R. Mays, Herbert Sieck, R. A. Duncan, J. L. Schille and F. B. Porter, the recommendation being passed unanimously.

The report of Chairman Stillman's Nominating and Election Committee has been published in the Journal.

The Education Committee report by chairman Kuhrt was accepted by the Board with two short courses scheduled for this year: Penn State and Michigan State. Proposed additions and revisions of the operating manual were considered.

International Relations Committee Chairman Reiser indicated the successful establishment of "The Four Corners" in the Journal.

Local Section Liaison Committee chairman Cowan reported that a new section may be proposed in Kansas City.

The Meetings Study Group, Chairman Cowan, and the Exhibits Policy Committee, Chairman Hoerr, reported a joint meeting. It was recommended that a single committee charged with national meetings problems be instituted, and the Meetings Study Group commended for their activity, and discharged as having accomplished their

Committee Scopes under Chairman Holt has completed all but a few of these and the balance are expected for early completion.

Chairman Lundberg of the Society Awards Committee submitted an Awards Manual for guidance in establishing and maintaining this important Society activity. To be added before completion is an index and a listing of all Society awards.

In view of the action by the Executive Committee on recommendations by the Securities Bonding Committee, Chairman Hoerr moved dissolution of the latter which was favored unanimously.

The Board adjourned at 5:55 P.M.

In reviewing business carried over from the April 24 Governing Board Meeting, it was decided that the President should contact the AACC President for initial discussions on the possibilities of a joint AOCS-AACC meeting as recommended by the previous Board.

The Board voted unanimously to accept the Northeast Section's invitation to meet in Atlantic City for the 1971

Fall Meeting.

The Board voted unanimously to increase the price of the AOCS Official and Tentative Methods from \$30.00 to \$50.00 each and raise the price of additions and revisions from \$4.00 to \$6.00.

The Board accepted the Journal Committee's recommendation by voting unanimously to increase the advertising rates for the Journal by approximately 18% to compensate for increased production costs.

The Board voted unanimously to increase the annual dues of active members to \$15.00 (\$9.00 to be allotted to JAOCS and \$6.00 to Society budget).

The Board adjourned at 6:00 p.m.
