Carter, Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Illinois. George Rimnac, President, presented the award to Dr. Carter at the section's March 18, 1970, meeting held at the Swedish Club in Chicago. The award read as follows: "In recognition of his major contributions to the biochemistry of complex lipids and to the education of young scientists."

About the Medal

The North Central Section of the AOCS has established this Award to recognize outstanding research and exceptional service in the field of lipids and associated products. The metal commemorates Alton E. Bailey's great contributions to the field of fats and oils as a researcher, as an author of several standard books in the field, and as a leader in the work of the Society.



Dr. Carter, is an eminent educator as well as a world






H. E. Carter, 1970 Bailey Awardee, addresses an appreciative and attentive audience.

famous scientist. He has spent his entire career at the University of Illinois where for many years he was Professor of Chemistry. In his laboratories the complex lipids sphingosine, phytosphingosine, phytolycolipid, and the cerebrosides were isolated and their structures elucidated. Dr. Carter has been the author or co-author of more than 125 scientific papers. He began as an instructor in the Chemistry and Chemical Engineering Department in 1932 achieving Professorial rank in 1945, a title he held until 1967. During this time more than 70 students received advanced degrees under his guidance. As in the case of so many other Bailey Awardees, Dr. Carter's scientific interests are varied. He has made important contributions to our understanding of the structure of streptomycin, streptothricin and neamicin. He is an excellent administrator, heading the Department of Chemistry and Chemical Engineering from 1954, when he succeeded Dr. Roger Adams, until 1967 when he became Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University.

The significance of Dr. Carter's accomplishments has been widely recognized. He received the Eli Lilly Award in 1943, the Nichols Medal in 1965, the American Oil Chemists' Society Award in Lipid Chemistry in 1966, and the Spencer Award in 1969. He was given an honorary Doctor of Science degree by his Alma Mater, De Pauw University, in 1953.
