

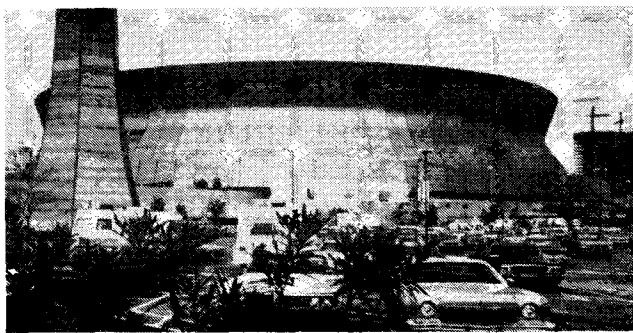
New Orleans Ladies' Program

On Thursday, April 22, participants in the 67th Annual Spring Meeting's Ladies Program in New Orleans will have an opportunity to see firsthand the world famous Louisiana Superdome, which seats 75,000 persons. The scene of last New Year's Eve Sugar Bowl and January's Pro Bowl, the Superdome is even more impressive from within than on television.

From the Superdome, buses will shuttle the ladies to the International Trade Mart Building adjacent to the Mississippi River. Before or after luncheon, the ladies will visit the Louisiana Maritime Museum. Located on the 31st floor of the Trade Mart Building, the museum is a unique way to experience the seafaring history of New Orleans, a major port since its founding in 1718.

Luncheon will be in the beautiful Plimsoil Club on the Trade Mart's 35th floor, surrounded by picture windows permitting a view of the oceangoing cargo ships traversing the Mississippi River or of the city as far as Lake Pontchartrain on its northern border.

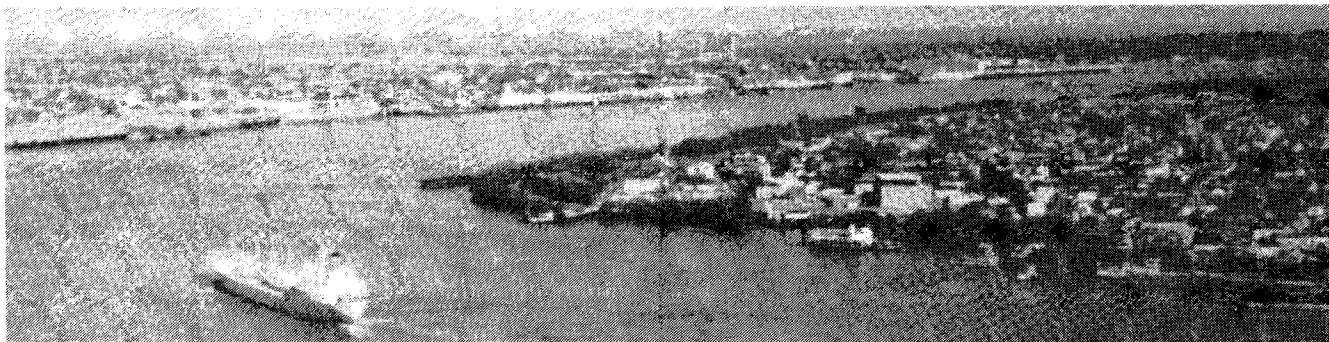
On Friday, the ladies will visit the Pitot Mansion on Bayou St. John, steeped in history going back to colonial days, followed by a visit to St. Mary's Assumption church, a National Historic Landmark that has just been completely renovated. After this, there will be an enjoyable luncheon at the Versailles restaurant on St. Charles and Jackson Avenue. The chef, Guenter Preuss, has recently been awarded third place in the Best New Orleans Restaurant Contest sponsored by Jack DuArte of the *Times-Picayune*, who writes, lives, and enjoys the gastronomic treats available in New Orleans. ■

New Orleans Panorama: View from the Louisiana Maritime Museum "in the sky" on the 31st floor of the Trade Mart Building.

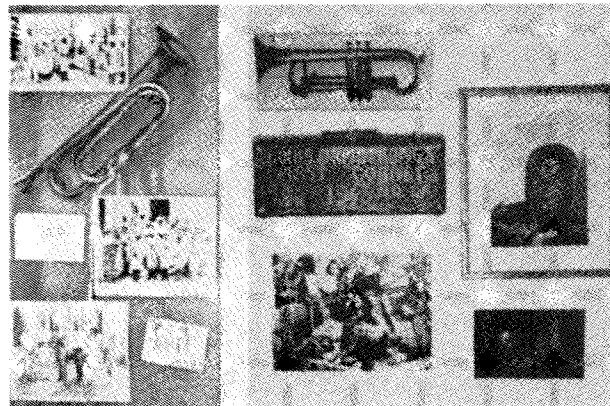
Guided Tours of New Orleans Jazz Museum To Be Arranged

Among the many possible diversions for members and their guests attending the Spring meeting in New Orleans, April 21-24, is a tour of the Jazz Museum. According to Robert L. Ory, technical program chairman and a member of the New Orleans Jazz Club, groups of 18-20 are eligible for a guided tour for \$.50 a person (down from the standard rate of \$1.00 for adults and \$.50 for children under 12 only).

Exhibits include musical instruments of such greats as Louis Armstrong, photos and documents (among them Lulu White's Blue Book—the list of girls who "plied their trade" in old Storyville), and all sorts of jazz memorabilia. In the style of "Dial-a-Tune," tapes of various jazz greats are available for private listening on telephones in the museum.

The museum is open from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

Members and guests who are interested in group visits should so state when they pre-register, or see Bob Ory at the meeting. He will arrange times for the tours, which take about 1-1/2 hours. ■
