to review the formulation and labeling of their products and that when refrigeration is needed, both shipping cartons and products should be clearly labeled concerning refrigeration.

The New York Department of Health had announced Feb. 28 that two men and a woman from Kingston, New York, were hospitalized with botulism after eating garlic bread that had been spread with a chopped garlic-and-oil mix. FDA said chopped garlic in oil had been implicated in botulism poisoning in an incident in 1985 in Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada.

FDA challenges soy food claims

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has challenged Ithaca Soyfoods Co.'s nutrition label claims on Tofu-Kan soybean curd and Tofu Tortellini.

In a regulatory letter sent to the company, the agency said Tofu-

Kan, which was labeled "high protein, low calories," lacked nutrition labeling. Tofu Tortellini, which carried a "low calorie" label declaration, does not comply with government regulations which define "low calorie" as no more than 40 calories per serving and no more than 0.4 calories per gram, FDA said.

The Tofu Tortellini also carried a "lactose free" claim which FDA said was misleading since no soybean curd contains lactose. Details: Food Chemical News, March 6, 1989, pp. 26-27.

Carr is elected AOCS president

Those elected to serve twoyear terms as Governing Board members-at-large were Robert G. Ackman, professor in the Department of Food Science and Technology and Canadian Institute of Fisheries Technology, Technical University of Nova Scotia, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada; Thomas A. Foglia, lead scientist for the Biochemistry and Chemistry of Lipids Research Unit, USDA's Eastern Regional Research Center, Philadelphia, Penn-

Proxy ballots cast were overwhelmingly in favor of two proposed amendments to the Articles of Incorporation. The society's financial report for 1988, before auditing, showed an operating loss of \$220,950, AOCS Treasurer Robert Burton informed the board at the February meeting. The audit, completed in late February, showed an actual operating loss of \$268,000.

In other action at the February meeting, the board:

• established an Annual Meetings Committee, which will include an appointed chairperson, the general chairperson of the two most recent annual meetings, general chairperson of the current annual meeting and all chairpersons named for future annual meetings.

• ruled all sessions at AOCS annual meetings must be chaired or cochaired by an AOCS member.

• raised the price of the new book of methods to \$300, with \$50 of the price earmarked for funding methods projects.

• set up a fee waiver request procedure for nonmember speakers at AOCS annual meetings.

• approved the formation of a Cincinnati AOCS Section pending receipt of acceptable by-laws and a budget plan.

 discussed possible revisions for the next membership directory. The board voted to eliminate the Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws, lists of charter members and past officers, and descriptions of various awards from the directory and to place such information in a membership packet. Committee listings will be modified, but the list of approved chemists and certified laboratories will be retained. Service listings of members will be eliminated, but FAX and Telex numbers will be included. There also will be a geographic index of businesses.

Obituary

ANTHONY M. SCHWARTZ

AOCS has been informed of the death of Anthony M. Schwartz, 80, of Rockville, Maryland, on Feb. 17, 1989. He had been a member of AOCS since 1950.

Dr. Schwartz received a B.A. in chemistry from Cornell University in 1928 and earned his doctorate in 1931. He was employed at Harris Research Laboratories in Washington, D.C., when he joined AOCS. Gillette later bought the company and he stayed on, working at the Gillette Research Institute in Rockville, Maryland. Upon his retirement in 1973, he set up his own consulting firm in the area of interface and surface chemistry. He was active as a consultant up to his death.

He is survived by his wife, Jane, of Rockville, Maryland, two daughters and two granddaughters.
