





RE: "OSS 9MM GREASE GUN" ARTICLE IN MGN 12/93 BY FRANK IANNAMICO

In reading the above captioned article, I noticed several references to the "Me (should read Medea) Corp. M3A1 greasgun reproduction. As I occasionally see references to this and some other weapons which we produced, I felt it may be helpful to furnish a little additional information so as to fill in some information gaps.

Medea Corporation produced the M3A1 "Grease Gun" for a short period of time with less than 100 sold in the civilian market; we manufactured receivers only "in-the-white" with later finishing parts installation left up to the end user or Class III dealers, etc.

Mr. Iannamico was correct in stating that it was an excellent copy as it was produced after EDM cutting of an original Guide Lamp gun and then building progressive die tooling for production to stamp out the receiver halves and all other small parts; in a few guns which were sold in the civilian market an added steel plate will be found at the rear of the receiver due to the M3's propensity for beating out the rear of the receiver after extended shooting. The guns which reached to civilian market were hand-welded (MIG-TIG) a numbered/stamped; Medea also produced the M3 although only a few of these and the MP-40 receiver tubes ever reached the civilian market; we also produced various Sten versions (no civilian production) and the BAR 1918-A2 (no civilian sales.)

The M3A1's were manufactured in various calibers including .22 RF, .380, 9mm, and 45 ACP; too bad Mr. Iannamico was not able to track us down a few years ago as we also tooled for production of the 9mm conversion unit (all pieces) for the M3A1 and had acquired a number of original sets for development use. A semi-auto version for the civilian market was planned and proto-types made, but this item was never placed in production.

I trust that this information may be of some help to you and your readers and to clear up a few gray areas as to the origin, etc. of Medea Corp. marked receivers.

Raffica

Now is not the time to sit back and rest on our laurels.

The Committee of 1776, which started here in MGN, is now an official national corporation. The organizing of the Committee itself will be done in St. Louis on Saturday, February 3, 1995. The different state co-ordinators are asked to show up and vote on the officers and board members of their choice, and to set policy for this year. Call Ron Long at 508-939-4867 to arrange to be there. If your state was not organized, call and be the one to do it! As you know, if you were part of the Rallies for Firearms Rights this last year, our little group that started with the Class 3's snowballed, and on July Fourth weekend, we put between 80-100,000 pro-Constitution demonstrators on the steps of their respective state capitols. Then, on the 14th of August, we put 15,000 people into Washington D.C. for a Rally there. Keep in mind that Handgun Control Inc. gets about 200 people at their national events, and the media covers them like they were a landslide of public opinion.

Dates for this year's Rallies are:

National Rally for Firearms Rights-Sunday, June 4th 1995, at the Lincoln Memorial, in front of the Reflecting Pool, next to the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial. G. Gordon Liddy has already signed on to speak as have some other national figures. I'll keep you posted.

The Rally for Firearms Rights in each state capitol: July Fourth weekend, probably Sunday July 2, 1995. We will decide that at the February 3 meeting.

We can not afford to back off—our enemies have declared that they will keep assaulting our Rights, and the "friends" that we just elected in a REAL landslide have just finished saying that they are not going to tackle the firearms issue, because they don't have a mandate from the people on this issue. Your butts you don't, Congressmen. Those same butts are on the line, and we will throw YOU out next election if you don't straighten out on this issue!

Raffica received a call from an RKI who has the interesting profession of being a magazine manufacturer. He wishes to remain anonymous, but still would like to pass some info on to the Rafficarians....

"The Colt 9mm guns were made in two series, as close as I can ascertain. The first series were the originals. To convert an Uzi magazine to use in the Colt, it is like you showed in Raffica, December 1994 issue. It is important to remember the modification at the upper rear backstrap, as the bolt may scrape, or certainly the ejector will interfere. On the newer models, that appear to have been made after Colt shut down the 9mm project to concentrate on an M-203 run, the problem is different. On these guns, the magazine catch won't lock in, and people have been fixing that by lowering the mag catch slot position on the magazine until it catches. THIS IS THE WRONG SOLUTION. The magazine is hitting the barrel extension in the front. If you lower the catch position, you lower the feed ramp position, and this will mean jamming and unreliability. The "fix" on converted magazines for these

guns is to remove some metal at the top of the frontstrap, as illustrated. It needs to come down around .050-.060 of an inch."

Here's some info from another manufacturer:

"Dan, here's a neat trick we used to do back in the '60's. We made 45- to 50round Reising magazines by cutting off the collar of the M-3 grease gun mag, cutting the Reising mag off at the base plate and Tig welding or brazing the two together. Then we put a ramp from the backs of the M-3 mag to the back of the Reising mag, inserting the Reising spring and follower, followed by the M-3 spring and follower. We cut off the spring coils of the M-3 until the action cycled properly as both springs put a bit too much pressure on the bolt for the first few rounds to work well. It worked great and gave us a lot of fun shooting! And, by the way, I have so good deals left on high capacity magazines: "grandfathered" 32-rd. carbine mags for \$30.00 ea, Glock polymer/steel extended mags in 33-rd. 9mm caliber and 29-rd. 40 caliber for \$100.00 each. These are the mags for the Glock 18 machine pistol that Glock won't sell to the public. You can contact Scherer Supplies, Box 250, Ewing, VA 24248, phone: 615-733-2615, fax: 615-733-2073."

OK Tony. That info on the Reising magazine was worth a blatant plug. Hope the Rafficarians out there enjoy this.

In the Reader Survey, there were several inquiries as to the meaning of the word "Raffica". Raffica is Italian for "full auto" or "burst." It is on the selector of my Italian Beretta Modello 12 SMG, pictured at the beginning of this column. MP-2 I knew what the mystery bolt was when I first saw it back in November, but I figured somebody else would know too.—I guess I figured wrong. The bolt appears to be from the M3/AN-M3 version of the "fifty cal." The bolt has been machined in several places to lighten it, thereby increasing the cyclic rate for antiaircraft use. This work started in 1943 by Frigidaire division of General Motors Corp. as the T25 series of guns. Problems with the bolts cracking led to several different configurations, one is illustrated in George M. Chinn's book on machine guns (Volume 3). The AN-M3 was standardized for air force use in 1945. It was the air force that developed the insert type bolt, as opposed to the rotary type most of us are familiar with.

The December mystery photo appears to be a special handguard for the M16/AR-15 series rifles. The setup is designed with an integral barrel nut that holds the barrel to the upper receiver. The purpose behind this arrangement is to provide a "free floating barrel" to increase accuracy. The barrel is free of outside forces and does not bend as much (unless one uses a cheap bipod as shown in the photograph.) This is an item for the long range precision shooter

Your answers to these questions either in *Machine Gun News* or directly via a letter or telephone call would be greatly appreciated.

A It is important to combat corrosion from the ammunition immediately. You must neutralize the acids from the primers—it is the mercuric chloride (mercury and nitric acid) that causes the problems-when the residue becomes moist, it forms nitric or sulfuric acid (depends on actual primer composition) and "eats" the metal. You need to neutralize the acid. How do you neutralize an acid? Use a base: baking soda, soap and water, old military bore cleaner. There are new anticorrosive cleaning agents available, but that is what they do-neutralize. There is nothing in your parts cleaner solution to do that, so, even after cleaning you are still at risk! Get some hot, soapy water and go at it. Then thoroughly dry and oil it.

Almost all of the parts on your MG-34 will get propellant gasses on them. Other than the bore and chamber, get the whole barrel, the booster and cone, the bolt, and the inside of the receiver, as well as the trigger components. I only shoot corrosive ammo out of post-86 dealer samples and 1919-A4's that I know I can clean right away.

Q With the change in Washington State laws, members of the National Guard can no longer transfer machine guns into the state I have moved into the area of DD's.

I am currently firing an M2 60mm mortar with your loading data. At this time I am transferring an Italian Cannone Anticarro e d'accompagnamento 47/32 into my possession. I understand that cases can be made from U.S. 37mm brass. I need to know the length to cut them too. Also projectile dimension and loading data.




A I am not very familiar with the Italian mortars. So, I refer this to the Rafficarians out there for information on this mortar. I can tell you that the 47/32 is in 47mm, and is sometimes referred to as the M1935, with a caliber notation of 45mm. All versions of this mortar are on the Curio and Relics list as NFA items. I have taken a drawing of a round from the U.S. military

guide on Italian munitions and included it here for your information on outer shape. I don't think its imprudent here to include the warning that you should only manufacture inert projectiles for a mortar, unless you have the appropriate Type 10 FFL, Manufacturer of Destructive Devices and Ammunition for Ammunition for DD's, as well as the Type 20 FFL, Manufacturer of High Explosives, and any State or local licenses. Plus—the knowledge to make a sealed unit so you don't blow yourself up in the process—with a mortar you have a charge of explosive sit-

ting in a metal container in the middle of pressurized burning propellant. A most unpleasant concoction for the individual who doesn't understand the word "sealed." I suggest that enthusiasts sti with "lawn darts" with their mortars. once heard that telltale "Whoosh-whoosh-whoosh" at a shoot one time, as an 81mm homemade HE round short-rounded and landed in front of the line. The guys with me all knew that sound and we hit the dirt. Fortunately, no one was hurt. The guy who was firing it knows far more than I do about the subject, and he still had an acci-



dent. Make inert rounds.

Q I would like to hear some comments on the .308 conversion for the BMG 1917 and 1919 A4 series, particularly the differences between the .30-06 links, and why the .30-06 links do not work well when matched with .308 ammo. Any sources for a 1917 BMG .308 barrel? Does the muzzle booster need to be addressed on the 1917 .308 conversion? Or does the lighter barrel (compared with 1919A4) nullify this requirement?

Dan, don't be too hasty in stepping down from the soapbox when oratorical urges strike. Good publication that MGN.

A Raffica has gone through the 1919A4 conversion to .308 a couple of times, so I'll touch on the 1917. The barrel external configurations are the same on the .308 and the .30-06, so that is not a problem. You don't have a booster on the 1917, but you do need a different bolt and some feed tray restrictors. The restrictors shorten the feed area to the .308 and help position the round. Ohio Ordnance (PO Box 687, Chardon, OH 44024 (216) 285-3481) generally has everything you need for the conversion. I would caution you that the .308 is going to be a little more finicky you should polish all surfaces that are motion oriented and try the action for any "sticking", then hunt it down and polish again. The links are different between .308 and .30-06 because the cases have differ-

ent diameters and tapers. Keeping it simple, they don't fit right. You should use cloth belts in your 17 anyway, unless you have a chrome trunion to take the wear. Andthanks for the vote of confidence. Q I need some advice about the Sterling SMG. My first question concerns removing the selector from the trigger group. I have no trouble removing the trigger or sear cradle by simply pushing the pins out with a cartridge but the selector is a different story. It won't budge. Am I doing something wrong or is the selector permanently attached to the trigger group?

Second, can the "barrel bearing" be unscrewed from the barrel jacket or is it silver brazed in place? If it can be unscrewed, did Sterling make a special armorer's wrench for this job?

Thirdly, how can I remove the L-shaped aperture sight and then reinstall it?

Lastly, where can I get original or Xerox copies of the owner and technical manual for this gun?

A First let's be precise about which firearm we are referring to. I will assume the MK 4 is under discussion. Your selector switch is part of the trigger group. After you remove the bolt, turn the trigger group retaining pin until it is pointed at "free" on the right hand side of the pistol grip. Now pull the trigger group out to the rear and swing it down to the front. The assembly should come out complete.

The barrel bearing is soldered in place. The rear sight on the MK 4 has been installed by internally compressing a rivet to hold it in place, as opposed to the lever that is on the MK 3 (use a pin punch on the right side of the MK 3). On the MK 4, drill the rivet out and replace it. If anyone has access to the manuals, write in to Raffica—I need one myself!

Allow me to correct you regarding the fellow who inquired about the "Sten" with the drum photo on page 33 of the Sept. MGN. As you correctly stated, it was in fact a Gustav/Port Said SMG—BUT—was not altered to accept the PPSh41 drum. Rather, the drum


was modified for fit and use in a stock Gustav/Port Said. Slick! Works great. I have one of these drums myself. The fellow who does the mods is located in my state—Indiana. I've seen his ads in preous issues of MGN—biz name is SIBARCO.

Q I greatly appreciate your time and effort and input in the Machine Gun News and the information that you are willing to share with other shooters. One of the Class III weapons, in my collection, is one of the dreaded shorty M16s with a registered auto sear. And although I greatly appreciate your comments, information and the article from John Norrell on fixing the shorty problem, I myself have never had a problem with the seared shorty especially after raising and shaping a small amount of material on the back of the auto sear to fill in the "rounded gap" in the back of the receiver. The unit has functioned reliably with all types and sizes of barrels in length in addition to adding an Olympic Arms

9mm upper to the unit. The only difficulty is that it does not function reliably with the Atchinson 22 conversion on full auto.

I have been told some time ago, both sonally from a call to Colt and from several machine gun dealers, that the Colt 9mm semiauto could not be utilized with a registered auto sear. Therefore I did purchase the Olympic Arms 9mm upper. However having read the article in the March 1993 issue of *Machine Gun News*, I sold my Olympic upper, went and purchased a green label Colt AR, had John Norrell redo the cosmetics on it and add one of the DEA suppressors to it.

Now to my dilemma. The auto sear as stated previously is not registered to any receiver, however it is registered by the BATF in .223 caliber. Additionally, I realized that even though the suppressor on the 9mm Colt is registered, when the upper receiver is on the gun without the auto sear in it, there is a short barreled rifle. Therefore the upper receiver can only be on the firearm with the auto sear in the gun. If that auto sear is registered in only .223 is the gun legal anyway or does it have to be re-registered additionally in 9mm to be utilized in the submachine gun? I enjoy shooting both the M16 d the Colt 9mm and do not necessarily


want to have to "marry" the registered

sear to one gun. Additional comment on the conversion from the semiauto 9mm to the fullauto 9mm, we ran into a terrible vibration problem through the trigger both on the semiauto and full-auto functioning. To such extent that even half a dozen shots through the gun would become extremely painful to the trigger finger. Even John Norrell was unable to properly solve the problem. He felt that the condition was due to the trigger and the lack of mill spec parts. I pulled parts out of my M16, and bought many other parts from different manufacturers-still the same problem. Finally I accidentally diagnosed the problem by comparing the original semiauto Colt 9mm hammer to the standard M16 hammer and noticed that the semiauto hammer had a notch in the hammer. I carefully cut an identical notch into a M16 hammer in order to not loose the temper and the gun has functioned with

vibration. Maybe this will help others who have had conversions.

My last question is help, help! Where can I get additional parts for this Colt



A Your upper is legal as long as the barrel is part of the suppressor assembly. It is not necessary to include the 9mm caliber on your form, but you may add it for piece of mind. Send a letter to NFA Branch explaining the added caliber and barrel length, and send a copy of your form with it, noting in section H of the information section the added caliber and barrel length.

This should cover you. The Atchisson kit is a fine innovation, but Ciener only guarantees it in factory Colt guns for full auto. Get the stone and the rouge out and start smoothing edges-you'll know where by the wear spots. Neat solution to the trigger vibration. I have felt that in some M16's myself, and I will be sure to try that in the next one I run into. 9mm parts? Not me. I haven't got a clue. We'll send this one out to the Rafficarians and I'm sure they'll come up with something. Q Your magazine's the best! CZ247 Submachine Gun

by ING. JIRI FENCL

The CZ247's magazine is able to turn to both vertical and horizontal positions as well as firing from both of them. It was also possible to fire from any set interposition.



n April 1, 1946, the Czechoslovak Army headquarters issued guidelines for the post-war development of new firearms for the Czechoslovak Army, which included—among others—requirements for a submachine gun. The authors of the guidelines were the Infantry Outfit Committee members under the leadership of General Slechta and Colonel Zelinka. The new submachine gun was to be developed both in 9mm Parabellum and in 7.62mm Tokarev. The required rate of fire was 900 rounds per minute. The chief requirement was a large capacity magazine of 72 to 80 rounds located so as not to hamper firing and carrying of the weapon.

In March 1946, the representatives of

the Brno Weapon Factory presented the first new submachine gun design to the Military Technical Institute. The design by Vaclav Holek, the ZB47, drew attention because of its unconventional shape

and because many of the parts were made from stamped steel. The weapon was based on the unlocked blowback, or dynamic breech, recoil principle. What made it unusual was it's triangular shape and the location of its high capacity (72 round) magazine. The magazine is located at an angle just below the trigger guard with the

bullet end of the cartridges facing upward. This placement required the use of a rotary catch feeding system. (For more information on the ZB47 see MGN June 92.)

The design team of the Koutsky brothers was also developing a submachine gun, the ZK466, in Prague. It had a wire stock and most of the parts

were made from stamped steel. It had a direct box magazine, which could be folded forward under the barrel when not in use.

At this same time Frantisek Myska redesigned his pre-war submachine gun, the Model 38, in 9mm Parabellum at the Strakonice Czech Weapon Factory. This new design was designated the CZ47 and later CZ147.

Lance Corporal Jaroslav Holecek was sent by the Ministry of Defense and a member of the Armament Committee, Captain Frantisek Hrubes, to CZ Strakonice. He brought with him design drawings of two submachine guns and a machine gun to work on in detail. He was also to prepare tests for his submachine gun. This weapon had the segmented breech, return spring in the rear grip and a magazine for 72 cartridges, located in the groove of the butt top edge. This prototype was marked in the factory as H1.

The manufacture of two slightly diffe ent prototypes and their testing together with other models was followed by a period of indecisiveness. It was obvious that

the Ministry of National Defense had no clear technical requirements for the new weapon design. The Armament Committee required more and more new changes and development work was extended. An mple was the changing opinion concerning the rate of fire: the original rate of fire of 900 rounds per minute was gradually reduced to 300-500 rounds per minute, which required many design changes. This lower rate of fire was better suited for the ZB47 and ZK466 submachine guns but was not suitable for the segmented breech of the H1 submachine gun.

Finally, Major Frantisek Hrubes from the Infantry Armament Committee, started preparing the basic guidelines for the new submachine gun and settled on the following requirements:

- rate of fire 450
- possibility of firing from the prone position so that a marksman would not be an easy target
- weapon weight of up to 11 pounds
- quick magazine loading
- automatic safety of the locked bolt to prevent accidental discharge

It is evident that there was no requirement for a large capacity magazine located in the buttstock. Neither the ZB46 or the with the segmented breech were suite for the new requirements. Therefore, Jaroslav Holecek designed an interstage model with parallel blowback action on which he tested some original design elements. He did this in addition to the program work of his contract. A feature of the weapon was that the whole receiver including the bolt mechanism and magazine well was fixed in the buttstock by means of a sleeve, which enabled the turning of this assembly so that the magazine could take a number of positions ranging from the vertical to the horizontal one (a turn of 90 degrees).

Submachine guns known so far had the magazines positioned permanently in either the horizontal or vertical position. If the magazine was in the horizontal position (e.g. ZK282 or STEN), the marksman could lie close to the ground and be less of a target. But when the weapon was carried, the horizontal magazine was an obstruction and had to be taken out. This left the magazine well open to accumulate dirt and

ris. The vertical magazine was the most mon magazine position with submachine guns of WWII because it was comfortable for carrying and holding the weapon during firing. However, the marks-

man could not use the weapon in a prone position.

This new design by Jaroslav Holecek enabled the magazine to turn to both vertical and horizontal positions as well as firing from both of them. It was also possible to fire from any set interposition. Both of the extreme positions were locked by a catch and it was possible to change them even during firing. On September 5, 1947, J. Holecek applied for the patent of his original design. It has been patented with Czechoslovak patent letter No. 80 669 since August 15, 1950.


J. Holecek used a "double trigger" (his own term) in the design of this submachine gun marked as CZ247 or Model 47/II. The same trigger was later used for his Model 23 and 25 submachine guns. The idea of the "double trigger" came to the inventor when Major Hrubes, who participated in the prototype firing test, asked for the possibility of both single and full auto fire without switching the fire mode. The "double trigger" mechanism has only one trigger, but two kinds of pressure can be

applied. If the applied pressure is light—the weapon fires in single shots, with a complete pull of the trigger—the weapon fires full auto. This design was to prevent errors by those soldiers who fired in single shots when they were supposed to fire in full auto and vice versa.


Frantisek Myska designed the safety mechanism for the CZ247, which automatically prevented the bolt from traveling when it stopped in the front position. If the weapon was dropped with the buttstock hitting the ground first, the bolt could not travel backwards which prevented accidental discharge. The only shortcoming of this safety was that it could not accidental prevent cocking if the boltretracting handle caught on a tree branch, clothing or equipment. Despite this, the safety increased the security of the marksman.

The built-in magazine loading device located on the right-hand side of the butt-stock was designed by the foreman of the prototype workshop Vaclav Zibar, enabling quick loading. This device was brand new in arms technology and not only aroused the interest of the Ministry of National Defense but made them abandon the concept of large capacity magazines for submachine guns.

The CZ247 submachine gun is a classic submachine gun with a wooden buttstock and blowback action. Its action works on the recoil principle. The receiver is made from a steel tube. The magazine well is located in the front part of the weapon, the barrel (7 7/8 inch) is fixed onto the receiver with a cap nut and the barrel has a gradual taper towards the front. The clip that holds the sling to the front can be rotated around the barrel. In the area behind the magazine well there is a cylindrical sleeve, which slides onto the receiver. It has a bar in its bottom part fixed in the forearm with

a joint. The whole receiver with the barrel and the magazine can be turned in the sleeve from the vertical position of the receiver to the horizontal one. The front sight, adjustable sideways, is located in dovetail on the outer sleeve part, who does not change its position in relation to the buttstock.

The receiver has an ejection port above the magazine well. In the top back part, there is a recess for the receiver rod and in the bottom part there is a recess for the nose of the sear, which must function even while the receiver is being turned. The back part of the receiver is covered by a cap.

The heavy cylindrical bolt moves in the receiver with two guide collars, spring extractor and bolt retracting handle, which is gradually shaped into the automatic safety handle. The front part of the bolt is lighter and forms a loading ramp which travels along the magazine flaps during loading; its diameter is reduced to a pin of nearly the same diameter as the barrel cartridge chamber. The return spring with the guide rod is shifted in the receiver cavity from the back. The guide rod has a lever used for pressing the return spring when the weapon is dismantled. The back part of the lever forms the arresting pin holdi the back receiver part in the rear sight box tom, which is firmly fixed in the butt.

The rear sight has two blades with V-shaped cuts. The first cut is in the blade forming the rear sight bottom and is unmovable. The other blade can be moved horizontally in the guideway of the first blade and can be locked in position by a spring catch. The rear sight is adjustable for firing at 100 and 200m.

Disassembly is as follows:

- 1. The magazine is taken out and the weapon is cleared.
- 2. The handle of the guide rod return spring is pressed forward in the receiver groove until the guide rod arresting pin comes out of the hole in the rear sight holder.
- 3. The receiver section with the bolt is tipped out of the butt upwards.
- 4. The receiver cap is turned and the cap is removed.
- 5. The guide rod with return spring and bolt are taken off the receiver.

This disassembles the weapon into fy subgroups including the magazine. No futher disassembly is necessary for field stripping. The weapon is assembled in the same way but with the reverse sequence of

The CZ247 successfully passed function and wear tests, and the Ministry of Defense considered the weapon for protion for the Czechoslovak Army. The eral staff ordered manufacture of a prototype in 7.62mm Soviet in addition to the 9mm so that they could compare the two before testing them at military units. The Czech Weapon Factory manufactured two CZ347s by this order.

Jaroslav Holecek finished his military service in the meantime and became a civil employee of the Czech Weapon Factory. He was not satisfied with the CZ247 submachine gun although it was quite successful. At that time a similar weapon, but shorter, for paratroopers, drivers and commanding officers was being designed. It was supposed to have a folding stock. The concept of the CZ247 was not suited for this purpose and therefore the inventor planned a new universal weapon with the magazine in the pistol grip and the bolt wrapping the barrel. He based this new submachine gun on his second original design the CZ47. This new weapon had the double trigger, Zibar's loading device and the automatic safety, which was redesigned so that it could lock the bolt in the front

ition and prevent accidental cocking when the bolt-retracting handle caught on a tree branch or other object. He applied for a patent for this safety but withdrew his application after a deal with the factory. The new weapons were designated as the Model 23 and Model 25. They were without competition because they were well balanced, when the bolt was in the open or closed position the ejection ports remained closed, and they were extremely short. After a brief testing period, they were ready for mass manufacture and then they were issued to the army.

The Ministry of Defense allowed the export of the CZ247 submachine gun. It was manufactured in a series of about 7000 pieces for Pakistan. Later, the contract with Pakistan was broken. Egypt and Israel were interested in the weapon but shortly before the weapons were sent to Egypt, shipment was stopped because of the war between Egypt and Israel. In the end, the weapons were used to outfit the Peoples Militia. It proved impossible to find out

re these weapons were sold after the ples Militia were rearmed with Model 23 and 25 submachine guns.



How to: Fabricate Tokarev 7.62x25 Cartridges

A few years back the surplus supply of the 7.62x25 Tokarev cartridges was abundant, then suddenly it dried up. The Chinese supply then opened, and again the rounds were cheap and plentiful. Unfortunately for the owners of firearms that thrive on these bullets, history has repeated itself.

The 7.62x25 Tokarev round is very similar to the old .30 Mauser cartridge and the two are generally interchangeable. However, some Czechoslovakian 7.62x25 rounds are very hot. I've chronographed some of these Czech loads, and they clocked at 1550 fps vs. the standard velocity Tokarevs 1390 fps with an 86 grain slug. These rounds were designed for use in the robust, CZ-52 pistol that utilizes a roller-locking system similar to H&K weapons. I would not recommend these hot rounds in any other weapon. Another precaution is that a lot of surplus 7.62 ammo is corrosive. Know what you are shooting! When in doubt, give it the "nail test." (Refer to previous issues of MGN for details.)

There are many submachine guns that use the Tokarev cartridge. Most are communist block weapons, for example, the Russian PPSh 41 and Chinese Type 50. There are many more handguns that use the Tokarev, or the interchangeable .30 Mauser rounds: the Model 712 full-auto Mauser Broomhandle pistol, better known as the "Schnellfeuer," the Russian and Chinese variant Tokarev pistols and of course the CZ-52 to name a few.

With all the various firearms out there that use this cartridge, and the fact the supply of surplus ammo is drying up, I'm sure there would be some interest on how to make your own 7.62x25 rounds.

Unfortunately, I do not own a subgun in this caliber. I do own several handguns chambered for 7.62x25. I do not like to buy anything I can reload. So I decided to make my own cartridges. They work in all my handguns and I see no reason they would not work in any subgun so chambered.

The basis for making the 7.62x25 cases are the plentiful and cheap .223 AKA: the 5.56 NATO rounds. I try to use my old cases that have split necks and that are no longer useful for their intended purpose. This is called recycling.

I start by cutting the overall length of the case to approximately one inch. A pipe or tubing cutter works well for this job. The next step requires a set of standard .30 Mauser dies. These dies are available from RCBS and Lee, but are not available with a carbide sizer so, the cases must be lubed before sizing. I then size the case in a single stage press. After forming the bottle-necked case, the next step is to size inside the neck using a .30 caliber ID neck sizer. Any .30 caliber ID neck sizer will work. On a Dillon press, I use a .30 carbine powder funnel set up on my press to accomplish this step. Now you will need to trim the overall case length to .980", then deburr the case neck. Next you will need to ream inside the neck with a .308 reamer available from Forster. I do this job on my drill press. The reason for the reaming is that the case is too thick in this area. After reaming, the case will need to be resized again to bring the neck outside diameter back to spec. Clean the cases in a brass tumbler to remove the excess lube. The cases are ready to be loaded. Regular small pistol primers are used. I personally use Winchester brand small pistol primers.

For a powder, I use WC 231 in my loads: BE CAREFUL WHEN WORKING UP YOUR LOADS. These following loads (see chart below) worked fine in my particular guns but may not in yours. There are too many variables to be certain. Start h a minimum powder charge and work up slowly. Know how to identify and watch for signs of excessive pressure. Keep in mind the age of the firearm you are working with. Be extra careful if you are making these rounds for guns originally intended for the .30 Mauser round. Use only minimum loads in any gun originally intended for the .30 Mauser round. All loads were using the 110 grain M1 carbine

bullet.

Unfortunately, there are no cheap bulk projectiles such as needed for loading the Tokarev round. An excellent alternative is the .30 carbine 110 grain slug. Although heavier than the original 86-grain bullet, they work fine. The .30 carbine bullet is available in several configurations: full metal jacket, soft nose jacketed, and lead.


If you do not want to use the heavier 110 grain bullet, there is a alternative.

Several reloading companies manufacture molds for casting the lighter bullets in .32 caliber, or you can purchase the .32 bullets already cast, and by using a cast bullet sizer it is possible to resize the .32 bullets to .309" or whatever diameter you prefer. A lot of the firearms that use this cartridge have varying bore diameters, mine however all accept the .309" cast slugs. The lighter bullet is the way to go if you're looking for velocity and performance similar to original loads.

I now reload the cases on my Dillon 550


reloading press. Since the cases are already sized, no sizing die is needed. In its place, on the first die station, I use a decapping die. This die will push out any tumbling media that may still be inside the case flash hole from the cleaning step. Without the resistance of the sizing die, the reloading process is a breeze. Seat the bullet so the overall length is a maximum of 1.315". I use a slight crimp on the case as a last step.

I have been using these homemade 7.62x25 cases for several years without any problems. Other than due to the heavier projectile (110 gr vs 86 gr), the sights



are off a bit. As long as you have the case centered when performing the reaming step, and the neck thickness is uniform. You can reload them repeatedly without any necks splitting. I have never had to trim any of these cases back to the correct length either.

I hope by reading this article you w have found new uses for your split .22 cases and a source of 7.62x25 ammo for your guns that shoot it. Just remember to BE CAREFUL. As a closing I can suggest a couple of ways to prevent future shortages of ammo. Join the NRA, and get out and vote. (Make sure you are registered at least 30 days prior to the election or you will be ineligible to vote.) Instead of complaining to your buddies about the current bans and pending legislation, complain to your elected representatives. If he or she won't listen, vote them out of office. NO ONE can afford to be idle and let the other guy do it any more; those days are gone forever. MGN

The Johnson Model 1941 Light Machine Gun



The Model 1941 Johnson light machine gun fires from a closed bolt in semiautomatic to maximize accuracy and from the open bolt on full auto to minimize heat build-up.

The Johnson light machine gun was developed from Captain Melvin M. Johnson's semiautomatic rifle, which was originally designed for commercial sales in 1936. The light machine gun was developed in 1937 and refined in 1940. Produced as the Model 1941, the Johnson LMG introduced some interesting features.

It fired from a closed bolt in semiautomatic to maximize accuracy. And it fired from the open bolt on full auto to minimize heat build-up. The cyclic rate of fire could be adjusted from 300 to 900 rounds per minute. The barrel could be changed quickly. And the Johnson LMG used a straight-line stock to minimize recoil.

But the feature that resulted in sales to Uncle Sam—aside from the potential for speedy delivery when there was an acute shortage of weapons—was that the machine gun could be disassembled into a fairly compact package. This made it attractive for paratroopers, special forces, and the OSS.

The Johnson LMG contains five basic subassemblies: barrel group, bolt group, receiver group, magazine group, and butt-stock and hammer group. The LMG uses the same basic mechanism as Johnson's semiautomatic rifle, and many of the parts are interchangeable. The general characteristics of the Johnson Model 1941 light machine gun can be found in the accompanying table.

The unusual profile of the weapon when viewed from the side results from Johnson's desire to minimize climb during full-auto fire, and to minimize vibration which can degrade accuracy. The straight-line stock, and the fact that all moving parts cycle along the axis of the bore, do actually reduce muzzle climb and apparent recoil. Nevertheless, recoil is significant in this 12.3 pound (5.6 kg) weapon since it was designed for the full-powered M1 round (commonly known as the .30-06). This recoil does adversely affect hit probability on full auto. Bipod placement can also affect the practical accuracy of a light machine gun.

The bipod is located as far back as it can go on the Johnson Model 1941. The advantage of this position is that the operator can rapidly traverse the weapon to engage quickly moving flanking targets. The liability of this bipod placement is that the weapon produces large group dispersion. When the rear bipod position is combined with the Johnson's light weight, the net result is that the Johnson Model 1941 LMG produces unacceptable hit probability.

The Browning Automatic Rifle exhibits the polar opposite bipod placement. The extreme forward position of the BAR bipod provides the smallest possible shot dispersion. But this bipod placement makes it very difficult to engage rapidly flanking targets. The bipod on the Bren Gun is located at the gas regulator. This intermediate position seems to provide the optimum compromise, since the Bren delivers tight enough group dispersion for excellent hit probability, while providing

an acceptable ability to engage flanking targets.

The unusual profile of the Model 1941 light machine gun when viewed from above comes from the bulky, single-column box magazine inserted into the magazine group on the left side of the receiver. The genesis of this arrangement followed curious evolution. Johnson's early colmercial semiautomatic rifles used a detachable magazine inspired by the one used in the Browning Automatic Rifle. A new, internal rotary magazine was incorporated into the semiautomatic rifle in 1940 for the military market.

The fixed rotary magazine used feed lips actually machined into the receiver. This eliminated the potential problem of bent feed lips commonly encountered on detachable box magazines of the day. The internal magazine was charged by fiveround stripper clips from the right side of the receiver.

Johnson's Model 1941 light machine gun combined a detachable box magazine (which lacked feed lips) with the semiautomatic rifle's fixed rotary mechanism and feed lips machined into the receiver.

Johnson's detachable box magazine uses a flat leaf spring with a rounded hook to both capture the top cartridge in the magazine and to serve as the magazine-retaining catch. When the magazine is inserted into the magazine support gui on the left side of the receiver, the hook cams upward on a ramp and releases all the cartridges in the magazine. The spring then

engages shoulders on the ramp to lock the magazine in place until a long magazine lever (located atop the support guide) is actuated. Meanwhile, the magazine spring

shes the cartridges against a ramp which des the first cartridge as it rolls into the feed lips machined into the receiver.

While the detachable box magazine holds 20 rounds, the gun can be loaded with 25 rounds by charging with stripper clips through a loading gate on the right side of the receiver. Single rounds can be loaded too. This arrangement facilitates "tactical reloads" after a magazine has been partially emptied.

Since the detachable Johnson magazines did not depend upon precisely formed and aligned feed lips, they were simple to make and did not require tight tolerances and quality control. Johnson felt this was a major selling point of the system, especially in light of all the manufacturing and teething problems that had plagued the M1 Garand since it had been officially adopted by the U.S. Army in 1936. (Few had been delivered by the outbreak of war five years later.) While they were simple and relatively inexpensive, Johnson's detachable magazines could still be crunched and rendered unserviceable.

Ironically, these magazines proved to a major liability of the Johnson LMG, rather than a major marketing tool. The side-mounted magazines were too long and threw off the balance of the gun. The Johnson light machine gun would have been much better received if it had employed the BAR-type magazine used in the commercial variant of the Johnson semiautomatic rifle. The real killer in terms of military acceptance was that both the Johnson rifle and light machine gun commonly experienced extractor failure similar to the problems experienced by the .30-06 variant of the Lewis Gun manufactured by Savage.

The trigger group contains a selector (which Johnson called a "change lever") and a grip safety. The selector on the right side of the gun provides semiautomatic, closed-bolt fire in the forward position. The selector provides full-auto, open-bolt fire in the rearward position. The trigger engages the sear during semiautomatic firing. But during full-auto fire, the trigger

ages the bolt catch, sear and sear trip.

In in the vertical position, the selector functions as a safety since it locks both the sear and bolt catch. Thus the weapon cannot fire, whether the bolt is in the open or


closed position. A grip safety on the front of the grip provides an additional margin of safety.

The Johnson light machine gun employs a short-recoil action. Upon firing, the barrel and bolt recoil together for about 0.13 inch (0.33 cm). The angular face of the operating cam (located at the rear of the bolt group) strikes a corresponding face in the receiver, causing the bolt to

rotate 20 degrees counterclockwise. This frees the bolt's eight locking lugs from the barrel-locking bushing. Net rearward barrel travel is about 0.44 inch (1.12 cm). Enough gas pressure remains when the unlocking sequence is complete to assist the rearward movement of the bolt assembly. Thus the Johnson's short-recoil design uses both recoil momentum and the remaining gas pressure in the chamber to







The bolt continues rearward, extracting and ejecting the spent cartridge case, cocking the hammer, and compressing main operating (recoil) spring. If the selector is forward, the bolt will chamber a new round. If the selector is rearward and the trigger is no longer depressed, the bolt will remain in the open position. If the trigger is still depressed with the selector on full auto, then the bolt will chamber another cartridge and fire as soon as the rotary bolt is locked. The LMG cannot fire out of battery because the cam unit carries the firing pin and keeps it out of proper alignment until the locking sequence is complete.

The Johnson LMG was normally issued with a four groove, right twist 22 inch (55.9 cm) barrel, but 20 inch (50.8 cm) and 24 inch (61.0 cm) barrels can also be encountered. A perforated barrel jacket, which is actually an extension of the receiver, guides the barrel during recoil and serves as a handguard. Since the barrel is exposed for its entire length, it cools fairly quickly. The barrel can be changed in 10 seconds by a skilled operator.

The barrel features an elevated front sight. The rear sight has two apertures. The bottom one is used for ranges under 1,000 yards, and the top one is used for ranges from 1,000 to 1,500 yards (914 to 1,372 meters). The rear sight folds down for protection when it's not being used.

A bipod is mounted under the forearm. While the placement of the

bipod on the barrel jacket provides rapid target acquisition, this placement does not provide as stable a platform as the BAR's bipod at the end of the barrel. Operators commonly removed the bipods in the fie to save weight.

The U.S. Army and the Dutch government tested Johnson's rifle and light machine gun in 1940. Orders were promptly placed for both rifles and LMGs for the Netherlands Indies Army, and a few months later for the Royal Netherlands Navy. The U.S. Army wasn't interested, however. The U.S. Marines tested the Johnsons in November 1941, and adopted the Garand a few weeks before the outbreak of war.


Suddenly the Marines faced a critical shortage of weapons, so they ordered a small quantity of Johnson rifles and LMGs. Marine paratroopers used both weapons in the Solomons. The first combat use of the Johnson rifles and LMGs was when the Marine's 1st Parachute Battalion attacked Gavutu. They were also used at Tanambogo and Guadalcanal. The Marines went on to use Johnsons at New Georgia, Choiseul, and Bougainville.

Additional Johnson rifles and LMGs were purchased for use as special-purpose weapons by the Office of Strateg Services (OSS) and the U.S. Army 1st Special Service Force. The latter group used the Johnson LMG as late as 1944 at Anzio.

Orders for the Johnson LMG had dried up by the end of 1943. The Germans occupied the Netherlands and the Japanese occupied Dutch colonies in the Pacific. And American buyers turned to standardissue weapons, which were finally being produced in quantity. Production of the Johnson weapons ended in early 1944, after about 70,000 rifles and 10,000 light machine guns were delivered.

An improved variant of the Johnson LMG incorporated changes suggested by combat experience with the Model 1941. Tests at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in December 1943 suggested reliability problems when the weapon was subjected to dust, mud and cold. Additional improvements were incorporated, and the new variant was called the Model 1944. The most conspicuous change was that the new LMG features a tubular plastic stock and folding monopod instead of a bipod. Further testing by the Army in March 1944 demonstrated improved reliability.

tested the Model 1944 at Quantico, and were so impressed that they recommended adoption of the latest Johnson LMG instead of the Browning Automatic Rifle. The Commandant overruled the recommendation, however, citing two objections. The rapid progress of the war would not provide enough time to retrain troops. And the Commandant believed the Corps should only adopt weapons that were approved as standard issue by the Army.


A few subsequent variants of the Johnson LMG were produced that used a gas-assisted action or fed from a belt rather than box magazine. The Model 1945 used its gas assist to boost the recoil of the barrel and increase the cyclic rate, and it fed from a box magazine like its predecessors.

With its monopod, the M1945 weighed 15.5 pounds (7.0 kg). Barrels could be changed in 6 seconds. When engaged in sustained automatic fire, the barrels should be changed every 1,000 to 1,200 rounds at lelivered rate of 50 rpm. This delivered are can be speeded up dramatically.

A skilled lone operator can load and fire 180 rounds in 1 minute on full auto, or 60 aimed shots on semiautomatic. A two-man team (gunner and loader) can load and fire 100 rounds in 18 seconds or 200 rounds in 37 seconds. That's a delivered rate of 300 rounds per minute. A skilled three-man team with spare barrel and lots of magazines can deliver 1,000 rounds in 3 minutes — and that includes the time it takes for nine barrel changes!

Yet, in spite of such performance and a lot of interesting design features, no further sales were secured. Development of the Johnson light machine gun ceased completely in 1947. The design resurfaced in the early 1950s, when the Israelis developed a direct spinoff of the Johnson Model 1944 LMG, which they called the Dror. Israel Military Industries manufactured a number of guns in two calibers: 7.92x57mm and .303 British. The choice of calibers was logical at the time, since

prior to Israel becoming an independent state. Testing of the IMI Dror demonstrated that the weapon did not function reliably in the dusty desert environments of the Middle East, so this clone of the Johnson Model 1944 never went into full production.

The Johnsons and the IMI Dror slipped into obscurity. Castro used Johnson rifles and LMGs in his campaign against Cuba's Batista government from 1958-1959. In an ironic turn of events, anti-Castro Cuban guerrillas based on the mainland later used Johnson rifles and LMGs against Castro.

Fortunately for collectors in the United States, the Johnson family donated a number of LMGs to the Winchester Museum in Cody, Wyoming. Since the Johnsons didn't fit well into the collection, these weapons were eventually sold to a dealer in the Midwest. Two things make these Johnson LMGs noteworthy. (1) They represent most of the fully transferable Johnson LMGs on the registry. And (2) the guns from the Winchester Museum did not have factory original bipods. The dealer had very good—but not perfect—reproduction bipods manufactured for these guns.

The Johnson Model 1941 light machine gun remains an interesting engineering achievement that filled a useful tactical niche. But the Johnson appeared too late to achieve more than a footnote in history. As the prolific weapons designer Eugene Stoner observed, "Timing is everything."

The March 1994 issue of Machine Gun News contained a description of how the author modified a Cobray M11 to make it a much better gun. The M11, described in that story, won first and second places in the NFA Rapid Fire Match at the 1993 Knob Creek October event. Since then, that modified M11 has been refined further. It is much improved over its first reconfiguration and is now very competitive against match-prepared MP5 and M16/9mm guns. The Ultimate M11's cost is still very reasonable.

The Ultimate M11 was entered in the 1994 NFA Rapid Fire Championship by a team of competitors from the Triad Action

Shooting Klub (TASK). Jim Weaver, last years winner, captured first again. Capt. Monty Mendenhall came in second again behind Weaver, as he did in 1993. Fourth and fifth places were taken by TASK team members Dale Summers and Kenny Loggains. Third place was won by a non-TASK shooter, Fred Woerner. Fred entered with a similarly prepared M11.

An out-of-the-box stock M11 is not useful for much more than cleaning out a phone booth or a

small elevator. Match results have proven though, that a properly prepared M11 is competitive against MP5s and M16/9mms. The total cost to buy an M11 and give it the "Ultimate conversion" is about \$1100. MP5s and M16/9mms cost more than \$2500. The "Ultimate M11" is very cost effective.

The original modifications to the M11 were extremely simple. The only tools required were a screwdriver and a set of Allen wrenches. Every accessory used in the original conversion was and still is available through the mail from retail trade outlets. The total cost of the original conversion, including a red dot style sight, was

\$210. It was a vast improvement over a stock M11.

The 1994 Ultimate M11 conversion more expensive and requires the work of a skilled machinist or gunsmith. The result though is a short, lightweight, accurate, reliable, and extremely controllable match gun. The original M11 conversion had an excellent stock, which was retained on the Ultimate M11. It had no foregrip though. The muzzlebrake installed easily but was not very effective. Readers who have that muzzlebrake on their M11s will do well to remove it and replace it with an MP5K style foregrip. It is available from MAC and installs with only an Allen wrench.

The muzzlebrake and the foregrip cannot be installed simultaneously on the original short barrel. The MP5K style foregrip enhances control to a far greater degree though, than the inefficient muzzlebrake originally used.

The Ultimate M11 has a ten inch barrel. It has an MP5K style foregrip and a very efficient three-chambered muzzlebrake compensator. Using full pow ammo, an expert can keep two-round bursts inside a six inch circle at fifty feet. If lower powered


match ammo is used, the groups are even smaller. An expert can fire a thirty-round continuous burst at fifty feet and place most of the bullets in the 6x11 "A" zone of andard IPSC target. A very good shoothight shoot for the upper 6x6 "head zone."

Comparison testing and match experience proves that the Ultimate M11 will out perform unmodified MP5s and Colt M16/9mms. Both guns cost two or three times the price of an Ultimate M11. For the more expensive guns to equal Ultimate M11's controllability, a well designed muzzlebrake must be installed. Without one, neither gun will consistently keep a three-round burst, much less a thirty-round burst, in the "A" zone at fifty feet. The Ultimate M11 will.

Owners of M11s, who want to improve their guns, should get a copy of the March 1994 issue of Machine Gun News. Back issues are available from the publisher. That issue explains how to make an M11 into a competitive match gun with a minimum expense and no gunsmithing skills. M11 owners with machinist skills, who want the Ultimate M11 conversion, can obtain the necessary parts from the listed suppliers and make their own Ultimate

The barrel of a ten inch upper receiver is threaded for the muzzlebrake compensator. The threading must be done on a lathe to assure that the threads are concentric to the bore. Otherwise, a bullet may strike the chamber wall inside the muzzlebrake compensator with disastrous results.

The MP5K style foregrip has a metal tube that surrounds the barrel. It slips easily over the standard five-inch M11 barrel. Unfortunately, it will not fit over the new ten-inch barrel. Reducing the diameter of the barrel on a lathe will allow the foregrip to fit. It is better to bore out the inside of

the foregrip so that an unmodified barrel may be used.

Mounts for red dot style sights are available that will fit the M11 with no gunsmithing work. Jim Weaver used one in 1993 while winning the NFA Rapid Fire

The "no gunsmithing" mounts have two faults. First they tend to work loose at inopportune moments. Proper attention to maintenance can prevent that though. Second, they place the red dot sight too high. That causes significant parallax errors. Weaver's 1993 championship gun was sighted to hit dead on at ten yards, where most match targets are placed. At fifty yards, parallax caused the M11 to hit eight inches above the point of aim.

The crafty 1993 NFA match directors made a true championship course and placed several targets at forty yards and beyond. Weaver's time was increased due to the need to consciously hold under the targets.

The Ultimate M11 solves the parallax by placing the Weaver mount only .6 inch above the top of the upper receiver. Lowering the red dot sight, halved the parallax error at fifty yards. For "serious social intercourse," a ten-yard "zero" is ideal. From the muzzle to 120 yards, the bullet is never more than 4.5 inches above or below the point of aim.

Further testing revealed that sighting the Ultimate M11 to hit dead on at twenty yards is a better choice for subgun matches. Then, the Ultimate M11 hits .8 inch low at ten yards and dead on at both twenty and sixty yards. Between twenty and sixty yards, the bullet is never more than .6 inch high.

The M11's upper receiver is thin. It is only .060 inch thick. If a low Weaver mount is attached with only screws, they will soon shear or work loose. The mount must be silver soldered to the upper receiver to be trouble free.

Care must be taken when soldering to assure that the mount is aligned correctly with the upper receiver. If much misalignment occurs, the red dot sight will not have enough internal adjustment to zero it on

the target.

To facilitate rapid magazine changes, the standard mag release was replaced. The new "paddle" mag release is similar to the one found on a MP5. Use of the new release saves about 1/4 second per magazine change. If three mag changes are needed, then the 3/4 of a second will be saved. That can mean the difference between first and third place.



Several months back I did an article about weapons caching. The article was reprinted in *Soldier of Fortune* magazine and I was contacted by several companies which are marketing products to help protect your weapons for long term storage. Allegheny Arsenal Inc. markets "Guardian Gun Care Products" including a "Corrosive Ammunition Neutralizer" and a "Long Term Protectant."

The "Corrosive Ammunition Neutralizer" is not unlike the tried-andtrue "G.I. Bore Cleaner" which has grown difficult to find and which is sometimes deteriorated beyond use when it is located. I once bought two cans at a gunshow to discover that they contained kerosene!!! The U.S. military switched to noncorrosive propellant and primers over forty years ago. They continued to use the old bore cleaner until the stocks of corrosive ammunition were depleted and then they adopted a new generation of cleaners and lubricants. The current issue lubricants are fine for noncorrosive ammunition but they just can't handle the corrosive salts found in old ammo. The Guardian products are an option for corrosive ammo users unable to find a reliable supply.

The "Long Term Protectant" is a rust preventative compound which is designed only for use when long term storage under possibly adverse conditions is planned. The manufacturers claim that it meets the military specification MIL-C-16173D-GRADE1 and during a laboratory test showed no corrosion when exposed to a

20% salt spray for over 2000 hours!!!

This is an ideal product for all you guys burying your "hard times armory," but it takes commitment. You must thoroughly clean your weapon of all dirt and protective lubricants before beginning the appli-

cation of the "Long Term Protectant." It takes 24 hours before the treatment is completely dry and ready for storage. The protective coating requires that you use mineral spirits or kerosene to remove it. You must not attempt to fire the weapon until the protectant has been completely removed from the chamber and barrel. As I said, it takes commitment.


The Long Term Store offers mil-spec metalized, heat sealable gun sleeves and Vapor Phase Inhibitor (VPI) paper as used by the U.S. military. This provides a quick and easy option for long term storage. You simply wrap the metallic portions of the weapon in the VPI paper and seal the weapon in the sleeve using a normal household iron. I believe that this provides the most practical option particularly when the packet is then enclosed in a st dy storage tube filled with a few bags of desiccant. This arrangement provides reasonable protection while leaving the weapon available for speedy retrieval.

For less arduous long-term storage, such as storing rarely used firearms in your gun cabinet, **Dillon Precision** offers protective gun covers for both handguns and long guns. Commonly referred to as "Gun Sox," they are 532 gram desiccants which are reputed to exceed the requirements of MIL-D-3464E.

Dillon also makes the best reloading presses made and have the most phenomenal guarantee I've ever encountered. I don't personally reload because I'm just to damned lazy but I do appreciate quality when I see it. I have never encountered a person who was dissatisfied with anything they had obtained from Dillon. I don't buy any reloading stuff but I do buy other items from Dillon. Their catalog carries quality shooting accessories, videotapes and other items popular with firearm aficionados. Their excellent catalog-cu magazine known as the "Blue Press" is free for the asking and makes very enjoyable reading.



The Forms



by DAN SHEA

The response that I have been get-I ting about which federal form we should concentrate on next appears to be the Form 1—to manufacture a Firearm Tax-Paid. Most of the calls that I have had were related to the current stupidity regarding the recategorizing of the dreaded Striker, StreetSweeper, and USAS-12 shotguns to Destructive Device status. We have been over this scenario extensively in The Forms, so briefly: Striker and USAS-12 shotguns had been banned from importation into the U.S. under the "Sporting Purpose" clause of the GCA 1968. This gave the Secretary of the Treasury authority (ATF) to rule on what shotguns were suitable for an undefined "sporting purpose" or not. Because the definition of a Destructive Device requiring taxing and registration in Title II of the GCA 68 includes firearms of a bore diameter over 1/2", only those "sporting purpose" shotguns defined by the director were exempted. When the Strikers and USAS-12's were submitted for importation in the early 1980's, both firearms were denied, and the appeals process was gone through. The courts ruled that these were not "sporting purpose" shotguns, and the rulings were left standing. It was a simple matter for Handgun Control Inc. to figure out that these guns could be forced to be registered under that clause once they learned about the standing court rulings. They had their lackeys and fellow travelers in the Clinton administration check it out and Lloyd Bentsen made the announcement. There was no policy in place to handle this situation, and typical of the Clintonistas, compliance and regulation was dropped into the lap of the ATF. The ramifications are still spinning around down in D.C., and people are being arrested for not registering or selling without registering them. If you do not believe me, I will be happy to refer some of my phone calls from these guys who didn't pay attention.

FORM 1: APPLICATION TO MAKE AND

TRANSFER A FIREARM

1) This form is filed either tax paid by an individual or corporation, tax exempt to manufacture for a government agency or tax exempt by a government agency. The Making Tax is the same for all NFA firearms (Silencers, Short Barreled Shotguns and Rifles, Any Other Weapons, and Destructive Devices. Machine Guns may no longer be manufactured for private ownership), it is \$200 per firearm. The Strikers, StreetSweepers and USAS-12 shotguns that the government is requiring to be registered have had the \$200 tax waved-none need be paid with this firearm. I suggest to people to use a check to pay the tax, so that you have a record of Washington cashing it. If you send a money order, and it gets lost, you won't know about it for months. If you are making a firearm for a police department, the tax is not paid. A police department that is manufacturing an NFA firearm other than a machine gun, for their own use, should use a Form 1 instead of a Form 10, because then the firearm is transferable and may have future value. If they use the Form 10, it can only be transferred to government agencies.

2) Obvious.

3a-c) Your address—if it is not your physical address, as is the case when you have a PO Box address, put your physical address in 3b. Your county must be listed in 3c. Note that I say "must." Any missing information will cause the form to be kicked out.

- 3d) Your phone number—this should be your contact point at the address you have listed.
- 4a) Your name, address, town, state and zip code if you are starting from scratch. If you are taking a Title I firearm and making it into a Title II, then the original manufacturer gets listed here. Example: A Remington 870 is to be cut off and made into a Short Shotgun. Remington gets listed as the manufacturer. If you are welding up scrap parts to manufacture the firearm receiver, you are the

manufacturer and your name goes here.

- 4b) Type of firearm—it should be one of the following: Silencer, Short Barreled Shotgun, Short Barreled Rifle, Any Other Weapon, or Destructive Device. If this is a government agency piece, it may also be a Machine Gun or a Machine Gun Sear.
- 4c) Caliber—what caliber is the firearm? Is it multiple calibers? Then list them. In the case of a sear or conversion unit, this really should not apply (N/A). However, most people have listed the intended caliber here.
- 4d) Model—this is up to you. It must be marked on your firearm at the end. In the case of a remanufacture, it makes sense to add to the original. Example: 870 to an 870-S.
- 4e) Length of barrel—measure from the feeding end of the chamber to the crown end of the exit port. Barrel exte sions do not count. If there is no barrethen insert "N/A."
- 4f) Overall length—total length of the firearm or unit. In the case of mortars, it's the barrel and receiver. Cannon—barrel and breech ring. Firearms—stock folded or unfolded. Devices—sears, bolts, pen guns, camera guns, etc., actual length.
- 4g) Serial number—make one up. Try to use your initials or something to make it other than "001." If it is a remanufacture, use the original, then add a suffix of your initials if you want.
- 4h) In the case of a remanufacture, this space should say it is marked with "your name, town, and state." Any other markings should be noted here. Example: For a PD that installs a sear they made into an HK94, the notation here might be "Sear installed in HK 94 serial #———, barrel length (whatever they cut it to); overall length (whatever the new length is)." In this manner, the HK 94 can have a full length barrel installed in it later, the sear removed, and it is a Title I firearm again
- 4i) State why you intend to make a firearm. Keep it simple. Military arms collector, investment, use by police department, re-enactor, museum use, self-

defense—be prepared to write a statement on THAT one. The Striker, Street Sweeper and USAS-12 owners may put "registration required by government" here.

5) FFL numbers if you hold a current FFL. Yes, it does speed up the process a little—ATF already has background checks to refer to.

6) ATF identification number—if you are a Special Occupational Taxpayer, Class 3 dealer, Class 2 manufacturer, Class 1 importer, you insert your EIN here. A Class 2 manufacturer may still need this if they are making a Destructive Device or registering a Striker, etc. This info does help.

7) Same as #6

8a-e) Standard questions—answer them honestly. Lying is perjury like it is on a 4473.

9a-d) Same as 8.

10) Same as 8.

11) Your full, legal signature in ink. I suggest blue ink, so that there is no question that the signature is an original. You will be filing two copies of your Form 1; make sure that both have original signatures.

12) If you are the individual owner of the intended Title II firearm, type "owner" in this space. In the case of a company or government agency, put your title here.

13) Date—the day you are filing this form—the date of your signature.

Space at the bottom is for ATF examiners only.

SIDE 2:


All Form 1's, except for the government agency applications, need the photograph and law enforcement certification. And—surprisingly enough—corporate filings do not need these. If a corporation is investing in, say, an M-203, they can file the Form 1 front only. All others must submit a passport-size photo of the person signing the front on each of the two copies that are submitted. Any photo shop can supply the passport-size duplicates.

Law Enforcement Certification. There is a list of eligible "Chief Law Enforcement Officers" at the bottom of the page. If you can not find someone to sign, call ATF NFA

Branch in Washington D.C. (202-927-8330) and they will try and help you find a qualified signer. No signature—no approved form.

DO NOT MANUFACTURE THE CONTROLLED FIREARM UNTIL YOU HAVE RECEIVED AN APPROVED COPY OF YOUR FORM BACK FROM NFA BRANCH. It will take three to six months. If they have any problems, you will be notified. Plan on this taking a long time and you won't be freaking out at the three month point. In the case of Destructive Devices such as cannons. grenade launchers and mortars, it is a good rule of thumb to not be in possession of the barrel until you get the approved transfer. Example: in the case of an M-79 40mm grenade launcher, possession of the receiver and a 40mm barrel is considered to be possession of a complete Title II firearm. If you don't have an approved Form 1, that is a felony waiting to happen. When you have completed your approved firearm, your information must be engraved on the firearm (at 80% of receiver finish).

If you have any questions or want to see another form dissected, write in ASAP and I'll get it next month. I'll do the one I get the most notes on.

Q I would like to start by saying that I am a new subscriber and enjoy your fine publication immensely. The purpose of my letter is to ask some technical advice. I am the proud owner of an 08-15 Maxim parts set in unissued condition. It is complete except there is no left-hand side plate, and the original right-hand plate has been removed from the water jacket and trunion. I would ultimately like to assemble this set into a dummy gun for display purposes but want to be very careful regarding the law before proceeding.

I had planned to remove the cam from the RH plate, make up a dummy LH plate (with no cam) from thicker stock, i.e., 3/4" to 1" and put it all together. The thicker LH dummy plate would fill the area where the lock would go and prevent one from ever being inserted. No cams means the "gun" could not cycle.

Is this a good and legal solution? Is there a better way you can recommend?

Would I be better to put it all together with no LH side plate? Presumably this has been done before, and I would be anxious to benefit from your experience before proceeding.

Also, one more note: since I am a new subscriber, I was wondering if you had ever done any stories in the past on German Maxims (I already own Mr. Goldsmith's wonderful book).

A I suggest to anyone who is going to make a "non-firing replica" check with Technology Branch, ATF. Their phone number is 202-927-7910. It is easy to make a mistake, and prosecution instead of education has been the policy in many areas of the country. It sounds to me that you have the general idea—make a left hand plate that is solid, extends into the interior so much that there is no possible way to install the internals OR readily alter it to accept the internals. I would also weld up the chamber of a barrel, then weld the barrel into position. I would exclude the lock mechanism, and insure that it





As I remember the Balleu case, when the door was broken down and people with guns rushed in, Mr. Balleu grabbed a black powder pistol and tried to defend his house. The team coming in fired and wounded him, leaving him crippled. The officer who defended himself by firing is correct in my view, but the man who sent him in should be stripped of his badge, and probably jailed. The same goes for the Waco situation. Poor intelligence gathering, over-reacting to tax violations, grandstanding, media hogging, and showmanship all add up to a really deadly situation every time. I have yet to see a professional get into a situation like that ON HIS OWN. It is the fault of the leadership when a situation gets out of hand. I still firmly believe that there are high-ranking officials in the Clinton administration that should be tried for Capital Murder on the Waco massacre. They should make a public apology to the victims and the American people (including the agents







If there is a problemwith a print they send an additional one stored in then computer almost immediately (providing they can scan two sets at the time). Its fast, quick and accurate!

I have contacted the ATF twice with my last two transfers about this but I have had no direct response. It would also be nice if they offered an online address on the Internet so if we have a question we could get a quick answer from the SOURCE. It's kind of a nice twist on Clinton's "information superhighway" isn't it? Really putting it to a good use HE never dreamed of! Imagine-one week transfers-all because of his "superhighway."

There is absolutely NO DOUBT that in the NEAR future we will be doing nearly all business and communications electronically from private or public access terminals which are becoming as common as telephones are now. We CAN beat the rush—if we so desire. What do you think?




