Thus, on the *10th* of *January*, at 4h. 44m. in the Evening there will happen an Emersion of the first Satellite; and the Number 1, which is placed against the *10th* of *January* in the 1st Column, refers to the Number 1 in the 1st Column of the *Plate of Configurations*, against which is placed the *Correspondent Configuration*, or the Form in which the Satellites will appear at that Time.




























