V. Part of a Letter from William Burton, M. D. at Windsor, to C. Mortimer, R. S. Secr. concerning the Viper-catchers, and their Remedy for the Bite of a Viper.

SIR,

Windsor, May 24, 1734.

HE Bearer of this, William Oliver, and his Wife, called upon me last Week with their Vipers, and either of them offered to be bit by any Viper, and to suffer their Arm to swell for some Time; and then, by the external Application of a common cheap Remedy, in a few Hours to remove all the Symptoms. The Experiment was made last Wednefday in our Town-Hall, before Dr. Derham, F. R. S.
