NOTES ON ATTIC PROSOPOGRAPHY

THE FOLLOWING NOTES, chiefly of a prosopographical nature, pertain to recent publications of Attic inscriptions.¹

1. Φλ 'Ονησιγρά[της - - -], *Deltion* 25 (1970) 56, no. 2, col. 2, line 7, ephebe for Aigeis, should be identified with Φλ[άουιος 'Ο]νησιγράτης [- - -]αieύς who was priest of Asklepios about A.D. 200 (*Hesperia* 5 [1936] 106, line 3 = *IG* 3. 3839 + *IG* 2². 2000 + *IG* 2². 2012, with *AJP* 59 [1938] 343, and *TAPA* 71 [1940] 308). The latter text, the well known Sarapion monument from the archonship of Munatius Themison, was dated by Notoopoulos ca A.D. 226 (*Hesperia* 18 [1949] 39), but that date must now be revised one generation earlier (*Hesperia* 41 [1972] 141 and *Athenian Agora* 15 [Princeton 1974] nos. 447, 448). The demotic of the priest should be restored ['Εστ]αieύς, which is the only demotic in Aigeis at this time ending in -αieύς.

2. ['Αρ]ι[στ]αγόρα[s] T[ι]μαίου Λ[α]μπτρέυς on the grave stone published as *Deltion* 25 (1970) 72, no. 9, should be corrected to [Ι]ν[θ]αγόρα[s] T[ι]μαίου Λ[α]μπτρέυς. The same man served as secretary of the prytaneis of Erechtheis in Hippias' archonship² (*Athenian Agora* 15, no. 168, line 23, superseding *IG* 2². 920, line 16).

3. The restoration of the name [Σ]μ[κ]ρ[ων;] for the prytanis of Phearrhioi (demotic restored with certainty) in *Deltion* 25 (1970) 84, no. 1, line 11 was curtailed to [Σ]μ[κ]ρ[- - -] in *Athenian Agora* 15, no. 13a, line 11 and the name Smikrias suggested, on prosopographical grounds, as a possible restoration in the prosopographical index (*ibid.*, page 449). The large fragment of a Pentelic marble base recently published by P. A. Pantou (*ArchEph* 1973, 180-185, no. 3) must join this inscription and the spacing of the combined text indicates that the name in this line very probably was Smikronides.³

4. Φιλόνεφ[s - - - -], prytanis for Sounion in *Deltion* 25 (1970) 84, no. 1, line 13, was identified with Φιλόνεως Ἀμεινονίκου (Σουνιεύς) who took the oath in 363/2 B.C. on behalf of the Salaminioi from Sounion (*Hesperia* 7 [1938] 4, no. 1, line 71 = *SEG* 21. 527 = Sokolowski, *Lois Sacrées* Supp. (1962) 49–54, no. 19) and the patronymic restored in *Athenian Agora* 15, no. 13a, line 13. This restoration and the concomitant date of about 370 B.C. assigned to this inscription in *Athenian Agora* 15 (*ibid.*, comment below text) are now confirmed by the recently published fragment mentioned in no. 3 above.

5. The name Πολυχάρμ[ος], as restored for the prytanis of Sounion in *Deltion* 25 (1970) 84, no. 1, line 16, although unknown elsewhere in Attic epigraphy (and apparently also in Greek epigraphy in general) is now confirmed by the recently published fragment mentioned in no. 4 above and the correction to Πολυχαρῖδ[ης] (the pi should be dotted) in *Athenian Agora* 15, no. 13a, line 16 is to be rejected.

6. *Deltion* 25 (1970) 144, no. 2 records the victory of the choregos Apollodoros, son of Thrasyllus, of Leukonoion in the Thargelia during 362/1 B.C. *Hesperia* 36 (1967) 93–94, no. 21, a fragmentary text from which the archon's name has perished, commemorates the victory of the same choregos in the Dionysia. For Apollodoros see KirchPA 1395 = 1429; cf. Davies, *Athenian Propertied Families* 1395 and *addendum*, page 596.

7. Διόδωρος Σατύρο Ἐποιάδης, victorious choregos for Hippothontis in the Thargelia of 355/4 (*Deltion* 25 [1970] 146, no. 6), was undoubtedly related, probably as uncle or grandfather, to Satyros, son of Nikias and councillor for the Hippothontid Eroiadaí during 303/2 B.C. (*Hesperia* 37 [1968] 14, line 180 = *Athenian Agora* 15, no. 62, line 262). That the father of the councillor was syntrierarch in 356/5 B.C. (*IG* 2². 1612, line 124 = KirchPA 10798; cf. J. K. Davies, *Athenian Propertied Families*, 10798) offers confirmation that the family was wealthy. Σάτυρος Νικ[-----], party to a diadikasia near the beginning of the fourth century B.C. (*IG* 2². 1928, line 23 = KirchPA 12580), probably belongs to the same family (cf. Davies, *op. cit.* page 599, *addendum* 10798) and may conveniently be identified with the father of the choregos.

8. [Ἀ]σκληπιάς, daughter of Μητροδώρος Φλυεύς and Ζμαράγδιον (*Deltion* 25 [1970] 201, no. 5, lines 4–5 = *IG* 2². 4524 + *IG* 3, *addendum* 966e, page 510 + *EM* 2309 + *EM* 4505), is surely a sister of Μητροδώρος Φλυεύς and Σμάραγδος Μητροδώρου Φ(λυεύς) who were ephebes in A.D. 173/4 (*IG* 2². 2103, lines 104–105; for the date cf. Notopoulos, *Hesperia* 18 [1949] 27–28).

9. Αἶ[λ] Ἀμεινίας (*Hesperia* Suppl. 13 [1970] 6, frag. E, line 49), one of those prosecuted by the administrators of the estate of Herodes Atticus,

may be identified with Αἴλιος Ἀμειν[ίας - - - -] (*IG* 2². 2018, line 4, with the restoration now suggested) who was ephebe at the beginning of the second century after Christ.

10. Λάδικος Πολύαινον, who is mentioned both as having appealed a case against Sophanes son of Sophanes and also as having been prosecuted by the administrators of the estate of Herodes Atticus (*Hesperia* Suppl. 13 [1970] 4, frag. E, line 15, and 6, frag. E, line 51), should be identified as a son of Πολύαινος Λαδίκου [Σ]ουνιεύς who was polemarch in the early second century after Christ (*IG* 2². 2915). For other members of the same family see *IG* 2². 1713, line 28; 1721, line 2; 3004, lines 5–7; 3798, lines 3–4, 9; and 3887/8 (with a new fragment, *ArchEph* 1971, 118, no. 13), lines 2–3, and for a stemma of part of the family see Kirchner, *ad IG* 2². 3004.

11. Φλώρος Καλάμιδος made a payment on property in Anakaia in the early second century after Christ (*Hesperia* 41 [1972] 71, line 104 = *IG* 2². 2776, line 104). The names of both father and son are uncommon, and Φλώρος Κ[αλαμίδος?] who was prytanis for Marathon about A.D. 120 (*IG* 2². 1073, col. 1, line 21 = *Athenian Agora* 15, no. 322, line 40) was identified, and the patronymic restored, by Dittenberger from the reference in the late Roman property inscription. Kalamis of *IG* 2². 2776, presumably is the ephebe (φίλος γοργός) in a text dated by Kirchner to the reign of Claudius (*IG* 2². 1968, line 8). This identification offers slight support for an earlier dating of *IG* 2². 2776 than that offered by Dittenberger and Kirchner (cf. S. Follet, *Mélanges de linguistique et de philologie grecques offerts à Pierre Chantraine* [Études et Commentaires 79, 1972] 35–50, and S. G. Miller, *Hesperia* 41 [1972] 475–476).

12. The columnar gravestone *Deltion* 25 (1970) 72–73, no. 13 = *IG* 2². 5549.

13. The marble lekythos *Deltion* 25 (1970) 80–81, no. 54 = *IG* 2². 12819/20.

14. The grave column of Μνήσαρχος Ἐπαμείνωνος Προβαλίσσιος found near Basilikon and Monastiriou Streets in Athens (*Deltion* 22 [1967] 62 = *SEG* 25.263), allows us to identify, and restore the full name of, the Undersecretary in a prytany decree of 166/5 B.C. (*Hesperia* 3 [1934] 21–23, no. 19, lines 15, 46 = *Athenian Agora* 15, no. 216, lines 15, 53).
