## TV EXPANDS IN MEXICO

#### . . . Leader Evaluates New Service

By MIKE JABLONS

Special Correspondent, Radio-Television Daily

Mexico City—"Television will be operating in the black by the end of this year," declared Don Emilio Azcarraga during an interview held at his office in Mexico City's imposing new Televicentro. "We are building up set

circulation and viewing audiences steadily and we hope to be able to revise our rate schedule by the end of the summer so that we may pass the break-even point sometime before the end of 1953," he added. The present rate structure at XEW-TV lists a half-hour of "A" time t 800 pesos, or about \$100, plus a small additional facilities charge. However, lest Madison Avenue time-buyers hop the next plane for Mexico City, the rate is exactly double for shows produced outside the borders of the country. Thus a filmed or kined show produced in the States and shown down here on XEW-TV, plus being relayed across the country by XEQ-TV for the same time charge, will command a tariff of 1,600 pesos per half-hour. Even so, a half-hour of "A" time costing around \$250 is an adver-

tiser's dream buy in this thriving metropolis which already boasts 40,000 receivers.

Don Emilio, "El Hombre Fuerte" try, also revealed that he plans to inaugurate an "Art House Movie Theater" on TV both here in Mexico City on XEW-TV, and on his new outlet XETV, channel 6, in the Tijuana-San Diego area. The "Art House Movie Theater" will run important domestic and foreign feature-length movies.

"We plan to run this film feature after 10 o'clock in the evening," Don Emilio explained. "At that time the children will, or should be, in bed, and if these fine adult French. Italian, British, and Mexican films can be shown in theaters, there is no reason why people demanding good movies on television should not be able to see these pictures." Recently as an experiment. XEW-TV telecast the Italian movie hit. "Bitter Rice," and did not receive any unfavorable comment.

"The do a lot to help popularize the new medium," Don Emilio explained.

Station XEW-TV. channel 2, has its transmitter site atop Televicentro at Avenida Chapultepec 26 in the heart of Mexico City. The 320 foot TV tower resembling a miniature Eiffel Tower has rapidly become a landmark in the city;

having a transmitter and tower atop the studio building results in considerable savings for Senor Azcarraga's television operation. Zoning and aviation regulations make this one of the few cities in the world where such tower construction is permissible.

But the transmitter site that would make the eyes of any U.S. TV broadcaster pop is that enjoyed by XEQ-TV, channel 9. XEQ-TV is Don Emilio's relay station to carry the programs of XEW-TV to the country outside of Mexico City. Exclusively a relay station—it picks up XEW-TV's signal via microwave relay— XEQ-TV originates no programs of its own. The XEQ-TV transmitter is situated in Paso Cortes, 14,500 feet high in Cortes Pass between the twin volcanos that have become the trade mark of Mexico, Popocatepetl and Ixtaccihuatl (try pronouncing that on your precocious ten-year-old). From this vantage point XEQ-TV retransmits XEW-TV's programs with a clear signal as far as the city of Vera Cruz, almost 300 miles away on the Gulf of Mexico.
