### WHAT KIND OF AUDIENCE.

At KDKA we receive many letters, in fact hundreds arrive with every mail. Almost all of these letters laud our programs and tell us about our fine entertainments. Some of the letters are not so laudatory and a few writers are very critical.

Although nothing has been said about it, the majority of our correspondents seem to realize that in commenting on the programs, their own tastes must not prevail.

Artists must be selected without any regard to personal opinions. The audience is composed of persons in all walks of life, all having varied tastes. Some like ragtime music, some popular music and some, the most classical. And we must please all. Our problem is not like that of the theater manager, the concert manager, or the director of an opera company. People who attend either of these kind of entertainments only go to those places that have the music that they enjoy. It is not the same with the radio because there is only one show for all.

Those of you who listen in may say that we have too much classical music and to some extent you may be right. We have felt that the majority of persons are interested in good music and that if radio broadcasting were to continue and not be a passing novelty, only good music should be broadcasted. This policy might be justified in likening it to music in general. The old time ballads, the original operas and the work of the old masters still live while popular music comes and goes. The song hit of today is a memory tomorrow.

We hope that broadcasting by radio will not be a memory tomorrow, but with a high standard of entertainment continue to live in the hearts of all and educate everyone to a higher appreciation of the better things in music. PROGRAM FOR THE WEEK


# ALL DENOMINATIONS
