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## SETTING YOUR WATCH BY ARLINGTON

In the last issue of Radio Broadcasting News, a little information was given regarding our method of relaying the time signals from the Naval Radio Station (NAA) at Arlington, Virginia.

Perhaps many of our readers are not familiar with these signals and how they may be read and used to check their time pieces, and for this reason we are repeating the information which has been given from KDKA on numerous occasions.

These signals are given between 9:55 P.M. and 10:00 P.M. Eastern Standard Time. Each second of the Naval Observatory Clock is sent out as a dot, making a distinct tick in your phones. The tick for the twenty ninth second of each minute is omitted, making a noticeable pause. At the end of each minute the signals are omitted for several seconds, making a longer pause. At the end of the fifty-ninth minute the signals are omitted for ten seconds making a much longer pause.

This silence is broken by a dash, which is heard as a continuous sound for several seconds. The beginning of this dash is the zero second of the new hour, or exactly ten o'clock, 75 th Meridian Time.

A convenient way to check your watch is to follow the second hand during the first part of the signals, thus noting the position of the second hand relative to the end of the minute. The minute hand should be observed during the fifty-ninth minute and checked with the signal for 10:00 P.M. In this way you can tell exactly how many minutes and seconds your watch needs tobe changed.
