# KDKA BROADCASTING REACHES CHILE

Radio broadcasting is reaching far beyond the boundaries of the United States. A friend in Cuba gives regular radio parties for his friends who enjoy the concerts from KDKA very much. A short time ago we heard from Venezuela, and now comes a letter from Frank F. Reb, chief operator on the S. S. Santa Luisa of the Grace Line, telling how he heard KDKA in the port of Iquique, Chile, far below the equator. Following are extracts from his letter:

"Having just returned from a trip to Valparaiso, Chile, during which a series of long distance radiophone reception tests were made, I take pleasure in announcing that we heard the KDKA broadcasting station while we were in the port of Iquique, Chile, a distance of about 4,200 miles. Though the atmospherical disturbances were bad during the test the selections came in so strong that they were easily heard by Captain Williamson and a number of passengers. The tests were conducted only while in the ports of the trip so as not to interfere with radio regulations.

"The reception of broadcasting stations this distance and the remarkable intensity of the selections was beyond my expectations and is, without doubt, the first time that American radiophone stations were heard south of the Equator.'

We can only wonder how soon it will be possible for the broadcasting of KDKA to be heard in Europe and other distant lands, and if in the comparatively near future we may not expect to find the world girdled with a chain of listeners to this favorite broadcasting station.
