More Important Than Ever

As far as listener acclaim is concerned, times are not what they used

As Iar as listener acclaim is concerned, times are not what they used to be for announcers.

No longer do a few "it" members of the profession bask in the adoration of worshipping multitudes, like unseen matinee idols. These days there are too many good announcers, and their work has become too much a standardized routine. Yet if they have lost something in glamor, they have come to be still more important cogs of the radio machine.

machine.

What we have in mind is the decisive extent to which they determine the personality not only of programs, but stations and even networks. Perhaps you have noticed that. Perhaps, as an example, you have expressed a preference for a certain station or network, and, when pinned down to a definite reason, have been surprised to find that it was

pinned down to a definite reason, have been surprised to find that it was because of the announcers.

And at first thought that is considerable of a surprise. Announcements occupy only a small proportion of the total air time. Apparently, the programs themselves should have much more weight in establishing this vague but vital quality we call personality. However, the bulk of that work does fall on the announcers.

Which is further proof of the familiar truth that people react most fully and definitely to people.

For the listener, the announcer is the voice of the station or chain, and radio has taught us to draw conclusions from voices as we never did before the loudspeaker era. So we come to know these men whose voices greet us day after day.

Some we recognize instantly as kindred spirits, speaking our lan-

voices greet us day atter day.

Some we recognize instantly as kindred spirits, speaking our language, in our own way. Others leave us unmoved. And still others rub us the wrong way. It is the old human story of individuals responding to individuals.

That is why the announcer's new part in the scheme of radio is more important than his once-accepted function as a mash-note magnet. For this attribute we call "personality" is the breath and life-blood of
