



NOW IT'S THE ENTERTAINMENT INDUSTRY

The recent election of M. H. Aylesworth, president of NBC, as presiednt also of RKO is something more significant than another of those interlocking management tricks with which one big business bewilders the "man in the street." It is frank and conclusive evidence of the David-and-Jonathan bond that now binds radio to the theater.

'Twas not ever thus.

Readers whose enlistment in the loudspeaker army dates back to the "good old days" can remember a time when any vaudeville or movie star who appeared on a broadcasting program did so at the imminent risk of forfeiting his theatrical contract. Then the theater looked upon radio as its "hated enemy." But everything is different now.

The old feud has b en fading for several years. Radio stars have been headlining theater bills and theatrical headliners starring in air shows with increasing frequency. RKO was organized by the same in-terest, which own NBC. And now with Mr. Aylesworth serving as president of both, the one-time bitter rivals come under unified command.

It is all part of an unfolding pattern, not so much as disturbed by Paramount-Publix's sale, a short time ago, of its half-interest in Colum-bia. CBS and various theatrical groups also co-operate cordially.

In short, there is no longer a broadcasting industry as opposed to a theatrical industry. There is an entertainment industry, with closely affiliated broadcasting and theatrical branches.

That, of course, is as it should be. The two have enough in common to make the union logical. Still, every happv marriage demands a pretty even score on the matter of give and take. And thus far there is reason for the uspicion that radio has been giving more than it has been receiving.

Frankly, the chief harm of broadcasting for the theater seems to be its ucefulness as a "build-up" medium. Numerous vaudeville and film hits could be mentioned whose box-office success can be traced directly— and sometimes solely—to the fact that they were first loudspeaker favorites. On the other hand, comparatively few stage or screen stars have twinkled so brilliantly before the microphone.

Granted, this may be due merely to shortcomings of technique. But the point is that the radio-theater wedding can scarcely be happy if radio continues to be principally an advertiser of its partner. That is neither fair play nor good business. For its own sake, the theater should see that its contribution to radio more nearly pays its debt to the microphone.
