Wayne King, one of America's leading maestros, will bring his orchestra to Castle Farm Wednesday (June 15). This handsome 6-foot son of El Paso (Texas) bears lightly the titles of "Waltz King" and "Idol of the Radio Networks." He inaugurated the Lucky Strike Dance Hour and opened the Netherland Plaza. Wayne composed "The Waltz You Saved for Me," "Until the End," "Beautiful Love" and "Goofus." He follows Jan Garber and band to Castle Farm and will broadcast over WLW.

Realism Features New Drama Series Opening on Sunday

Seeking new types, increased realism and widened scope in radio dramatics, Columbia will inaugurate a series of 12 experimental half-hour dramas Sunday (June 12) at 7 p. m., under Don Clark, continuity chief.

The initial production will be a trick adaptation of Frank R. Stockton's famous short story, "The Lady or the Tiger." Stockton put his medieval hero in a maytyr's arena to open one of two doors, releasing either a murderous tiger or marriageable lady. He then left the outcome to readers. Clark will complete the story both ways with trick endings.

With Clark will be Archie Coates, Charles Speer, Nila Mack, Charles Tazewell, Walton Butterfield and Jan Schimek of Columbia's continuity department.

BERT LAHR OPENS

The new Lucky Strike Dance Hour will be launched Tuesday (June 14) at 9 p. m. over WSAI (NBC-WEAF), with Bert Lahr, comedian; Walter Winchell, columnist; and Walter O'Keefe, master of ceremonies. Dramatizations of crimes from New York City police files and broadcasts by famous bands will be featured. The programs will be heard Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday at 9 p. m.

Political Experts To Follow Battle For Listening Nation

NBC and Columbia will turn generous portions of their respective airways over to the Republican National Convention, opening Tuesday (June 14) in Chicago.

Over WLW (NBC-WJZ) Lowell Thomas will speak from Chicago, devoting his regular news talks (nightly at 6:45 except Saturday and Sunday) to the convention. His new sponsor is the Sun Oil Company.

William Hard, NBC political observer, and Graham McNamee will handle the running story at intervals.

Columbia has announced the following schedule for broadcasts each day during the convention:

8:30-8:45 a. m.—Prophecy of day's doings based on night caucuses and reports.

12:45-1 p. m.—Survey of morning session, WKRC: June 14-17.

5:45-6 p. m.—Survey of afternoon session, WKRC: June 14-17.

10-10:15 p. m.—Analysis of day's actions and report on night caucuses.

Distinguished Briton Joins WLW

Richard Nicholls, a Briton with a distinguished career as actor and producer and as radio production director for NBC and Columbia, has joined WLW as assistant general manager in charge of programs. John L. Clark, general manager of the Crosley Radio Corporation, has announced.

Nicholls was born in Plymouth, Devonshire, England, and attended Queens School and Exeter College, Oxford. He joined the Royal Air Force during the World War. After studies at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art and plays with the Plymouth Repertory Theater he sailed in April 1919 to join a branch of his family in America.

Nicholls has produced "The Eno Crime Club," Maltine Fairy Story Hour; Count Felix von Luckner's "The Sea Devil," Scott and Bowne's "Romances of the Sea," and the Yardley programs with the London String Quartet, Mischa Levitski and Leslie Howard.

GET READY FOR THE CONVENTIONS

The Republican and Democratic National Conventions are just around the well-known corner. Anyone who keeps in touch with the world cannot fail to be aware of that.

Moreover, radio is going to play a more effective part than ever before in reporting these dramatic quadrennial gatherings. Both the networks are prepared to provide those who stay at home with the audible equivalent of front-row seats at Chicago. Yet, unless they do something promptly, many prospective listeners will find themselves unable to enjoy these big political shows, because they have neglected their receivers.

Due not only to the business situation, but even more to the "let things slide" psychology bred by it, thousands of good receivers today merely are hobbling along, for the lack of minor repairs or tube replacements. It is a penny-wise, pound-foolish economy at best, and it will prove glaringly so when the conventions come on the air.

As tone-conscious listeners know, high-quality reception of spoken material demands that the receiver shall be in apple-pie order. And the convention broadcasts will consist almost exclusively of speeches and announcements.

Further, the sessions will run far beyond the listening hours usual in many homes. Which means an added strain on ailing parts, not to mention tired ear nerves.

So now is the time for every good listener to come to the aid of his long-suffering receiver.

If it lisps or stutters, if it wheezes or has a frog in its throat, the chances are that it needs nothing more than a few new tubes or some trifling repair to make its voice clear and strong again. Good tubes were never so cheap, and expert repair service never so readily available at reasonable figures. More than that, a small outlay now may very well prevent much more costly trouble later, after the well-known stitch-in-time manner.

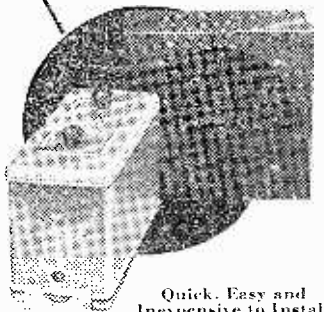

This Business of Broadcasting

In a world fast changing, the broadcasting business has come to take its place in everyday life as a new and vital force. Things are moving so fast these days that radio . . . the fastest means of communication in the world . . . has all it can do to keep up with them. What was an anticipation yesterday is an accomplishment today . . . and broadcasting, just out of the nursery, so to speak, now finds itself the counsellor of all mankind. It is the friend and guide of the human race.

The broadcaster has come to take his place in the community along with the leaders in all fields. In a way, he occupies the post established years ago by the great educators and the disseminators of human intelligence . . . the editor, the teacher. Instead of playing these roles himself, the broadcaster of today calls upon the outstanding public men, in all lines, to add their word to his medium of entertainment, and enlightenment . . . so that the broadcaster occupies a peculiar position in the world. Through the medium he controls may be heard the voices of all the representatives in all lines of human endeavor . . . from the politician to the pulpiteer, from the singer of psalms to the song and dance man.

It is easily seen, therefore, that the modern broadcaster has assumed a high obligation for, under the law, the broadcaster must operate his station in the interest of the public, and the public's convenience and necessity; so it stands to reason that he will not jeopardize what to him is a sacred trust. That is the reason why all tastes must be catered to by American broadcasters who cannot favor any one class . . . no matter how influential that class may be.

Young as broadcasting is, it is on a par with the public press, the pulpit and the class-room as a medium for instruction and enlightenment. There is no other instrument more powerful, since by its very nature, broadcasting can command the use of all agencies. There is no class or condition of men that will not joyously stand before the microphone, placed willingly at their service, and broadcast their message of cheer, or hope, of charity or encouragement, to those listening on the other end of the line.

This is where broadcasting exerts its greatest influence on the lives of the millions of people who, day in and day out, hear what is sent through the transmitter into the receiving sets. It goes direct to the home. It reaches father, mother, and the children. It must, therefore, be universal in its appeal . . . for it must catch the attention of the youngster playing on the floor, captivating his imagination, and at the same time it must bring some sort of comfort to the old folks.

Broadcasting strives to do all these things, and it has a greater opportunity than most other mediums because it usually enters the home in the early morning, when the family is arising, stays for the three meals, and does not depart until bedtime. It comes with the blessing of dawn and leaves with the farewells of the night.

Tangee Musical Dreams, one of WLW's most popular broadcast features, now is heard regularly over NBC-WJZ each Tuesday and Friday at 10:15 p. m.

While originating in the Crosley studios, the network broadcast of Tangee Musical Dreams will not be carried over WLW but will be repeated over that station at 10:30 immediately following the network presentation.

Bill Stoess, Musical Director of WLW, will continue as conductor of the Tangee Musical Dreams Orchestra as will Ralph Simpson as soloist, and Wally Maher as master of ceremonies.

day at 6:30 p.m.). Ray does manage to keep his patter fresh, which, of course, is a radio humorist's lifeline.

And SRO is back on the air (NBC over WLW, Sunday at 7:15 p.m.). Wherefore we heave a relieved sigh. After two or three successive cancellations for other programs, we'd begun to fear that this excellent piece of drama had drawn a fate it did not deserve.

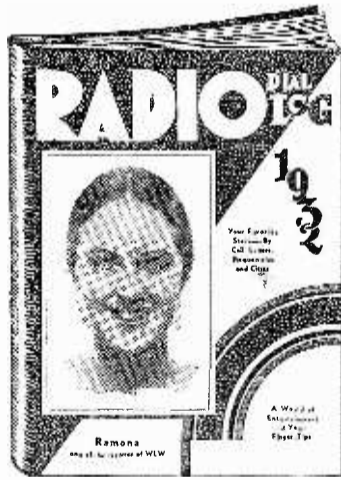

INTERVIEW

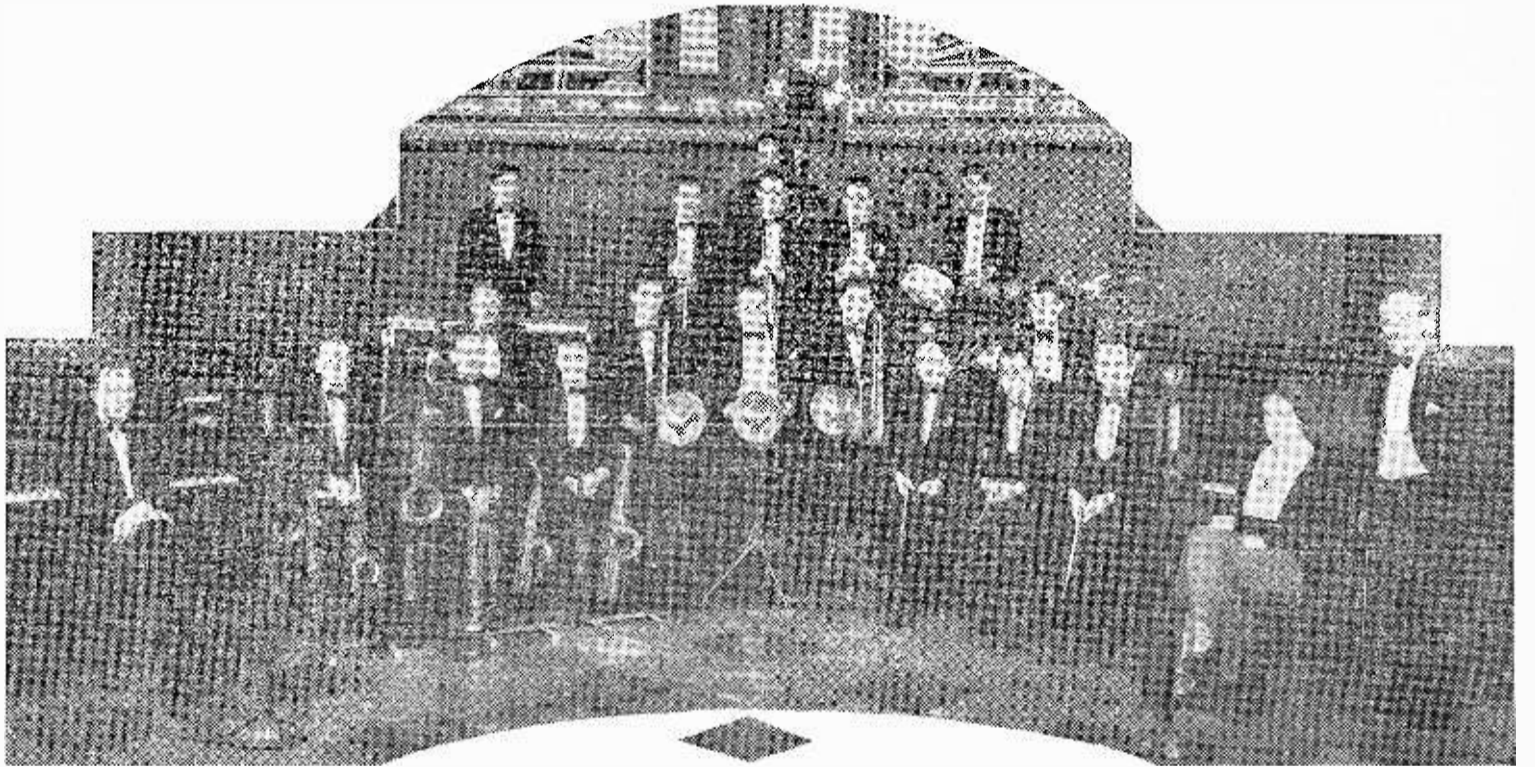
