## MAYBE IT WILL BE A GOOD THING

There are increasing signs that broadcasting at last is feeling the clammy clutch of "Old Man Depression."

During recent weeks, costly commercial programs have been cancelled in greater number than has heretofore been usual during the summer. And, confirming the necessity of retrenchment, the networks as well as individual stations have been reducing their staffs substantially.

But there is no need to "view with alarm." Program schedules do not face any drastic curtailment. Broadcasting is well fortified against a prolonged pinch. While business in other lines has languished, it has been flourishing like the proverbial green bay tree. In fact, there is reason to anticipate that the loss in sponsored programs now appearing may turn out to be a good thing for all parties concerned.

As most listeners know, the sponsor—not the broadcaster—dictates the contents of the program for which he pays. Studio staffs are fully responsible only for non-sponsored, or sustaining programs. At first thought this difference seems of small consequence to those at loud-speakers. But actually, it is of considerable importance.

Most sponsors want programs that are certain to succeed. They are—and quite understandably—loath to risk large sums on venturesome innovations. As a result, they tend to lean toward safe sameness, leaving experiments for studio staffs to undertake in sustaining programs.

During the past two or three years these staffs have had scant opportunity for experimentation. Most of the choice listening hours were sold. But with time sales reduced, they are now free to try out the departures that have been clamoring for a hearing. And if previous experience is any criterion, the result is certain to be noteworthy.

Today's radical innovation in a sustaining program becomes tomorrow's sponsored success. Broadcasting history bristles with examples of that transition. Amos and Andy are only one of the many which could be cited.

There is no dearth of new program ideas, different methods of presentation, or fresh types of appeal. They simply have not had a chance with established forms in the saddle.

Around the studios, the summer of 1932 can be put to no more profitable use than the fair trial of every promising program innovation. With unsold time so employed, there will be no depression in listening, followed by a speedy resumption of sponsor buying. All of which should react to the benefit of everybody concerned.

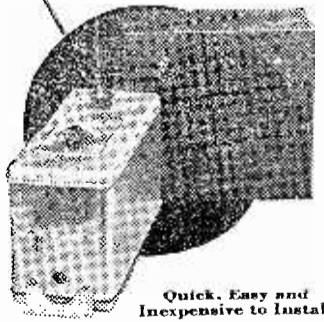

## This Business of Broadcasting

In the years that have brought so many changes, completely transforming the world with higher standards of living, a parallel line of improvement may be traced on the chart of broadcasting.

There is, perhaps, no other human agency that shows such steady progress. It began practically with nothing and has come now to be one of the outstanding industries. In this country alone more than 600 stations are continually at the service of the people.

When the two major political parties—the Republicans and the Democrats—hold their national conventions, and again when the November elections are held, an entire nation will be informed almost instantly of the results by radio. There have been instances in this country where people did not know the outcome of a presidential election until weeks after the final vote was cast. This was notably so in the disputed election of 1876.

Broadcasting history was made during the Harding-Cox period, but even then only a handful of crystal set owners was able to receive the returns.

In this momentous year—when there is more interest than ever in the elections—the people of the United States will go through a complete campaign and not miss so much as one word uttered by either party candidate, if the people are inclined to hear.

No longer need the man on the street be ignorant of what is going on in the realm of politics. He can hear from their own mouths the actual words of men who seek public office. He can know their ideals and ambitions, and what may be expected of them. Today, by the force of radio broadcasting, a presidential candidate may reach millions of listeners—all vitally interested in every word he utters, for upon his election or defeat may hinge the fate of the nation.

It has been said—and with some truth—that the radio has been the real factor in de-bunking politics. An insincere note is easily detected over the air, for the simple reason that personal magnetism cannot cover loose thinking nor audience-reaction stimulate oratorical flights and enthusiasm. Hard, cold facts are the demand of broadcasting.

Thus, broadcasting has helped mightily in bringing about a reform in American politics. It has gotten away from the abstract thought of yesterday and come to the concrete speech of today, leaving aside rhetoric and paying more attention to remedy.

If there is here a distinct contribution to political science, it may be dated from the first broadcast of national elections—an event that took place only a few administrations ago.

many enterprises and made successes of them. WCKY is his newest interest and already WCKY is beginning to bear the brand of L. B. Wilson success.

It was in November of 1931 that L. B. Wilson assumed the duties of General Manager as well as the passive role of president of WCKY which he has occupied since the opening of the station in 1929. When WCKY opened in September, 1929, L. B. Wilson was largely responsible for the station's presence on the air, but he wasn't particularly interested in station activities. He left them in other hands. Radio wasn't the big business then that it is now.

Then things began to happen. National advertisers clamored for time on the air—radio was making money. Curiously and with quickening interest L. B. watched. WCKY was not making the progress it should. It was making many friends but it was not the outstanding station it should be. L. B. began visiting the studios. His visits became more and more frequent.

Then in November last year he stepped into the executive role of general manager. Things began to happen. What things? Namely these—WCKY went on the air full time with a cleared channel . . . . Mabley & Carew, one of the mid-west's biggest stores, bought the station background . . . . studios were planned in the great Carew Tower in Cincinnati . . . .

WCKY trebled the number of NBC commercial programs it carried . . . . WCKY carried every available NBC sustaining program of both the red and blue network . . . . WCKY carried an average of 140 NBC programs every week—more than any other station in the Cincinnati area . . . . when Paul Whiteman came to Cincinnati on his RKO tour he chose the WCKY studios and facilities to broadcast his first two Pontiac Chieftain programs over the coast-to-coast network of the National Broadcasting Company . . . . when the Ziegfeld Follies played Cincinnati, Harry Richman, Hal LeRoy, Mitzi Mayfair, Gladys Glad, Jack Pearl and the entire Follies cast tramped over to WCKY to meet L. B. and broadcast a half-hour hilarious program . . . . when Earl Carroll's Vanities appeared in Cincinnati, Rudy Vallee and Everett Marshall broadcast from WCKY where each appeared for a radio interview . . . . Southern Symphonies, featuring Theodore Hahn, Jr., and his WCKY Orchestra, is heard every Friday night from 11:15 to midnight over a nation-wide chain of the National Broadcasting Company from the WCKY studios. . . . These are the accomplishments

of the short seven months reign of L. B. Wilson as General Manager of WCKY.

L. B. Wilson finds in radio and WCKY the perfect outlet for his twin talents of business and showmanship. Under his guidance WCKY will move on. Already new offices are being added, new departments created, the staff is constantly being enlarged, local programs are continually being improved and in every way WCKY is striving to fill the purpose of all radio stations — to provide a public service.

It's not only their right, but a good idea. Anyway, politicians and professors should have no monopoly on the talking business.

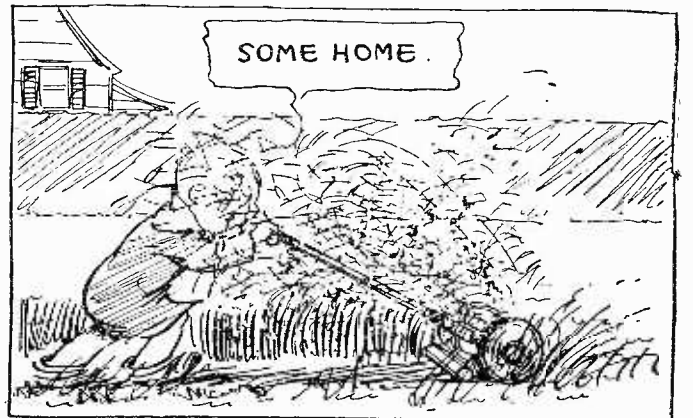
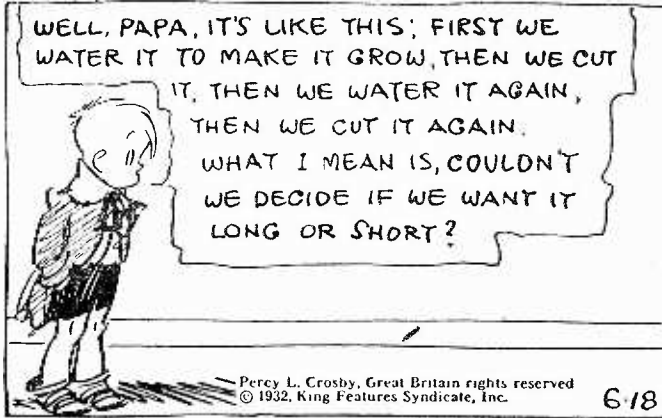
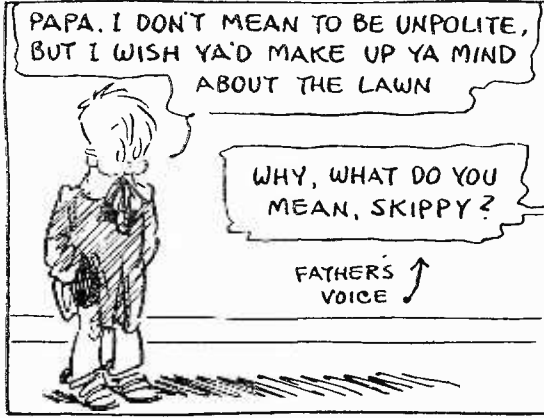
