# Bringing Main Street to the Big City


REAL FOLKS SKETCHES REFLECT A SIMPLE LIFE ATTRACTIVE TO ALL

There's a little bit of small town in all of us. We may be Broadway on the surface, but we're Main Street underneath. That touch of universal rube has resulted in George Frame Brown's sudden ight to a new popularity on his magic carpet of radio.

O all of us, George Frame Brown is known as Mayor Matt Thompkins. Very few realize that this below d character is also the creator of these "Real Folks Sketches" which are now heard every Sunday at 4:00 p. m. over the CBS network. Since their change to the Columbia network, under the sponsorship of Log Cabin syrup, "Real Folks" and Matt Thompkins have gained a tremendous amount of new friends among the radio listeners.

There's only one reason for the new suc ess. And it's nothing more than Brown himself. Given absolute freedem by his new employers, he has thrown himself whole-heartedly into his work again. The sketches are crisp, fast and bright. Always human, hey are even more so on the new hour.

"Real Folks" now resembles the early "Main Street Sketches" which Brown created about five years ago. The troublesome Horace is back again, shouting to be heard with his horn. Elmer is threatened weekly



with a spanking and told to "go wipe his nose." Marthy is doing a little heckling on the sly.

"Real Folks" are back in the Thompkins Corners General Store with all their old-time, gagless humor, spontaneous and sudden. It's no wonder that Brown has drawn a flood of mail on the new hook-up. Radio fans are ever happy to hear something fresh and natural. They're only too glad to write in and say so. You can almost smell the kerosene and coffee on "Real Folks" now. You just know that the crackers are damp, that the prunes are stuck together for eternity. A new "aroma" comes to your ears.

When Brown brought the first rural sketch to radio listeners in 1927, they were overjoyed. They said it with spontaneous mail and phone calls. There wasn't a single bid for mail in those early days, but the people wrote in just the same. They begged for Horace to have a chance with his horn. They became part of the town itself.

And why not? A rural sketch is a mirror held up to our youth. We've all lingered in the grocery store. We've all laughed at the potato (Continued on page 20)

## Pay Tribute to Washington on Both Networks

Local Stations also Celebrate Bicentennial this Week

The George Washington Bicentennial Celebration will be officially inaugurated this Monday when President Hoover, speaking before the joint session of Congress, delivers a eulogy of the famous president whose extraordinary career had so lasting an effect on the ideals and future of his country.

Following the president's speech, Walter Damrosch will conduct 12,000 school children, the massed Army and Navy bands and thousands of spectators in the singing of "America." John Phillip Sousa will lead the bands when they play "Hail to the Chief."

Thus will be launched a continuous nine-month celebration of the birth of Washington, which is scheduled to run from February 22 to the following Thanksgiving.

In that period the NBC and CBS networks will carry all the major events of the celebration as they are staged in Washington and other sections of the nation.

NBC programs will include an international broadcast in which either President Doumer, of France, or Premier Laval, will address American audiences this Friday. A pilgrimage of some 25,000 persons to the home of George Washington at Mount Vernon will also be described from the east portico of the picturesque old homestead over NBC networks.

Both the CBS and the NBC have arranged, during the nine-month period, to broadcast fetes, pageants, period music, dedications and all holiday commemorative programs as they, are arranged by the United States Commission.

Local radio stations without exception, early volunteered their complete co-operation in spreading the news of the Bicentennial and also in participating wholeheartedly in the program activities.

He is Renato Lioerti, whom Muzio married two years ago (her first marriage), and he is writing the story of her life, which may be labeled, "Claudio Muzio. Who is she?"

Beniamino Gigli, the General Electric soloist, is the possessor of the most luscious tenor voice known to our generation, and one somewhat near unto Caruso's in resonance, tho he does not like to be called a "second Caruso." His favorite dish is "boiled beans," cooked Tuscan fashion. He often sings popular tunes, and when I met him early in the morning at a train recent-ly, he started singing "It's Three O'clock in the Morning." At the Metropolitan he is soon to be returned to the cast of "Tosca," an opera from which he has been exiled since the unexplained quarrel with Mme. Jeritza. The lady has not forgiven, but the Met has a new soprano for "Tosca."

interesting novelty of symphonic jazz arrangements and syncopated classic selections interwoven to form unique contrapuntal and harmonic effects . . and in the afternoon you may hear the Pro-art string quartet over NBC . . . and Charles Gilbert Spross, pianist and composer, over CBS . . . In the evening, the NBC Artists Service presents one of the musi-cians whom it books for concert tours . . . Students, young and old, enjoy Damrosch's Music Appreciation Hour on Friday mornings . . the Rochester Philharmonic and the Curtis

People have often wondered what part radio would play in a world war. There has been a great deal of speculation and conjecture, but because of the fact that the nations of the world have not been thrown into conflict since the advent of radio, all guesswork must remain just that. At the present time a disarmament conference is in session at Geneva, and frequent radio reports are being made of the progress there. NBC has sent William Hard as its representative to act in the capacity of a reporter and his observations are relayed to America via the NBC international network. Mr. Hard is a capable fellow and his broadcasts to America are intelligent, well-considered comments. Through his good offices (and of course those of NBC) Americans are able to sit in at the round table discussions. Those of us who follow the broadcasts carefully can keep informed as to the very latest movements and trends. All of which makes for a greater understanding of the international political development and a keener concept of problems. That is one of the blessings of our time, the gift of radio during peace.

YOU Might Be Interested to Know That: Pierre Andre and Harlow Wilcox are the two local announcers most in demand in transcription work .... The announcers who assist in making commercial programs via records are paid anywhere from \$50 a day to \$25 per program.... Goodman Ace actually is the name of Mr. Ace of WGN's "Easy Aces" and Jane Ace is his wife. His skit, which had its start over a Kansas City station, is one of the best paid of the local programs. I understand that the Lavoris people recompense the Ace duo at the rate of \$750 per week .... Mollie Goldberg (Mrs. Gertrude Berg) lives in a penthouse in New York, and professes an interest in painting. The recent test vote to determine the popularity of her program brought in over 800,000 letters. (Although the sponsors only expected 250,000).... Guy Lombardo is getting \$6,000 per week for his appearance at the Paramount Theatre in New York. It's his first showing behind the footlights since he's been in the Big City. When Sir Guy appeared at the Chicago Theatre hereabouts, he raked in \$7,500 and established a house record that still stands .... It's said that when his band made the initial box over WBBM, Lombardo paid for the broadcast out of his \$900 a week salary.... Frank Lundquist, ye boss at WCFL, built the first commercial program to be proadcast in Chicago. Those were in the old WHT days.... Kate Smith is said to get more unsolicited fan mail than any person radioperating.... The March of Time is going off the air next month, and here's one listener that's sorry to note the exit. I thought the program one of the ten best being broadcast.... Judith Waller of WMAQ is the only woman directing a major station in Chicago... Rudy Vallee was plenty burnt at the New York radio commentator who said that the Vallee-Webb marriage was a great publicity stunt. Well?

If any one in radio today should know his business it is Howard Neumiller, WBBM pianist, who eight years ago made his first paranst, who eight years ago made his hist appearance before the microphone from WEBH, Chicago. That was when radio broadcasting was just two years old and radio artists were nothing if not versatile.

Mr. Neumiller can prove to you that there is such a thing as a "ghost pianist." He knows because he's been one.

Many a time, after a fifteen minute recital, "with Howard Neumiller at the piano," the announcer (usually Mr. Neumiller) would step to the microphone and state that Harry Brown would next oblige with a medley of popular tunes at the studio grand. Neumiller would then sit down to the same piano and play for the next fif-

Besides that there was publicity to be ground out, continuity to write, light operas to be produced, letters to write and phones to answer. Neumiller did all these jobs with a song in his heart.

But then, most studios were run the same way. Neumiller thinks it was more fun in the old days. Audiences were extremely appreciative and sent crates of oranges and grapefruit to every member of the staff. Since Neumiller was usually five or six members at once, his fruit supply was kept booming.

In 1926, the quietly attractive Neumiller became musical director of WIBO. A year later WENR made a bid for his services and got them. Now he is known as staff pianist of WBBM and also gives occasional recitals over the Columbia network.

Radio is not only his chosen profession bus his favorite pastime. "But it's not like the old days," says the thirty-five year-old pianist, "not like the old days" . . .

Mary E. Price, 501 Garnsey Ave., Joliet, Ill., remembers her first radio, which she had made in 1921. Instead of listening on one pair of earphones, Miss Price tried the stunt of placing the earphones in a deep bowl-and there was the first loud speaker. A Greek friend of hers was very much excited about the radio, and kept repeating "turn it off—you'll spoil the record and break the necdle." He couldn't understand where the music came from, and told all his countrymen that there was a devil in the home of the Prices.

stuck on the spout of a kerosene can. We've all chuckled as the small town aped and mimicked the big city.

It's our old home town. It's the town we wish we might live in for just a little while; a place where we could get some rest and peace. A small town is the cradle of all ambition and dreams. And a reproduction is fascinating, because it's natural.

And don't think for a minute that it isn't Brown's boyhood. It is, to the last letter. That country store is none other than the general store and trading center of Christopher Charles Brown, his father. Back in 1880 the elder Brown ran such a store and supply post in Haller City, Wash. Later there was another store in Seattle and a part-ownership in an Everett emporium. But don't think he got rich in his grocery stores.

George Frame Brown grew up in the grocery stores. He listened to his father deal with the townfolk. Blessed with a keen abservation, the boy didn't miss a trick. Only recently he decided that Sneed Yager, the giggling poor boy of his sketch, should wear an asafetida bag around his neck to keep away sickness. When Brown was asked "How come?" he replied:

"I remember the Mueller kids used to wear them, and they had more sickness than anybody in town."

It's those little touches that make Brown's sketches live.

Brown's first rural creation, "Main Street," slipped from his grasp five years ago because he failed to obtain copyright protection. When he started "Real Folks" hel registered it at Washington and the continuity couldn't be taken from him.

The success of the original "Main Street" program and the subsequent popias made and his scripts have been singled out in books and magazines as the ideal form of progressive dialogue for radio.

Brown introduced Luke Higgins and

mythical rural community called it Thompkins Corners. Luke Higgins became Mayor Matt Thompkins. Sary Higgins became Marthy. became Elmer. A court injunction kept "Main Street" off the air for a week.

Today we find a rural community called Buckport Point with a store run by the Stebbins Boys. There's another called Stebbins Boys. There's another called Centerville, with a grocery store run by a woman. Another can be heard each morning from the celebrated Phil Cook, who played in "Real Folks" three years ago. There are still a couple of other take-offs, and still they grow.

Brown has escaped eclipse, despite the keen competition in the field he established. | His "Real Folks" portray true characters. He sticks close to nature and human frailty. There's no way you can beat that. You may imitate it, but you can't better it.

One of the chief reasons for Brown's particular success may be found in the fact that he steers clear of religion and politics. You never hear any religious faction praised or berated in "Real Folks." When the town's elections are held, you never know whether they are Republicans, Democrats or Farmer-Laborites.

Brown also has made a practice of

Being somewhat of an enthusiast of the theatre, the rural philosopher has inthe theatre, the rural philosopher has incorporated his theatre training into his radio work. The radio sketches are little one-act plays, many of which could be presented on the regular stage. In fact, Brown frequently grants requests to churches, clubs and societies for scripts. And never does he make any charge for the use of them. His one stipulation is that the presentation be a sincere effort.

Brown is a little different from the average radio star who hustles from station to station, broadcast to broadcast, giving his wares to the public. His one radio interest is "Real Folks." That's the only program he does and the only one he wants to do.

And if the makers of Log Cabin Syrup hadn't stepped up and taken over the job of putting the rural sketch on the air, Brown would have jumped into his dun-garees and headed for his 125-acre farm There he would have basked, high in the hills of West Saugerties, with a typewriter and plenty of paper. He would have come down from those hills with a batch of plays. novels and short stories within a year or two. But it's just as well. The theatre isn't doing so well and the book field is crowded.

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


