



Theory is that the loss of any individual in this sixteen year old band would cause a difference in their perfect unit balance. 

impresses the memory and spirit far more to meditate in a few towns of Tuscany, rather than to make a hurried dash from Naples to the Alps, the Alps to Paris, Paris to London, and home. The first will be a perpetual enrichment, while the second can result only in a confusion.

Tourists' itineraries usually provide excessive mileage. Agencies inevitably arrange for you to "do" the maximum number of countries and cities in record speed. They never leave you in the small places with time to poke your head in the local newspapers and visit the station postmaster. Even if you cannot read a word of the print, you get many ideas about the sort of people you are visiting-of what they advertise, of what amuses them, and of the type of propoganda to which they are

Only by taking your time and travelling cheaply can you meet the real people of a nation, the people whose life is at the roots of its history and present character. The same is true of museums and places of historic interest. I have no objection to entering St. Peter's with guide or guide-book, but I will not go if it must be "done" in half an hour. Nor am I troubled about what I will not see.

#### ROSA PONSELLE

What I wanted to tell you was that my feet had been itching for the high road, and my hand for the walking stick ever since the amouncement reached me that Rosa Ponselle was to sing a concert in St. Moritz.

I was anxious to know if the mountainwalking she was doing had helped her, and to make certain that she had fully recovered from her operation which delayed her plans for sailing in May, and kept General Electric listeners from hearing her then.

This was to be her first attempt to sing in public since the operation, and there was that fateful question that always surrounds

singers and their ills. Would her voice suffer?
Her voice has not suffered. She poured forth unimpaired that glorious warmth of tone that only she has. In an age of greater voices than we hear today, Rosa Ponselle's would be marked. It satisfies every desire of those who seek a supreme natural gift. It has a timbre and a power that is unique. And she covers a wide repertoire with equal ease, if not with equal success. She sang the familiar arias of Italian opera, German lieder, French and English ballads, Tyrolese folk-songs, and Negro love-tunes.

This concert is Ponselle's annual gift to the poor children of St. Moritz, and the Einbassy room of Badrutt's Palace, where she always stays, held many standees. Most of here have more than a speaking acquaintance with the democratic prima donna.

Though she doesn't like to talk about her operation, she told me that rest and exercise had helped her to regain her vitality, and that she felt fully recovered. The only sport she engages in is mountain-walking. With khaki shirt and breeches, leggins, heavy boots, a rucksack, and a bright, red handkerchief, she starts out over the Julier Pass to Julier-Piz, or through the woods to the Corvatsch,



# The Story of Mrs. Coolidge

-By Ida Bailey Allen-

One of a series of articles on "Today's Pioneer Women" by Ida Bailey Allen whose interesting talks on this subject are heard each Tuesday at 10:15 a. m. over the WBBM-CBS network, sponsored by the makers of Pebeco Toothpaste.

ONE DAY a good many years ago, a school teacher from Massachusetts escorted a group of her little deaf and dumb pupils through the White House. It took time to explain everything to these unfortunate children, and the guard, annoyed at the length of their visit, asked the guests to leave. Perhaps at that moment the sprightly young teacher resolved that if she were ever mistress of the White House, its hospitality would be more evident.

To be a President's wife has always been a difficult task, but, with the growth of America, the First Lady of the land has become one of the busiest women in the country; her problems, the decisions she must make, would stagger many a captain of industry.

What was Grace Coolidge's preparation for this task? Just that of any American wife and mother. Grace Goodhue was born in Vermont and graduated from the University of Vermont; she accepted an appointment in the Clark School for the Deaf and Dumb, in Northhampton, Massachusettts. She married a rising young lawyer and went with him to live in a rambling, two-family house. There, for some fifteen years, Grace Coolidge cooked and mended, and washed the faces of two sons born to her.

Meantime Calvin Coolidge pursued a successful political career. He became Mayor of Northampton, then Lieutenant Governor, and finally Governor of Massachusetts. But with the simplicity that characterized the Coolidges, they did not move to Boston during these years; they remained in the Northampton home. Mr. Coolidge "commuted" like any ordinary business man; Mrs. Coolidge joined him at his Boston hotel when social occasions demanded her presence.

Then, overnight, Calvin Coolidge became a national figure. In his cool, silent fashion, he settled the police strike that threatened Boston. It was only a step to his election as Vice-President of the United States. Washington was too far for commuting; so the Coolidges moved, and Mrs. Coolidge, with her real talent for understanding people and making them feel at home, won tremendous popularity in a city where social jealousies often prevail.

The story of the Coolidge vacation in Vermont, broken by the news of President Harding's death, is common knowledge. The midnight oath that made Calvin Coolidge President conferred on his wife, this typical American home-maker, the title of the First Lady of the Land.

Do you think that being a President's wife is a lark? Have you visions of lazy mornings spent in bed, of pleasant social functions without responsibility? Then listen to a typical day as Mrs. Coolidge lived it. Her day began with breakfast at eight-and she was not in negligee, either, but in a smart morning dress. Before nine she had looked over the list of guests for the day, ordered flowers sent to the hospitals, planned the day's menus, determined her personal engagements, and somehow found time to arrange the flowers for the family rooms.

At nine her secretary arrived, and together they plunged into the morning's mail, often numbering thousands of letters, every one of which had to be read and answered. Usually there was a brisk walk in the late afternoon; sometimes personal shopping; then at noon, she met important delegations.

During the social season, Mrs. Coolidge received at tea twice a week. In the Red Parlor she greeted twenty-five or thirty guests -the nation's guests. I had the pleasure of meeting Mrs. Coolidge at one of these charming teas. Dressed in simple brown, with a

tall handsome uniformed guard at either side, she looked like nothing so much as a gay brown thrush.

Perhaps you would like to see the menu of a luncheon served by Mrs. Coolidge to the Prince of Wales at a simple family meal. Here it is: Fruit cup, clear bouillon, fairy toast, speckled trout, broiled chicken, Ber-muda potatoes, mixed salad, cheese biscuits, strawberry ice cream, cakes, coffee, salted almonds, and White Rock. And the Prince's comment on it was, "What a marvelous chef you must have, Mrs. Coolidge."

All the traditions and customs of the White House appealed strongly to Mrs. Coolidge. She regretted that so few of the original furnishings of the venerable mansion were to be found, and she herself scoured her new home from cellar to attic for discarded relics of the past. She discovered a brass inlaid chair that had belonged to Andrew Jackson, and the prize was a beautiful old mahogany, table which, with housewifely zeal, she immediately had repaired and placed in the Coolidge's private dining room. One morning the President was in the midst of one of his important breakfast conferences when suddenly, without a squeak of warning, the antique collapsed. The President's remarks

are not recorded! The Coolidge's reign at the White House ended as sedately as it had begun. Without ostentation, they went back to the twofamily house in Northampton where so many happy years had passed—not without sorrow, for one of their two boys, Calvin, the younger, had passed away.

Mrs. Coolidge, with the same amazing adaptability that marked her entrance into the White House, slipped back into her role of home-maker in the familiar residence, and later in the beautiful new home, The Beeches, which the Coolidges bought a year or two ago. She has best expressed herself and her own interests in a letter to me; she wrote, "I think I prefer being called 'The Nation's Homemaker' to any other title.'

# Beauty-and How By V. E. Meadows

This is one of a series of articles on beauty by V. E. Meadows, internationally famous beautician of Hollywood, who talks on beauty every Thursday at 10:45 a. m. over the Columbia network on the Gerardine program. Local outlet WBBM.

THE REASON for using a liquid shampoo instead of a cake of soap is simply this-In rubbing the cake of soap on the hair the scale on the outside part of the hair catches particles of the soap and is worked underneath the scalp. Even though the person was extremely careful to rinse out what she thought was all of the soap particles, this is rarely accomplished and the soap remains under the scale and as a consequence the hair gets out of condition. Incidentally, you are always combing the soap out of the hair every time the hair is combed or brushed. then if any heat is applied such as a marcel, it burns the soap and that in turn burns the hair.

The average person has forgotten that a hair brush is to be used for brushing the hair. It has become especially true since women have had their hair cut. They seem to get the idea that when you have your hair cut you bought a license to forget about your hair, which is not true. Bobbed hair or long hair requires the same attention. This holds true from early childhod for either male or female and the young child should learn how to use a hair brush just as soon as he learns how to use a toothbrush, and should have a hair brush of his own. A good hair brush is described as follows: It is made of genuine Siberian boar bristle, not horsehair and quill, split whalebone nor wire. Bristles should be at least one inch long and can be two inches long. The brush should have at least seven rows of bristles across the face and can come as high as 12 or 13 rows. A good hair bruch will last a great many years and is an excellent investment. The care of a hair brush is important. It should be washed at least every other day and preferably after the final brushing. First comb the hair out of the brush and wash the brush in comfortably hot water into which you have put some kind of soap granules or flakes. Make a good big thick suds and swish the brush around in this suds. After it has been thoroughly cleaned rinse in clear water, getting all the soap out of it, wiping it off gently with a towel, the back as well as the bristles and then stand on end in the sunlight and let some air get to the brush. Do not dry near artificial heat of any kind and never lay a brush down on the back of the bristles to dry.

Any sort of dressing applied to hair which is gluey or greasy gets under the scales and either remains greasy or dries, catching the dirt that is always present in the air and very rapidly gets the hair oiled and out of condition again, necessitating some sort of cleans-

Improper permanent waves. By this I mean permanent waves given when the hair is out of condition with the thought that it may cure whatever is wrong with the hair. Permanent waves given by an inexperienced operator. Cheap permanent waves given with cheap materials. All of these things have a very detrimental effect on the hair. A permanent wave is absolutely harmless if given by an experienced operator with a reputable machine and genuine recognized materials.
